PIPELINE WORK ON JASPER AVE TO START SOON

To facilitate the main water "line" replacements along Jasper Avenue from December 13 to 18, it will be necessary to turn off the water in 9 blocks, according to the engineering section.

Blocks to be affected include 16, 22, and 23 for 3 days, and 19, 20, 26, 27 and 28 for possibly four days. Three tanks will be provided to permit the normal operation of the mess halls affected by the closing of water lines. The latrines and showers in these blocks will be closed during the time water is shut off.

Every effort will be made to reduce the shut off time to a minimum. However, normal road traffic will be disrupted because of the open trenches in this area. Two shifts will be worked during daylight hours with a possible additional night shift. Men will be trained in the warehouse area before beginning the Jasper Avenue job to expedite the work. Three days shut off time will be necessary to make connections from service lines, fire hydrants, and north and south 6 inch lines in each block.

UTAH EDUCATORS TO OPEN MEET HERE TOMORROW

SIGNAL CORPS WANTS 75 NISEI

The Signal Corps of the US Army in Chicago has openings for 75 to 100 nisei as warehousemen under Civil Service. No Joint Board clearance is needed and civil service rating and all rights are granted without any previous rating.

The warehousemen, whose work will be loading and unloading radio and telephone equipment at the Signal Corps warehouse, will receive 68¢ an hour to begin, with eight hours overtime per week at time and a half. Men who work on the day shift will work on the night shift on the following month.

Emil Sakerak of the relocation office emphasized that this is a civilian job and will directly help the war effort. Apply at once to the relocation office for further details.

HUBBARD HURT IN TRENCHER MISHAP

Clarence Hubbard, operator of the trencher, lost his right hand last Friday when his shirt sleeve became entangled between 2 gears, mashing his hand.

The accident occurred about 2 miles east of the camp while Hubbard was operating the trencher at the farm. He is now recovering at the center hospital.

CES TO CO-ORDINATE CHRISTMAS PROGRAM

The CES will be in complete charge of the center's Christmas program.

A meeting of representative resident groups was held to plan holiday activities. However, the CES has decided to initiate the entire program due to the shortage of time.

Twenty state principals and superintendents are expected to arrive in the project tomorrow to attend the southern Utah school administrators' association meeting here.

The educators will be in Topaz from 11 AM. After a two-hour tour of the center they will be welcomed at a luncheon prepared and served by the high school domestic science class at dining hall 32.

The luncheon program will feature musical presentations from the high school students. Charles F. Ernst, project director, will extend greetings.

Truman Swallow, superintendent of the Kane county schools, will preside over the business session which will begin at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

VOLUNTEERS NOW PUT IN RESERVES

Volunteers to Camp Shelby will hereafter be assigned to the Enlisted Reserve Corps subject to call for training following induction in Salt Lake City, it was learned this morning. The War Department action is not inclusive of volunteers to the Camp Savage military language school.

Yoshiro Matsubara and George Yoshioka, called within the past two weeks for induction at Fort Douglas, are the first two topaz volunteers to be placed in reserve, according to the Millard county draft board. The two are back in the project pending call to Camp Shelby.

NSRC MEETING TO DECIDE ON REDUCTION OF WORK

Whether the National Student Relocation Council will be dissolved next March or will continue its program on a modified scale will be determined at the quarterly session of the full council late this month, it was learned from NSRC headquarters in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

According to C.V. Hibbard, director, only the full council has the authority to change the decision made on September 29 this year that the NSRC would work toward a sharp reduction of operations not later than March 1, 1944.

Organized with the approval of the War Department to assist students evacuated from west coast war zones, the NSRC reported that only 17 per cent of last year's graduates applied. It is argued that the council's services are not needed by a sufficiently large number of students to warrant the present concentrated activities of the group.

Students considering education on the upper level should stop hesitating in applying, provide the required information and instruct the council on how to aid them in obtaining whatever academic goal they may have in mind, said Hibbard.

PROJECT TO GET CHRISTMAS TREES

Negotiations are being made with the landscape department to secure Christmas trees for the dining halls, school rooms, hospital wards and other places, according to Tuts Nakamoto of the CES.

He stated that these trees will be obtained from nearby mountains when clearance is given by the forestry service. The trees will range in size from 3 to 8 feet. Two or three large ones will be placed in front of the auditorium.

EGG PRODUCTION TO INCREASE

The project's 1500 hens will soon be producing about 2 cases of eggs per day, according to the agricultural section.

Attempts are being made by the poultry unit to step up its program for next year by increasing the number of laying hens to about 6 or 7 thousand. Chicks and laying poultts will be ordered very shortly.

The poultry unit may enter chicken meat production next year, it was stated.

To place more concentration in egg production, turkey production will be decreased next year to supply meat for only one holiday meal.

tracts made with private manufacturing or service firms shall carry a clause barring racial discrimination in hiring employees.

Under the terms of this order, all persons contracting with the government will be required to adhere to this clause which prohibits discrimination against any employee or applicant for employment on account of race, creed, color, or national origin. Sub-contractors as well as principal contractors, must comply with this clause.

The President issued such an executive order some time ago; this order was interpreted by Comptroller General Lindsay Warren as being a directive and therefore not mandatory. In a letter addressed to Attorney General Francis Biddle, however, the President made it clear that the order was mandatory and must be incorporated in all government contracts.

In his letter to the attorney general, the President said, "The prosecution of the war demands that we utilize fully all available manpower and that the discrimination by war industries against persons for any of the reasons named in the order is detrimental to the prosecution of the war and is opposed to our national democratic purposes.
