DILLON MYER TO VISIT PROJECT NEXT WEEK

Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, accompanied by Rex Lee of the Washington office will visit Topaz October 21 and 22, according to word received here yesterday.

Arrangements are being made for meetings with Myer by councilmen, representative resident groups and appointed staff members.

The national director's arrival next week will mark his second visit to Topaz. He was here on October 4 of last year.

THREE CENTER YOUTHS MAY GET CARNEGIE HERO COMMENDATIONS

To investigate applications to the Carnegie Hero Fund for the act of three young boys who rescued a cave-in victim, Herbert W. Eymann, special agent for the fund commission, is expected to arrive here today.

The heroic act was performed last April when Dan Kawamori, 11, Albert Mizuhara, 12, and Yosuke Mizuhara, 9, risked their lives to rescue their playmate, Frank Mishioka, who was buried in a cave-in while the boys were playing in an excavated trench in the high school construction lot.

The case was reported to the commission by the administration some time ago.

FROST HITS CROPS

600 LUGS TOMATOES, 30 TONS CANTALOUPE ARE LOST

Approximately 30 tons of mature cantaloupes and 600 lugs of tomatoes were lost when the season's first killing frost struck the center farms early Wednesday morning.

Damages, however, were limited as some 200 lugs of tomatoes and 17 tons of cantaloupes were picked by 200 11th and 12th grade high school students during Tuesday afternoon.

FIRE CAUSES \$50 DAMAGES TO ROOM

A fire started by a miscellaneous lot of combustible material piled between a hot stove and wall caused 50 dollars in damages to the apartment of Hideo Ura, 1-1-A, Tuesday, at 2:15 P.M., the fire department reported.

Preparing for the cold weather, the fire department inspectors will visit each apartment soon to instruct residents on the use and care of the stoves, Samuel Owen, section head, stated.

Persons with faulty stoves should report them to their block managers so that repairs may be made by the maintenance workmen.

In addition, the regular farm section crews harvested 25 tons of cantaloupes and all of the mature eggplants, peppers, cucumbers and green beans before the frost.

CREW WORKS HARD
Vernon Ichisaka, Sen-ichiro Ohye, Wendell Palmer, Alden S. Adams, and George McCole worked until after midnight Tuesday to haul in all of the harvested produce to the center.

Hardy crops including celery, onion, daikon, cabbage and broccoli were not affected.

HARVEST CONTINUES
Harvest work has been continuing since yesterday by both high school students and regular workers to save all salvageable fruits and vegetables, McCole stated.
