## JEROME CENTER TO CLOSE IN JUNE -- ICKES

Plans of the WRA for the closing in June of the Jerome Relocation Center near Jerome, Arkansas, were announced Wednesday by Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes. Economy of operation dictated the move to close the center, it was indicated.

The relocation of 18,000 evacuees from the centers now make it possible to close Jerome without undue crowding, he said.

Secretary Ickes pointed out that the Jerome center was chosen as it was the last to be established, so development of physical facilities had not progressed as far as at some of the others: its population 6,554 as of February 1, is one of the smallest; and existence of the Rohwer relocation center only 35 miles away with a capacity of nearly 2,000 additional persons.

Jerome residents not relocated by June 1, will be moved to Rowher, Granada and Heart Mountain and possibly others if more space is needed.

## 101 Nisei At Minidoka Report For Physicals; 2 Refuse Order

Hunt, Idaho, Feb. 25-- A total of 101 American citizens of the Minidoka Relocation Center have reported this week for their preinduction physical examinations at Boise, Ida., according to John Bigelow, information officer at the center. An additional two men refused to answer the order to report and the federal authorities have been notified of their action, it was stated.

During the past few weeks, the committee has prepared a statement for Washington which recommends the placing of nisei draftees in combat units with other Americans rather than in a segregated Japanese unit. Recommendations will be sent to President Roosevelt, Secretary of War Stimson, Assistant Secretary of War John McCloy, Col. William Scoby of the Army General Staff, Major General Lewis B. Hershey, director of the Selective Service System, Secretary of Interior Harold Ickes, and National WRA Director Dillon S. Myer.

At present the group is composed of a board of directors who are two citizen representatives from each block. Temporary officers are Frank Yamasaki, chairman; Satoru Akutagawa, vice chairman; Seiko Yachi, secretary; Ken Shirashi, treasurer. ## HOUSE VETOES BILL ON DENATURALIZATION

The House of Representatives Wednesday rejected by a vote of 22 to 75 a bill which would mean that past expressions of disloyalty to the US would constitute renunciation of citizenship.

The House then passed a similar bill backed by Attorney General Biddle.

# NEW PROCEDURE OPENS WAR WORK TO MORE JAPANESE

Persons of Japanese ancestry may become eligible for employment in a war plant without a war plant clearance which has been passed by the joint board under a new procedure es-

tablished here recently.

Aliens as well as citizens may establish eligibility for war work by submitting a Personnel Security Questionnaire, obtainable at the local relocation office. These questionnaires will not be accepted unless a person has previously been cleared for indefinite leave. Persons applying should have necessary training for war plant work and a serious intention of accepting such employment.

The relocation program officer here will send the completed questionnaire to a WRA field office where an applicant is seeking employment. The relocation officer there will then canvass the various plants or other army establishments in his district in an effort to find an acceptable opening for the evacuee. When a suitable position is found, the offer will be transmitted to the center for the applicant's consideration.

The personnel security questionnaire must be approved by the security officer of the plant before an evacuee becomes eligible.

# Salt Lakers Air Views On Nisei At Two Meets

## WEST HIGH SCHOOL

In a meeting charged with verbal fireworks Monday night at West high school auditorium, Dr. John P. Lechner, a representative of the Americanism Educational League, Los Angeles, told a large audience of asserted Japanese subversive activities in the United States before Pearl Harbor.

Declaring he came to speak of the Japanese problem not from a racial, but from an economic, viewpoint, Dr. Lechner outlined activities of various Japanese organizations in allegedly promoting disloyalty and espionage, particularly in the west.

He declared that 2 months after Pearl Harbor, Salt Lake City was designated as the propaganda center for Japanese Americans and accused Mike Masaoka, former Salt Lake Japanese American now in the armed forces, of being the spearhead of the organization.

Dr. Lechner had no sooner ended his talk than a brother of Mike Masaoka, Joe Masaoka, leaped to the stage and asked for use of the microphone to challenge the accusations of the speaker.

The request was greeted with mixed reaction from the audience. The young Japanese American grabbed the microphone and held it, asking that the audience stay to hear his side of the question.

Dr. Lechner, flanked by a committee from the Salt Lake Federation of Labor, which sponsored the meeting, left the stage, and a large portion of the audience filed out of the auditorium.

Mr. Masaoka was greeted by cries of "Why don't you go back to Tokyo," and "Why aren't you in the army."

Others, a more predominant group, cried, "This isn't Germany, let him speak," and "Let's hear what he has to say."

The young Japanese American then defended the Americanism of his people crying, "I have five brothers in the army. They're fighting for my country and your country. There is more than one color in the American flag and there is more than one color in the American people. It's not the slant of a man's eyes, it's the slant of a man's heart that counts." He was greeted by cheer and a few boos from the audience.

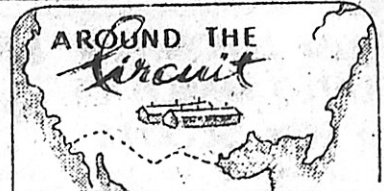
## NEWHOUSE HOTEL

Seeds of racial hatreds and riots already have begun sprouting in Utah, Salt Lakers were warned Monday night at a meeting of the Progressive Study club probing the racial question in this area.

Meeting in the Newhouse Hotel, approximately 250 persons overtaxed the gathering to hear officials of the WRA and a University of Utah anthropologist discuss the sociological implications of the growing race consciousness in the west.

Prof. Elmer Smith of the University of Utah, Dr. LeRoy E. Cowles, president of the University of Utah, John R. Lawson, War Manpower Commission representative, and Otis Peterson, regional WRA representative, upheld the right of Japanese Americans to full citizenship.

"I am very much concerned with the type of hysterical thinking in the Salt Lake and Ogden areas," Smith declared. "Here, the people are following a pattern of race tension that can only end in race riots. The attitude is one of hysteria. It is a non-objective, rabble-rousing approach to the question."
