302 HEARINGS COMPLETED; 41 FAVORABLE

Leave clearance hearings have been completed for 302 persons whose eligibility are in doubt, according to the employment office. Of this number, 41 have already received favorable recommendations from Washington.

Dockets have been sent here from Washington for 60 more cases during the week end and next week. It is anticipated that the remaining 300 persons will be given hearings by tho end of next month, if dockets for them are received here as scheduled.

Favorable reports are transmitted to Washington on a majority of cases by the project director, it was stated.

Hearings are usually required for persons who have altered their answer to the loyalty cuestion, requested cancellation of repatriation, received a greater part of their education in Japan and arrived in this country arter 1935, and for those who have had business connections with Japan.

DILLON MYER HERE

TO MEET EVACUEE HEADS TOMORROW AFTERNOON

Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, arrived at 11 AM today from Salt Lake City. He was accompanied by Nex E. Lee, former relocation officer for the Intermountain area but now attached to the relocation offices in Washington, DC, it was stated.

PRISON CAMPS JAPAN EMPLOYS GENEVA RULES

Prison camps in Japan, occupied China and Hong-kong are abiding by the rules laid down at the 1929 Geneva convention, Dr. John R. Mott, international chairman of the YMCA's War Prisoners' Aid Committee, disclosed in San Francisco last Friday.

"We have received this assurance from the Sriss government and the International Red Cross," Dr. Mott said at a press conference.

The task of the YECA among prisoners is to provide a program of education, religion and athletics to fill their unoccupied time, Dr. Mott explained.

"The reason for my coming to Topsz is mainly to Cet better acquainted with the staff end the evacuee leaders so that we may work for a better understanding of the relocation problem," Myer explained to the press this morning,

CO-OPERATION

"A job of relocation cannot be done by the WRA, but it can be done by the WRA and the evacues working together in planning and executing the program.

"I also came to discuss administrative problems with the project director and his staff. I want to try to provide a better understanding of the national problems so that the local staff will understand something of what we are facing, and also to learn of local problems so that we may meet needs here.

"The WRA is a moving program and needs to continually readjust its sights to meet the next phase," Myer concluded,

Myer will view the center and discuss basic problems with the staff today. At 6:30 PM he will be honored at a dinner meeting in block 2.

MYER'S SCHEDULE

Friday morning from 9:15 to 10:30, Myer will meet with the relocation group. In the afternoon at 2:30, he will confer with the community council, Inter-Faith, block managers, and other residents at 1-10-CD.

Myer will return to Salt Lake City Friday afternoon and will leave for Minidoka Saturday, it was reported today.

TETA MARU REACHES MARMAGOA WITH 1500 PERSONS ABOARD

MARMAGOA (Portugose India) -- The Japanese repatriation liner Teia Haru arrived last Friday with approximately 1,500 Americans and Canadians.

According to a Reuter dispatch from Marmagoa, there were more than 1,600 aboard, including 1,290. Americans, 248 Canadians and the remainder Latin-Americans.

The exchange of nationals will begin as soon as the exchange ship, Gripsholm, arrives in Marmagoa.

WEATHER Max. Min. Tuesday 49 33° Wednesday 54° 27° Names of the American repatriates aboard the Teis Laru were released to the press last week by the State Department.

Hundreds of American missionaries and business men from Japanese occupied China, Saigon, Japan, Hong-kong, and the Philippine Islands are included in the list.

More than 2,000 American civilians remain in the family area and about 1,000 are still in Shanghai. The present exchange is understood to have taken most of the American population from Japanese occupied areas north of Hongkong.

Five Tuleans were injured seriously and 24 others were treated for minor injuries last Friday afternoon in the 2nd major accident to occur within a week. They were Tatsu Kashima, Toshi Yamada, Kansaburo Sawada, Tom Nakao, and Takeshi Takagi.

It was learned unofficially here that Kashima, former Topaz first aid instructor for the adult education section, passed

away.

While speeding along about 30 miles an hour on the newly constructed highway to the project farm, a truck filled with workers turned over near the chicken farm when the driver attempted to pass a slowmoving truck, striking a soft-shoulder, causing the truck to turn over.

FINGERPRINES

All people remaining in Tule Lake 12 years of age and over must report to the high school to be fingerprinted and photographed in order that identification permit badges may be prepared for them, according to the asst adjutant general.

The vast majority of the residents have voluntarily complied with the original army requests.

STEWARD DIFS

Harold Dean Emerson, assistant project steward at the Tule Lake center was killed on the night of October 6 when his car collided with a train near the outskirts of Klamath Falls. Emerson worked at Gila before going to Tule Lake on March 5, 1943.

41 NOW SERVE IN US ARMY

Twenty local volunteers for Shelby and 5 for Savage who have been accepted are still awaiting call. Induction papers are now

ready for 4 others.

From 'the total number of volunteers, 40 were rejected and 8, status unknown. Recently added to the number of Topaz volunteers are 5 from Tule Lake. 3 of them have been accepted and 2 rejected.

Thirty with accepted or status unknown ratings have relocated, while 8 still remain in camp.
