

THE CITY ISSUANCE OF CLOTHING ANNOUNCED

ALLOWANCES IN CASH PAYMENTS



Workers of the Community Welfare Division will initiate house-to-house visits regarding clothing allowances on Monday, Nov. 23, to determine basic family units necessary to compute each allowance.

Clothing allowances will be issued in cash payments. Eligible are those residents under the following categories:

- A. Employed--Workers, who have been employed at least 15 days of the preceding month, and their dependents.
- B. Unemployed--Residents who are able to work and are registered for at least 15 days with the Placement Office for work, but have not been placed, will be eligible for unemployment compensation and clothing allowances.
- C. Public Assistance Grants--Residents who, due to health, social or family situation cannot be employed, may apply for public assistance grant and for a clothing allowance.

The monthly allowance will be \$3.75 for each person 16 years of age or over, \$3.25 for persons from 8 to 16 years of age, and \$2.25 for persons under 8 years of age.

According to instructions from WRA Headquarters, the WRA and the WCCA are two separate agencies, and therefore, considerations of the past WCCA policies regarding clothing cannot be made in relation to the WRA. Although these allowances are retroactive to July 1, 1942, on a WRA work basis, inasmuch as no one is eligible for these grants at the Central Utah Relocation Center (as the first contingent arrived on Sept. 11), the initial grant will necessarily be in the form of assistance.

The initial grant will, therefore, equal the amount of the monthly clothing allowance which would have been due the resident (and his dependents), if he had been working since July 1st at any of the relocation

EARLY COMPLETION: Henry Watson, new senior engineer, today voiced the first assurances of an early completion of Topaz High School and Elementary School. After much delay due to priority rating and lack of construction contractors, Ray T. Woodhall, assistant engineer, secured lumber and material recently from the Regional Office in San Francisco.

All plans are being completed by nisei draftsmen. Regarding the abilities of the nisei workers, Watson enthusiastically praised a few as being equal if not superior to outside engineers and commended them for willingness and talent.

Watson recently stepped into the vacated position left by Lee J. Nofzger, who retired due to illness. Prior to his new position, Watson was irrigation and conservation engineer for the City.

Watson hopes to have the following projects completed as soon as possible: Administration dwellings, a huge community church, Engineers' and Agriculture buildings, a number of chicken brooding houses, hog pens, garage and repair shops, slaughter house, meat packing plant, bakery and other necessary buildings.

As soon as the rest of the priority rating is secured from San Francisco the work will begin in earnest to beautify the City.

AGRICULTURE

POULTRY CLASS: Alden S. Adams, graduate of the US/C of Logan and also in charge of vocational agriculture in Topaz, has arranged to give a class in poultry house construction and incubation tentatively every Friday at 2 PM at the high school.

Another class will be held on the same afternoon at 3 PM for those interested in hog feeding and the care of young pigs.

As soon as other enterprises are set up by the agriculture department, classes will be organized to study various types of farming.

FIELD VISIT: Thirty-six members of the poultry department and 12 high school students went on a field trip to visit several chicken and turkey farms in this county.

The group visited the Shephard Turkey Hatchery at Delta and saw the hatching machine in operation. They also went to the Shephard Turkey Farm which cares for approximately 15,000 chickens and turkeys. Joe Fidel's poultry ranch was also visited. Fidel is in charge of brick making at Topaz.



CO-OP SALE

Approximately \$19,000 worth of dry goods shipment is now at Delta, with \$30,000 more to be soon ordered for the canteen. In the shipment will be yarns, knitting needles and warm wearing apparel for all. A considerable assortment of drugs has arrived and is now on sale.

With the completion of election of representatives to Co-op in all blocks the newly selected group, hereafter to be known as the Co-op Congress, met for the first time Tuesday night. Walter W. Honderich, chief of community enterprises, was speaker at the meeting with 70 representatives present.

The Co-op membership drive has reached a total of 4328. A total membership of more than 5000 is expected with 8 more blocks to be covered.

The Co-op group in Rec. 12 is now taking orders for Montgomery Wards in addition to Sears Roebuck Co. It was stressed that ordering through the Co-op saves residents expenses in securing money orders and COD fees. A Montgomery Wards representative will consult with the Co-op staff next Tuesday. Those who wish may see him in Rec 12.

CERAMICS PLANT TO SUPPLY ARMY, WRA

A vitrified chinaware manufacturing plant to produce for the needs of the WRA and the U.S. armed forces has been acquired for Heart Mountain and is expected to be in peak production within five months, it was announced this week by C. E. Richardson, project director.

Plans are already under way for the construction of a 1000 square foot building on the project to house the plant. The first pieces of equipment are expected to arrive here about mid-December.

All the meetings, except the Sunday meeting opened to the public, will be closed sessions. WRA Director D.S. Myer will attend the conference.



Following this initial payment, regular clothing allowances based on the three categories listed above: employed and their dependents, those receiving unemployment compensation, or public assistance grants will be distributed monthly.

The regular monthly procedure will go into effect at once and will begin from Oct. 1st. Residents will be informed as to when and where to secure these allowances at a later date.





