AG CHIEF HERE TO DISCUSS 1944 FARM PROGRAM

E. H. Reed, head of the WRA agriculture section in Washington, is in Topaz to confer with the farm and mess management section on Topaz's 1944 agriculture program.

Expansion of the livestock program, particularly beef, reduction of truck crop acreage and concentration on the relatively few crops demonstrated this year as productive are contemplated, Reed declared. All crops subject to frost damage will be eliminated.

Such crops as cabbages, onions and daikon will be stored for consumption during the winter.

According to Roscoe E. Bell, assistant project director, fall preparations are already underway. Plowing is progressing satisfactorily, he said.

Reed is visiting all the centers to determine their needs for self sufficiency.

2 TRANSFEREES RELATE ACCOUNTS OF RECENT TULE OCCURRENCES

Arriving here Saturday afternoon with 55 other transferees from Tule Lake was Tom Nakao, 20, one of the victims of the recent truck accident at that center. Nakao is still recovering from the mishap at the local hospital.

When interviewed by a staff reporter, Nakao stated the accident which caused injuries to 32 persons occurred about 1½ miles northwest of the project on October 15. The accident, considered as one of the factors which led up to the strike, hap-

pended when the truck attempted to pass a slow moving car and overturned on a soft shoulder. One of the more seriously injured, Nakao received cuts on his head and a fractured collar bone.

Another transferee, Miss Hisako Narahara, 35-4-B, stated that the last group of transferees including those to Minidoka, Topaz, Granada and the 2 Arkansas centers was ordered to leave on an hours notice. Military guards, tanks and armored trucks patrolled while they prepared to depart.

Miss Narahara declared that many of the newspaper accounts of the Tule situation were exaggerated considerably.

San Francisco voters last week ended the 13-year regime of Mayor Angelo J. Rossi and elected into office shipowner Roger D. Lapham. Board chairman of the American-Hawaiian Steamship Co., Lapham, despite opposition from the Hearst papers and organized labor, won by an appreciable plurality.

In nearby Salt Lake City, Mayor Ab Jenkins, famed speed record holder, lost out to Earl Glade, vice president of radio station KSL.

Two new investigations of the Tule Lake situation were in the offing last week as the California state senate investigating committee completed hearings of testimony and advised that military control be continued at the center.

3 CATTLE FEEDLOCKS TO BE CONSTRUCTED

Plans are being made to construct 3 feedlocks on the cattle ranch, according to the agricultural section.

About 500 head of cattle will feed in the new feedlocks during the winter when grazing in the fields becomes impossible, it was reported.

Under orders from Attorney General Francis Biddle the FBI is expected to begin an investigation of conditions at Tule prior to the disturbances. If the FBI probe should disclose any violation of federal law, "prompt prosecution action will be taken," Biddle stated.

Concurrently, Representative Clair Engle, whose district embraces Tule Lake, demanded a congressional investigation of the camp and its management by the WRA.

Testimony before the senate group by WRA employees included charges that the Japanese controlled the camp, intimidation of the appointed personnel, and wasted food and material.
