CENTRAL FILE OF PROJECTS TO BE MOVED HERE

Entrusted with the compilation of records required by the relocation planning division in Washington, Topaz will begin work on the master file of the 10 relocation projects late this month, according to James F. Hughes, deputy project director, this morning.

Under Washington supervision, 50 resident employees will collect data on forms 26, original leave application blanks, arrival and departure notices, and bring up to date much back work. The work, normally done in Washington, was detailed to Topaz because of the deficiency of office space and personnel.

Evelyn Rose of the Washington WRA staff will be here Monday to supervise the program. She directed the master file unit at Tanforan last year.

Applications for clerical workers on the master file are being accepted at the placement office, Hughes said.

TRAINING COURSE FOR FOREMEN SET

Foremanship training classes for evicuee and appointed personnel will begin next Tuesday as the second vocational training course to be established, Dr. L.C. Bane announced today.

Rodney Ashby and Mr. Crawford from the state vocational training department will teach the course of five two-hour sessions. Classes will meet at 2-11-B. Residents will attend classes from 9 to 11 AM and appointed personnel from 3:45 to 5:45 PM.

Enrollment for each class will be limited to 20 students and 4 additional persons with bi-lingual ability.

To determine if 2620 employees will be sufficient to carry out maximum project maintenance, Topaz will give reasonable trial to the employment quota decreed by Washington, it was announced today by James F. Hughes, deputy director.

The action followed a suggestion made by the national WRA director, Dillon S. Myer, during his visit here last month. Myer declared that if 2620 workers proved incommensurate to the task, consideration would be given for more workers.

Reductions have already been made in some units and others are in the process of being slashed.

A summary of studies based on the minimum requirements by sections will be submitted this afternoon to Hughes by the council.

460 FARM TURKEYS TO BE KILLED FOR THANKSGIVING DAY DINNER

Four hundred sixty turkeys of the present 1260 flock will be killed for Thanksgiving, it was revealed today by Wendell Palmer, chief of the agricultural section.

The killing will begin next Tuesday at the rate of 100 per day by the commissary department. The average weight of each dressed turkey will be 13

pounds.

Palmer stated that credit should be given to Rikemon Yamane, foreman, and his poultry section crew for their fine work in raising the turkeys. Only a few birds were lost and the flock is exceptionally healthy, he added.

More turkey will be killed for Christmas and New Year's dinners.

Stir in $\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. margarine quickly. Pour onto $1\frac{1}{2}$ qts. popped corn slightly salted, or use puffed rice. Delicious!

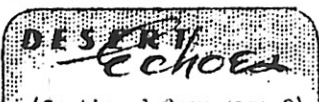

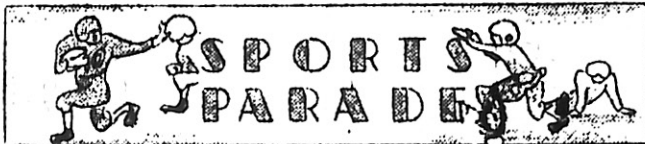
Winners of both matches will play for the championship tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

TOPAZ THRASHES FILLMORE FOR SECOND TIME, 13 TO 6

The Topaz Rams, after being held scoreless in the first half, unleashed its scoring juggernaut in the second half to thrash the lumbering Fillmore prep eleven, 13 to 6, Thursday afternoon at the local gridiron before 2000 spectators. In the first engagement two weeks ago, the Rams crushed the Eagles, 18 to 8.

The first touchdown came in the opening minutes of the 3rd spasm after a 55 yard march. On a punt return, diminutive Tak Kubota, behind bruising blocking, rattled off 25 yards from his own 45 to Fillmore's 29. A pass to Yosh Yamada netted 8. Mike Mayeda, end, carried the hide for 12 more yards to the 9 and a first down. Two line plunges sent the ball to the five yard line. Tony Kimura plunged to the 1 yard mark.

On the next play, Harry Kitano handed the pigskin to Roy Harano who gave it to Yamada who packed the melon through right end for the initial tally. Hisa Sano passed to Yamada in the end zone for the extra point.

Just before the gun spouted for the end of the 3rd stanza, Yosh Yamada re-

turned a punt 20 yards to Fillmore's 49. Kitano, Sano and Harano took the ball to the 23 yard stripe in 5 plays. After Harano made a yard on a line buck, Kitano tossed a perfect strike to Yamada in the end zone for the Rams' 2nd and final score. Topaz failed to convert.

Topaz practically gave Fillmore's only score away on a silver platter. This unearned touchdown came in the final minutes of the game when, after an exchange of punts, Topaz fumbled the ball on its 6 1/2 yard line. Fillmore recovered and made its tally in four plays.

Yosh Yamada, stellar back, was taken out of the game in the first period with a sprained ankle. He went in 5 minutes later, well-taped, and was responsible for the 2 scores.

Socks Yoshida, fullback, who is now walking on crutches, played in the Fillmore clash with a chipped ankle. He received the injury in the Delta fracas. He was outstanding in the Wasatch tilt last week, despite the injury.

Best linemen on the field, according to line-coach Hash Hashiguchi, were Yosh Takakuwa, Ky Tanamachi and Mae Yoshida. Backs Harry Kitano, Roy Harano and Yosh Yamada were brilliant, both on offense and defense.

Co-captains of the tilt were Willy Hamada and Harry Kitano.
