5 OPPOSE DRAFT WAR DEPARTMENT'S VIEWS AT HT. MOUNTAIN; ON NISEI DRAFT REVEALED HEADS BAFFLED

Federal authorities and WRA administrative staff members at Heart Mountain were said to be facing a baffling problem arising from the refusal last week of 5 members of the Fair Play Committee to appear for preinduction physical examinations, according to the Rocky Shimpo published in Denver, Colorado.

The members of the Fair Play Committee, the Rocky Shimpo wrote, have gone on record as opposed to positive action on the matter of nisei selective service until the citizenship status of American born citizens of Japanese parentage has been definitely clarified.

The article said that on the heels of this action, 2 members of the organization refused to appear for preinduction physicals last Monday. Tuesday morning, 3 more did not appear. They were said to have been questioned at their homes by officials and no action was taken.

"The replies offered by the 5 draft protestors seemingly have created a baffling problem and a delicate one," concluded the Rocky Shimpo.

The War Department's views regarding the recommendations of the Topaz Citizens Committee sent to Henry L. Stimson, Secretary of War, on February 26, were sent by Harrison A. Gerhardt, General Staff Corps, Executive to Assistant Secretary of War, to Frank Yamasaki, chairman of the Citizens Committee, last Saturday.

The clarifications received by the Citizens Committee were in the form of a copy of a letter originally

sent to Samuel D. Menin, counselor at law for the Heart Mountain Fair Play Committee, who had requested similar information from the Secretary of War.

The two letters signed by Lt. Col. Gerhardt are published in full below:

March 6, 1944

1141 MOTHERS SIGN PETITION

Undersigned by 1,141 women, the Topaz mothers' statement regarding selective service was sent to President Roosevelt and 5 other national figures last Saturday.

The others were Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, Atty. Gen. Francis Biddle, Chief Justice Harlan Stone, Secy. of War Henry L. Stimson, and Dillon S. Myer. Myer was asked to forward the statement to Secy. of Interior Harold Ickes.

son, Secretary of War, has been referred to this office. I note in your third paragraph that you desire an expression of opinion from the War Department regarding the status of Japanese American citizens now located in Heart Mountain, and the reason for discriminating against them by compelling them to accept service in branches of the armed forces where they are segregated. In so far as the War Department is concerned their citizenship status is determined by the laws of the United States as in the case of any other individual, and as such, citizenship status is not within the jurisdiction of the War Department.

I note further that you mention discrimination against Japanese American citizens on the part of the War Department by compelling them to accept service in certain branches of the armed forces. I should like to point out that the use of Japanese Americans in specific units is not based upon any discrimination policy. The assignment of personnel in the armed forces is based upon military considerations and not upon racial derivation. I should like to explain more fully some of the reasons which make it necessary at this time to assign these inductees to specific units.

The War Department does not consider it advisable to utilize Japanese Americans in the Pacific theater of operations. If a Japanese American unit were present in combat in the Pacific it would be possible for the enemy Japanese to secure American uniforms from dead soldiers and mingle with American Japanese units, thereby causing considerable confusion and increasing hazards of enemy infiltration. Should this occur it would jeopardize the American Japanese soldier inasmuch as his facial characteristics make it difficult to distinguish him from the enemy infiltrator. Again if a Japanese American were captured in the Pacific it is felt that retaliation measures taken by the Japanese would be in the form of extreme torture, since it seems apparent from past Japanese actions that such individuals might not be considered as prisoners of war.

If they were generally assigned to all units it would then be necessary to screen units which are to be employed in the Pacific theater before such a unit could be shipped. This would not only add an additional step in the present process but would tend to delay getting our units ready for combat and would fur-

ther result in disrupting the efficient operation of the combat unit by removing, in an advanced state of training, personnel from the organization. Since it is impossible to forecast, at the time an organization begins its training, in which theater of operations that particular unit will be used it would be uneconomical to assign Japanese Americans under a general assignment policy. It has therefore been deemed advisable to utilize this group in a homogeneous combat organization. It must be remembered that an organization such as a combat team includes units of Infantry, Field Artillery, Engineers, and Medical personnel in which there is a wide range of opportunity to employ various abilities and skills.

Certain Japanese Americans have been employed as interpreters in the Pacific theaters but this use has been made of Japanese American personnel with the full realization by the War Department of the risks involved to these individuals.

May I point out that the privilege of requesting assignment in a specific branch is, as you have pointed out in your letter, a privilege and not an obligation upon the War Department to see that these requests are always granted. It is impossible to comply with every assignment request which a candidate makes upon induction. It is the War Department's policy to assign an individual to the branch of service which he chooses if that is consistent with our military needs, since it is realized that this is one determinant in the process of proper assignment of personnel. However as the character of the war continues to change from defensive to offensive operations, the number of different types of units which are required will change in increasing measure. This necessitates a constant conversion of units from one type to another and in this conversion the wishes of the individual will often have to be subordinated to the overall military need.

I feel that the Japanese American Citizens who will now be inducted should accept their assignments, wherever they may be, with the spirit that they are fulfilling an obligation to their country and that largely upon their manner of performance will be judged the loyalty and sincerity of all American citizens of Japanese descent.

CARL SANDBURG SAYS MOST NISEI ARE LOYAL TO U.S.

CHICAGO, ILL. (Special)--Carl Sandburg, poet, in his Sunday column for the Chicago Daily Times last week averred that the majority of the Japanese Americans have been and will be loyal to the United States.

"The nisei," he said, "...American born Japanese whose tongues are more facile in the American than in the Japanese language, who have been pressed mainly in the American culture molds, whose thought control has been predominantly American, they prize the battle wounds taken by nisei in Italian fighting. They say 'We have sunk 25 Japanese ships in two days.' They say, 'What's buzz-in' cousin?' or 'What's knittin', kitten?' and they can make like any native born telling what mairzy doates is and how to cook it."

Sandburg said he had read from a missionary's letter that nisei who returned to Japan for schooling were often called "120 per cent Americans, because they made the 100 per cent Caucasian Americans seem mild....The lot of the nisei in Japan was not wholly a happy one. Their relatives and friends were bewildered and annoyed by these strange young people who looked like Japanese but acted and thought like Americans."

Declaring "there may be treacherous Japanese waiting under cover," Sandburg said, "but it may count in favor of the nisei that so far there seem to be no cases of treason or espionage or sabotage."

World Famous Poet Sandburg Employs Two Nisei Evacuees

Working for Carl Sandburg, world famous poet noted for his poems of Chicago and the Midwest, are two nisei, Kay Miyamoto of Jerome and Sunao Imoto of Poston.

Miyamoto is a caretaker of the Sandburgs' famous verdigrised Toggenburg and Nubian coats at Harbert, Mich., some 60 miles south-east of Chicago. Although he has worked there less than a month, Miyamoto said: "I'm accepted as one of the family. I live in their home, I share the family circle and listen to Mr. Sandburg read from his writings."

Miss Imoto has been Mrs. Sandburg's secretary for almost one year.

McWILLIAMS URGES FEDERAL PROGRAM

Declaring that a large measure of federal intervention is absolutely essential in solving the problems of America's racial minorities, Carey McWilliams, author and authority on race relations, called for an immediate federal program to deal with these problems in a lecture at Hampton Institute last week.

With the change in locale of the concentration of racial minorities in the US, McWilliams stated that it is gross fallacy to maintain that the racial minority problem is local.

SGT. HISAOKA, HERO OF ITALY WAR

Sergeant Gary Hisaoka, who recently defied death from the guns of German snipers to save a wounded major on a rocky hillside between Cassino and the abbey of Monte Cassino, is getting to be a sort of legend on the Fifth Army front, where the Japanese American 100th Infantry Battalion is among the US units engaged in the battle for Cassino.

One soldier was in a makeshift dugout when a shell exploded immediately behind it and buried him. It was Sgt. Gary Hisaoka of Hilo, Hawaii, who went over under fire, dug him out and sent him along to a hospital.



Miss Margaret Bland of the state department of public welfare's service division for the blind visited the center last Friday with the intention of providing a Braille training course for the residents who have impaired vision or who are totally blind. During her visit, she consulted with the administration, school, medical and welfare section officials.

Since the Jerome Relocation Center will be closed this June, the Jerome Co-operative Enterprises, Inc. launched their closing out or liquidation sale last week at the two canteens and the Dry Goods Store. The sale will be continued until March 31. Accounting for declaring customers' dividends has already started and will be continued after March 31 so that every patron will receive his dividends before the center closes.
