RELOCATION TEAM TO VISIT CENTER IN MID-FEBRUARY

A relocation team composed of representatives from Washington, DC, and relocation field offices will arrive here on February 14 for a 3-day visit, according to an announcement made today by Charles F. Ernst, project director. The group is making a tour of all the centers.

During their visit, the relocation team will show motion pictures on relocation and will hold mass meetings to explain the different districts and areas open for relocation.

To arrange for publicity for the visiting team, Oscar Buttedahl of the Washington, DC, reports division will arrive on February 4. He will be accompanied by a representative of the St. Louis relocation office.

The announcement of the reinstatement of selective service as applied to Japanese Americans should not be the occasion for their return to relocation centers if they have already relocated, John H. Provinse, acting WRA director, teletyped to Charles F. Ernst, project director, Friday.

CLARIFICATIONS MADE AT MEET

Several points regarding funeral charges were cleared up in a talk between Mr. Nichol of the Delta funeral parlor and the Reverends Nishimura and Okayama of Topaz, according to the community council today.

It was decided that residents of Topaz will have free use of the funeral parlor; that there will be charges for flowers only, not including other charges; and that an itemized bill be made.

Provinse said that "the induction of the eligible men will be gradual and will take place over a considerable period of time."

"After a man passes his physical examination making him eligible for induction there will be a period of 10 to 90 days in which he can arrange his affairs and visit relatives and friends if he so desires.

"In most cases this period will be at least 3 weeks. It is at such a time that a man about to be inducted might properly consider returning to the center for a visit, but to do so now would be exceedingly inadvisable.

"WRA relocation supervisors are instructed to adhere to the present policy governing return to the center and are advised that the desire to return to await a call from the selective service board is not to be considered sufficient basis for approving readmission.

"Project directors are advised to accept persons only as paying visitors returning to centers without proper approval of the relocation supervisor or officer," Provinse concluded.

TULE CO-OP TO SEND CHECKS TO MEMBERS APPEALS BOARD IN TULE LAKE TO BE ESTABLISHED

Certificates of indebtedness of the Tule Lake Co-operative Enterprises, Inc., for the period ending June 30, 1943, are now ready for redemption, according to the Tule Co-op board of directors.

Redemption checks will be mailed to members of the Tule Lake Co-op. Upon receipt of checks members are requested to return certificates of indebtedness duly signed.

Persons who wish to terminate their membership may do so by returning their membership cards. Membership fees will be refunded upon receipt of cards.

The board of directors also emphasized that former Tuleans should notify the Co-op of their present address as checks cannot be mailed without this information.

MIYAMOTO, EX-TIMES MEMBER, PASSES AWAY

Shiro Miyamoto, 31-11-A, passed away at the center hospital Saturday morning, it was reported today.

Miyamoto, former Japanese section staff member of the TIMES, is survived by his wife, Umeno, and 2 daughters, Hideko and Shigeiko.

Wake services will be held Friday from 7:30 PM and funeral services Saturday from 10 AM, both at the Catholic Church, rec 14.

Residents of Tule Lake who wish to be considered for transfer to other WRA centers will be allowed to present their cases before an appeals board soon to be established. The new board will be composed of prominent civilians, otherwise not associated with the WRA, and will include West Coast attorneys, businessmen, and civic leaders.

Individual cases will be heard by a 3-man panel which will meet at Tule Lake. Only evacuees whose

applications for leave have previously been denied may appeal to the board.

Repatriates, expatriates, and persons who answered the loyalty question negatively and whose leave clearance has not yet been denied will first be required to request further investigation and leave clearance.

If leave clearance is denied, such persons can then appeal to the board. The small group of persons who remained at Tule Lake after the completion of the segregation move solely because of their inability to travel will not be required to appeal their cases, but will be eligible for transfer to another center as soon as their health permits.

All persons eligible to appeal their cases will first file requests for reconsideration with the project director. After applications have been processed, such persons will be permitted to examine their own dockets to determine why leave clearance was denied them. They can then present evidence to the appeals board in defense of their request for reconsideration.

The need for such a board is apparent in view of the large and difficult task of segregating disloyal evacuees and the possibility that some injustice may have been done to a few loyal persons.
