AUDITORIUM TO BE COMPLETED THIS MONTH

Completion of the auditorium proper of the new high school gymnasium has been scheduled for the middle of this month, it was announced today by George Shimamoto, construction engineer of the public works division. Lockers, showers and other auxiliary rooms will be finished in January, it is anticipated.

Backstops for the 48 x 84 feet basketball court have already been erected. Four additional backstops for practice shooting have been set up on the side.

DRIVERS' COURSE OPENS MONDAY

materials and fuel during the months ahead.

Coal, electricity, food, supplies, materials and motor vehicles will fall under the scope of the national plan to pay more heed to economy and to conserve the supplies already at hand.

Though an ample supply of coal is available for emergency purposes, future deliveries may be reduced or stopped for a critical period.

Block managers are working on a system of block lighting that should result in a reduction of electricity consumption.

Inasmuch as there will be frequent seasonal shortages of food items, acceptable substitutions will be used. Residents should be considerate of the steward, the chefs and their problems.

Hughes warned that much of the equipment used in project operations cannot be replaced regardless of essential need, so the operators should keep it serviceable.

Gasoline supplies will be progressively slashed to an absolute minimum consistent with need. Passenger cars and trucks may not be used beyond the requirements of official business under penalty of withdrawal from service for lack of fuel.

BLOCK 38 FIRE

The fire department was called out last night at 10:30 o'clock to extinguish a fire in the block 38 boiler room. The blaze originated when soot in the chimney caught fire. No damage was caused.

CCC BUILDINGS ARRIVE HERE FROM CALLIO

Twelve CCC buildings were dismantled and transported to Topaz from Callio, approximately 90 miles northeast of the center, according to Roy Potter, transportation and supply officer. They will be used to house the churches, internal security office and field kitchens for the agricultural workers.

The transportation of these buildings by the motor pool, public works and agriculture workers began in October and was completed this week. The men are currently cleaning the area and checking equipment.

The majority of the dismantled buildings are being stored at the high school plaza. Others are at the project farm.

Foreman Training Now In Practice

Residents, who attended the foremanship training classes from November 16 to 20, are being given the opportunity to apply their training to their respective jobs, said James F. Hughes, deputy director.

He stated that the success of the course is not yet known. At present, the section heads are giving more responsibility to those students of the foremanship training classes so that they can make use of what they have learned.

In anticipation of the coming holiday season, the community enterprises section has ordered approximately 500 Christmas trees and 4500 pounds of hard candy for the canteens, it was reported today. Greeting cards were on the counters today.

The Co-op pointed out that arrival of the order could not be guaranteed inasmuch as acquisition and transportation difficulties would need to be faced. Some gift merchandise, including some toys, will be available, it was reported.

VOLLEYBALL LEAGUE RULES ARE GIVEN

Briefly, here are highlights of rules followed by the local volleyball leagues:

A game will be played on a 30' x 60' court divided by an 8-foot high net. 21 points will make a game and an official match will be for 2 out of 3 games.

Captains shall toss for choice of court or service before the game.

Server must stand outside of the right one-third of the court. If a foot fault occurs (stepping on or over the line during act of serving) side out is called.

It is not essential for the entire ball to be in a player's side of the net before he plays it.

Ball striking boundary line is good.

Each team is required to bring a referee, a head lineman and a scorekeeper.



FIRST VOLLEYBALL LOOP GAMES SET FOR SATURDAY

The long awaited volleyball leagues will begin this week and with 27 teams vying for championship honors. The teams will be divided into 2 leagues, Northern and Southern.
