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RELOCATION HEAD FIRST DRAFTIES TO LEAVE LEAVES TOMORROW WEDNESDAY FOR EXAMS FOR POSTON

William Kir-Stimon, relocation supervisor from Grand Rapids, Michigan, who has been in the center since February 17 will leave tomorrow for Poston, Arizona. He will do follow-up work after the departure of the relocation team visit there.

Kir-Stimon suggests that prospective relocators choose and relocate to specific areas rather than go out on a job offer. He states that there are many opportunities in the midwest for inexperienced young nisei to learn various trades while working as apprentices. There are openings for laboratory workers, nurses' aides, assistant librarians, dental technicians, machine operators, welders, auto mechanics, photographers, and clerical jobs, he said.

TRAINING PROGRAM VIEWED BY VISITORS

Harold James of the Washington WRA personnel division and Winston B. Stephens of the Civil Service Commission left today after a week's study of the center's vocational training program.

During last week, Stephens, who is with the WRA on special detail, conferred with resident supervisors and division and section heads to find the problems and needs for a staff training program applicable to all centers.

James expressed satisfaction in the response of supervisors and division chiefs in turning in personnel questionnaires which he will study to design a training program.

MANZANAR SENDS 459 TO TULE LAKE

Four hundred fifty-nine evacuees of the Manzanar relocation center were sent to the Tule Lake segregation center last Wednesday, it was learned today.

The group is the first of 1500 other Manzanar segregates who will be transferred soon. They will occupy the 10 blocks recently completed at Tule.

NISEI SOLDIERS PARTICIPATE IN INVASION OF MARSHALL ISLANDS

Japanese American soldiers from the United States and Hawaii participated in the invasion of the Marshall Islands and the successful capture of Kwajalein, Maj. Gen. Chas. H. Corlett, whose Seventh Army Division participated in the invasion, declared in an Associated Press interview dated Feb. 17 from the US Army headquarters in the Central Pacific.

Gen. Corlett, whose troops are veterans of Attu, praised the work of Japanese American specialists with the invading American forces. He said that these Japanese Americans were used as interpreters and translators.

The first contingent of Topaz residents who received orders to report for preinduction physical examinations will leave for Fort Douglas tomorrow at 1:30 PM. The relocation building will be used as a departure point.

The group includes registrants from coast boards including San Mateo, Menlo Park, San Francisco, Auburn, and Berkeley.

Following the examinations, most of the men will know whether they are rejected or accepted for service, according to Corlies Carter of the selective service office. Fort Douglas will notify the respective local draft boards of the results of the examinations.

Subsequent to the pre-induction physical examinations, those who are accepted will be called anytime after 3 weeks.

Carter stated that many of the men will remain in Salt Lake City on short term leave before returning here.

GRANADA NISEI PETITION RESTORATION OF RIGHTS

Japanese Americans in the Granada center in Colorado have submitted an 11-point petition for restoration of certain rights and privileges and have expressed their desire to meet the full responsibilities, it was disclosed Saturday by Dillon Myer, national WRA director.

The petition asked in addition to equal opportunity to serve in the military forces, the right of Japanese Americans to mingle with all other Americans, permission to travel unrestricted in the United States and its territories, and restoration of all constitutional rights that have been taken from citizens of Japanese ancestry since Pearl Harbor.

The petition also requested:

1. Government protection and economic means to begin life anew.
2. Clarification of voting status of those who have become of age since the evacuation period.
3. Opportunity for Japanese aliens who believe in the American way of life to acquire citizenship.
4. Adjustment of internees' wages to army standards.
5. Public enlightenment of differences between true Japanese Americans and Japanese aliens.
6. Admission of students of Japanese ancestry to American schools.

Nisei Soldiers In Italy Lauded For Splendid Fighting Ability

The Japanese American battalion, comprised of nisei soldiers from Hawaii, now serving with the Fifth Army in Italy is one of the finest units in the army, C. L. Sulzberger reported in the New York Times this week.

Despite 28 days of steady fighting in the battle of Cassino, suffering stiff casualties, the nisei soldiers are fighting with determination and dogged bravery, Sulzberger reports from the front lines.

The correspondent states that latest periodicals reaching the front indicate that an unfortunate type of "patriotism" is rampant among those who claim that all Japanese citizens should be barred, and "the only good Jap is a dead one."

It launched the first infantry attack right around Cassino getting ahead of the other units in its enthusiasm. It held a terrible Castle Hill sector.
