STAFF TRAINING PROGRAM HERE BEING STUDIED

Possibilities for establishing a vocational training program in all centers patterned after the program now being used in Topaz are being studied this week by Winston Stevens of the civil sorvice commission in Washington and Harold James of the WRA personnel office. They arrived here Sunday.

James stated that the experiments being carried out here in using state and other vocational training facilities were more advanced than similar programs in other centers.

Stevens is now with the WRA on special detail to assist in planning a personnel training program.

The two will confer with division heads and evacuee supervisors on the problems and advantages of the vocational and staff training programs offered here. They are also studying a plan for training appointed personnel.

CURTISS CANDY CO. RECRUITERS SEEK WORKERS HERE

H. P. Scott, personnel director, and Harry Mayeda of the employment division, both of Curtiss Candy Co. in Chicago, arrived here last night. They will be in the relocation office recruiting workers until Thursday.

In addition to the factory, the company operates several farms. 15 men to do general farming in Marengo are needed, especially those above draft age or those ineligible for the draft. Housing, including heat, light and products from the farm, will be furnished each worker.

Women to wrap and box candy bars are also needed. Wages are on a piece work basis and workers may average from \$30 to \$35 weekly, Scott stated.

The Register published the photo as a method of calling to the attention of persons writing letters condemning Japanese Americans, that men of Japanese ancestry were fighting for democracy.
