TOPAZ PREPARES FOR ARMISTICE DAY OBSERVANCE

In commemoration of Armistice Day, Topaz will participate in a colorful ceremony of community-wide significance Thursday afternoon, under the auspices of the high school student body, it was announced this morning.

The outdoor observances will begin at 2 o'clock, prior to the football classic between the Ram preppers and Hillard high school of Fillmore.

Presentation of colors and the mass singing of the national anthem will open the afternoon program. The grid clash will start at 2:10 o'clock.

During half-time Charles F. Ernst, project director, will extend a message appropriate to the day, followed by a presentation of the World War veterans in the project.

The junior girls' chorus will offer one number. The varsity benefit drawing, featuring a first award of a convertible day-enport, will complete the observances.

AUTHORITATIVE RECORDS ON TULE LAKE RIOT EXPECTED

"We are expecting a carefully documented statement on what happened at Tule Lake in the very near future," declared Leland Barrows, acting WRA head in a wire to Charles F. Ernst yesterday.

"We will send you a copy of this statement as soon as it becomes available. At present our information here is fragmentary but certain facts have been established Monday. Last week while Myer was meeting with the evacuee committee at Tule, a

crowd formed outside the administration building on the misunderstanding that he was to make a speech.

"Myer discussed the proposal with the grievance committee for 2½ hours and made no concessions.

"Then he spoke to the crowd over a public address system emphasizing that requests would be given every consideration, but that the WRA would not listen to demands.

"At the conclusion of his speech, the crowd disappeared and returned peacefully to their quarters.

"Meanwhile, 15 evacuees had gone to the hospital and had engaged in an altercation with Reece M. Pedicord, chief medical officer. Dr. Pedicord struck one of the evacuees and was beaten, but not severely.

"The situation Tuesday and Wednesday is not yet clear but apparently tense and calm prevailed.

"Thursday night a group of about 400 evacuees moved into the warehouse area and surrounded the home of Project Director Best. En route, certain members of this crowd beat Edward H. Brobeck, internal security officer, at 9:45 PM.

"Best called Col. Verne Austin and asked the army to take over the center. The army has been in full control ever since and the situation is now calm. According to Cozzens, San Francisco regional chief, no tear gas has been used at any time. We are not yet certain whether any evacuees have been injured.

"For your information, several members of the WRA staff at Tule became badly frightened under the situation and may be responsible for some of the statements which have appeared in the press."

JOB ADVANTAGES AT PEAK IN N.Y.

Since arrivals in New York have greatly fallen off, the relocation office there will be able in the interim to give increased personal attention to individual cases, it was learned recently.

"Sound placements at top skills are being made in most cases on basis of referrals and interview after arrival," the New York office stated. Residents with EDC clearances are urged to follow this placement procedure, although queries regarding specific types of openings are also invited.

WORKERS TO VIEW NOV. 11 PROGRAM

All project resident employees, exclusive of a few in essential jobs, will be excused from work Thursday afternoon to attend the Armistice Day observances, said James F. Hughes, deputy director.

Inasmuch as the WRA has not authorized a holiday, Hughes stated that workers will be docked on compensatory time. Those with no over-time hours will be required to work Saturday afternoon.

RECRUITER PRINTING FIRM TO SEND AGENT

Takayoshi Karakane, representative of the Cuneo Press Company of Chicago, will arrive in Topaz Friday to recruit 100 workers, according to Emil Sekerak of the relocation office.

Of the 5600 persons now employed by the company 20 are nisei.

Nisei employees will be housed in a 35-room hotel which has been leased by the firm. Wages for men will be \$27.50 to start and up to \$36.85 at the end of the 8th week. Women will be paid \$20 to start and \$22 at the end of the 4th week.

FBI RELEASES NISEI WOMEN "SPOONERS" WITHOUT CHARGES

TRINIDAD, Colo.---Five Japanese American women, jailed for investigation after snapshots were published showing some of them embracing nazi prisoners of war, were released last week by the FBI.

"No charges have been filed against the women," R. J. Brandt, FBI agent at Denver explained. "It is not possible for us to hold them indefinitely

SHOE STAMPS

#18 AND #19 ARE NOW AVAILABLE

Shoe ration stamps #18 and #19 are now being issued, the ration office stated today.

Stamp #18 is valid indefinitely and #19 is effective from November 1 to May 31, 1944.

Since stamps are renewed only under unusual circumstances, the residents are advised not to apply for shoe ration tickets unless they are planning to use them within 30 days.

JOE YOSHINO GETS ARMY DISCHARGE

Joseph K. Yoshino, a volunteer for the nisei combat team from Topaz, has been honorably discharged for transfer to the enlisted reserve corps by the War Department for a six months' period since October 19, 1943, according to word received here yesterday.

Yoshino was released by the army so that he would be able to return to the Merchant Marines of which he is a junior engineer.

Yoshino, who is now in Salt Lake City, is awaiting transportation to a port of embarkation.

The untested CES Bees shellacked the Co-op octet, 24-12, Saturday afternoon.

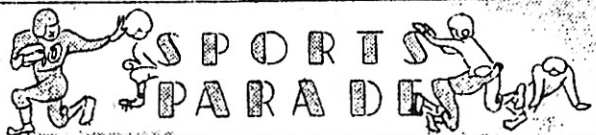
