Topaz Allotted 2776 Workers For 4th Quarter

Topaz has been allotted 2776 project employees for its fourth quarter employment quota, according to William Campbell, placement officer. In addition authorization was given by the Washington office for 100 apprentice workers at the \$12 wage scale.

"All sections and divisions were given the number of positions which they requested," stated Campbell.

He commented that contrary to the previous quarter, project employment will have a difficult time in replacing workers who relocate and those who are drafted in the future.

NIESSE APPOINTED ACTING PROJECT HEAD

Gilbert L. Niesse, finance officer, has been appointed acting assistant project director in charge of administrative management to fill the vacancy left by the departure of James F. Hughes last month.

Walter Honderich, chief of community enterprises, is acting supplies officer, replacing Roy Potter.

PROJ. DIRECTOR ERNST ADDRESSES CALIF. GROUPS ON WRA PROGRAM

"The people in California are so busily engaged in war that they rarely talk about the Japanese evacuees," stated Charles F. Ernst, project director, who returned here from a trip to California last week. COAST RACE MONGERS RAPPED BY SECY. ICKES

SAN FRANCISCO--Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes Thursday denounced "professional race mongers" who oppose the release of loyal Japanese-Americans from relocation camps and said Americans who oppose

decent treatment for "these citizens and loyal aliens don't believe in the constitution of the United States."

APPEALS FOR TOLERANCE

Appealing particularly to the people of California, Oregon and Washington, Ickes urged understanding and tolerance for the problems of the nisei. He said it would be "intolerable" that merely because they lived on the west coast before the war "they must be wards of the government one moment longer than the necessities of war require."

He promised that the WRA, the agency in charge of the camps over which he was recently given authority by President Roosevelt, would not "under my jurisdiction...stampeded into undemocratic, bestial, inhuman action and will not be converted into an instrument of revenge or racial warfare."

DEFENDS WRA

Defending the WRA's past activities, which have been bitterly criticized by a Dies congressional subcommittee and by certain groups on the west coast, Ickes declared its program has been handled with "discretion, humanity and wisdom."

The secretary of interior made his remarks in a formal statement issued while in San Francisco to speak before the Commonwealth Club Friday.

131 MEN LEAVE FOR PRE-INDUCTIONS

One hundred thirty-one Topaz draft registrants who reported to Ft. Douglas Thursday were given preinduction examinations yesterday. The group left on one bus and five trucks to Delta, where they boarded 2 special trains.

A complete report of the number of persons passing their examinations will be given next week.

Eleven residents who reported for induction on Wednesday were placed in the Enlisted Reserve Corps.

KIMBALL HERE

Solon T. Kimball, community organization advisor of the WRA in Washington, arrived here yesterday for a 6-day visit. He attended the community council meeting yesterday.

Ernst spent a week in California, speaking on the WRA program to groups in Sacramento, San Francisco, Santa Barbara, and Los Angeles. He stated that the news about nisei soldiers fighting in Italy always took prominence in all discussions.

Former employers of Topaz residents and other evacuees, whom Ernst met spoke highly of the character and work of the Japanese. They expressed hope that war would soon be over and that the Japanese would be able to return to the West coast.

CORNWALL SUPERVISES WRA FIELD OFFICE

A new WRA field relocation office was opened at Rochester, New York, last week, with Claude O. Cornwall, former Topaz relocation program officer, as supervisor.

The new branch is the third field office to open in New York. Others are located in Buffalo and New York City.

DISCRIMINATORY NON-DISCRIMINATION

Lt. Col. Harrison A. Gerhardt's answer to the community council's petition asking for universal application of the draft and induction into other branches of the service can be regarded only as a polite excuse for a discriminatory policy.

We grant that the War department has no policy of discrimination against Japanese American soldiers or any other racial group. The actual application, however, contradicts the policy. When Japanese Americans are assigned to specific units it is a type of discrimination which sets a precedent endangering our struggle for equality and tolerance.

Colonel Gerhardt explains that replacements are necessary for the 100th battalion and the 442nd combat team. These all-nisei units were formed and enthusiastically supported because they gave the Japanese Americans an opportunity to prove themselves good soldiers and loyal Americans. Their purpose is being fulfilled.

Replacements for the 100th battalion have been on a voluntary basis. It is reasonable to assume that enough nisei will volunteer as replacements. Caucasian officers have served with the units from their beginning. As long as it is a part of the American army, no harm can accrue from assigning other Caucasian American soldiers as replacements.

The danger of infiltration of Japanese soldiers if the nisei are used in other units that are sent to the South Pacific area is cited by Colonel Gerhardt. By that same reasoning, it would seem that Italian American soldiers would not be used in the Italian campaign...German American soldiers would not be used against the Germans...Caucasian American officers would not be used in the all-nisei units. The danger of infiltration will be present in any theater of war.

Colonel Gerhardt points to the special risks of Japanese American soldiers in the South Pacific area if they should be captured by the Japanese. He said they would be exposed to dangers beyond the normal hazards of war. The Japanese American soldier does not ask to be spared any hazards. War, in all its aspects, is brutal.

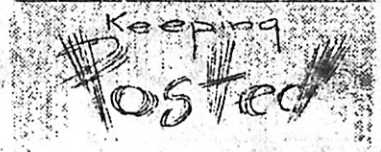
The "extra hazards" are a small price to pay for an opportunity to discredit the prejudiced statements of Commander Melvin H. McCoy's slur against Americans of Japanese ancestry. When he dishonors our heroes in the 100th battalion who have given their lives for the United States with a statement, "They are killing white men. They would just as soon be killing Germans as other white men," no hazards are so great that we want to be spared them.

We will continue to be inducted and serve loyally in whatever assignment is given us for we are grateful for the opportunity to serve. However hard it is for us to accept assignment to segregated units, we look upon such limited service as better than no service at all.

There is no doubt in our minds but what nisei soldiers can and will prove themselves on any front and in any battle theater of the world.

It is apparent the War department still does not wholly understand the nisei--we look to the time when race will not be a reason for segregation.

COUNCIL GIVES STATEMENT ON BLOOD DONOR DRIVE

PAY CHECKS

NEW DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM INSTALLED

Under an experimental system, March pay checks are being distributed at work units by the finance division, according to Gilbert Niesse, finance officer.

Division and section heads will be told to notify their employees as to the time and place of distribution when their checks arrive. Workers will be expected to present their identification cards to receive their checks.

Persons who are ill or who are not present at the time of check distribution at their work units should call for them at the pay-station.

Plans are also being formulated for distributing clothing allowance checks, it was stated.

AG TO SPONSOR JAPANESE SHOW

Japanese entertainment, including drama and classical dancing will be presented in the auditorium tomorrow night from 7 o'clock, under the sponsorship of the agriculture section.

Most of the numbers on the program will be performed by members of the Topaz Engel Club and students of Madame Tachibana.

Invitational tickets have been distributed to the blocks, it was indicated.

FORTY RAILROAD JOBS OPEN FOR NISEI MEN

Forty jobs with the Spokane-Portland Seattle Railroad Company are now open to nisei men to work between Spokane and Pasco. The crew will start work as soon as 10 men are available. The workers will be paid 62 cents per hour for 9 to 10 hours a day.

Additional information on these offers may be obtained at the relocation building.

The community council this week clarified all misconceptions pertaining to blood donations to the local hospital, it was revealed in a report to the Topaz Times.

"The hospital is not asking for blood immediately," the report stated, but wants "to keep the volunteers' blood typed for emergencies".

Rumors to the effect that blood donated by the residents are going out of Topaz was found to be "entirely false" after a thorough investigation by the council.

Blood donors must be between the ages of 18 to 45 "but if a person is in good health he may be taken even if he has reached 50."

Those who are asked to donate their blood should rest 3 to 4 hours right after the donation, according to Dr. Goto. It ordinarily takes 48 hours to regain normalcy.

"Although it was stated that the food in this camp is adequate, each blood donor will be given 4 ounces of whiskey and a steak dinner," the report said.

All residents are urged by the council to help by donating blood for patients.

The bride, a former Berkeley resident, is studying religious work at Scarritt College. Her husband is the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Soji Mita, 3-9-A, former Sacramento residents. He is stationed at Fort Blanding, Florida.

After completing her studies, Mrs Mita is planning to work with the YWCA.

SSAF COMMITTEE TO SPONSOR "MRS. MINIVER" YBA MEMBERS HOLD ELECTION OF OFFICERS

"Mrs. Miniver" starring Greer Garson and Walter Pidgeon will be sponsored by the Student Scholarship Aid Fund next Thursday and Friday in the auditorium, according to Sasato Yamate, chairman. Tickets are 25 cents and may be obtained at the high school. Refreshments will be sold between the reels.

The movie will be the first activity of the Fund to raise \$5000 to help 50 January and June graduates to go to college. Each person will receive \$100. Last year, 29 graduates from the class of '43 entered colleges with this assistance.

Tentative plans have also been made by the SSAF committee for a Japanese movie, a food and game carnival sponsored by the PTA, YWCA and the Girl Scouts, and a city-wide Fourth of July carnival similar to the one held last year.

FIRST NISEI CHAPLAIN JOINS COMBAT TEAM

CAMP SHELLEY, MISS.--1st Lt. George Aki, first mainland Japanese American to be commissioned a chaplain in the US Army, reported for duty to the Japanese American combat team last week.

Chaplain Aki, a Congregationalist minister, received his commission while serving in the Jerome center, Arkansas, last January. He reported to the Army Chaplains' School in Cambridge, Massachusetts, in February for training. Upon completion of his course, he was assigned to the combat team.

He graduated in absentia from the Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, California, after his evacuation to Tanforan. Rev. Aki was ordained as a minister in June, 1942. From Tanforan he was moved to Topaz, then later to Jerome.

A graduate of the Fresno State College in 1939, Chaplain Aki married the former Miss Masako Iijima of Oakland, California. His wife is now in St. Louis, Missouri.

At 29, Lieutenant Aki is the youngest of four chaplains assigned to the combat team. The others are Captain Thomas E. West, senior chaplain, formerly of Virginia, and 1st Lts. Masao Yamada and Hiro Higuichi, both from Hawaii.

Nisei In Italian Campaign Stages One-Man Tank Destroyer Act

WASHINGTON--Two tanks painted on the helmet of an infantryman of the 100th (Japanese American) Battalion, serving with the Fifth Army on the Italian front, records a one-man mission against the German Army, according to the War Department.

The Japanese American, taking with him one of the bazooka rocket launchers, departed towards the enemy lines on a solo infiltration task in the Cassino area, and was able to crawl within effective range of two German tanks.

After he dispatched the first tank with a shot he became slightly excited and forgot to pull the pins from two projectiles he fired at the second target. But he quickly steadied himself and shot off the third rocket properly, getting his second tank.

Comrades in the Japanese American Battalion painted the tanks on the helmet of the "one-man destroyer outfit" in celebration of the dead.

SOCIAL SECURITY BOARDS AID RELOCATED EVACUEES

Relocated evacuees throughout the country have received aid in overcoming emergency conditions through state and local agencies co-operating with the social security board, according to information received from E.J. Utz, acting WRA director in Washington.

3 UNO BROTHERS FIGHTING FOR U.S.

Three Uno brothers, members of the US Army, vowed the death of their fourth brother, who is an officer in the Japanese Army. The three brothers learned through an article written by Royal Arch Gunnison, former newspaper correspondent who was imprisoned by the Japanese in the Philippines, that their brother, Kazumaro Uno, an officer in the invading army, said of them:

"My family, my brothers are dumb Americans. They are stupid enough to believe there is such a thing as equality for a race or creed in the United States."

The three Uno brothers issued a statement to Gunnison, stating, "We wish to inform you that the Jap officer--our brother--is a traitor to the American way of life under which he has enjoyed the benefits of education and freedom. We have pledged the destruction of him and all those like him."

Kazumaro Uno, who was educated in the US, went to Japan voluntarily, it was stated.

The majority of evacuees have been able to relocate successfully without any outside aid, but in the few cases where help was needed, former center residents found the social security board through its co-operating agencies able to provide prompt assistance in working out many of their problems.

For example, there was the case of a young lady who became seriously ill immediately upon arrival in a new community. Through a local agency co-operating with the social security board, hospital care was provided, and her job was kept open until she recovered and was able to return to work.

In another case, a young man reported for work and was given a physical examination which disclosed a serious condition requiring an immediate operation. Here again, medical care was given, living costs assumed, and other service provided until he could return to work.

This is not a new program, nor is it planned exclusively for evacuees. It is a part of a larger plan for helping persons in need who have been affected by certain restrictive action on the part of the federal government. Both aliens and citizens may receive such assistance.

Through this program of co-operation between the WRA and the social security board, help in emergencies has generally been provided to relocated residents from the centers on the same basis as to other residents of a community.

Further information on the program may be obtained at the welfare office or the relocation office. Those who have already relocated should write or visit the nearest WRA field office.

DRAFT REFUSERS MUST TAKE CONSEQUENCES--ACLU

"The men who have refused to accept military draft are within their rights, but they of course must take the consequences. They doubtless have a strong moral case, but no legal case at all," stated a letter from Roger N. Baldwin of the American Civil Liberties Union to Kiyoshi Okamoto, one of the organizers of the Mt. Mountain Fair Play Committee.

Other points covered by Baldwin were:

1. Men who counsel others to resist military draft are within their rights and must expect severe treatment, whatever justifications they feel.

2. There is no point at the moment in bringing another test case involving the leave regulations. Miss Endo's case raised the right of detention and the validity of the leave regulations, and is already before the Circuit Court of Appeals. It may possibly be that a criminal prosecution for violating the leave regulations might raise the issue in another form; but our lawyers doubt it.

3. We intend to get a suitable case to test the methods of determining disloyalty and therefore the detention of a large number of American citizens without trial.

Baldwin further wrote that "You fellows certainly have a strong moral case, but it is not by refusing to comply with the requirement of the draft act. The only possible way such a small minority can get its rights is through the orderly process of the courts in test cases brought under the most favorable circumstances."

Ken Okauchi, group leader, reported that the weather conditions were fine and that all scouts were cooperative. The boys feel that the only way to learn scouting is through actual experience, stated Okauchi.

Inspired by troop 701's trip, other scout groups are planning to go on overnight hikes during the next few weeks, it was reported.
