DISCRIMINATORY NON-DISCRIMINATION

Lt. Col. Harrison A. Gerhardt's answer to the community council's petition asking for univerval application of the draft and induction into other branches of the service can be regarded only as a polite excuse for a discriminatory policy.

We grant that the War department has no policy of discrimination against Japanese American soldiers or any other racial group. The actual application, however, contradicts the policy. When Japanese Americans are assigned to specific units it is a type of discrimination which sets a precedent endangering our struggle for equality and tolerance,

Colonel Gerhardt explains that replacements are necessary for the 100th battalion and the 442nd combat team. These all-nisei units were formed and enthusiastically supported because they gave the Japanese Americans an opportunity to prove themselves good soldiers and loyal Americans. Their purpose is being fulfilled.

Replacements for the 100th battalion have been voluntary basis. It is reasonable to assume that enough nisei will volunteer as replacements. Caucasian officers have served with the units from their beginning. As long as it is a part of the American army, no harm can accrue from assigning other Caucasian American soldiers as replacements.

The danger of infiltration of Japanese soldiers if the nisei are used in other units that are sent to the South Pacific area is cited by Colonel Gerhardt. By that same reasoning, it would seem that Italian American soldiers would not be used in the Italian campaign...German American soldiers would not be used against the Germans ... Caucasian American officers would not be used in the all-nisei units. The danger of infiltration will be present in any theater of war.

Colonel Gerhardt points to the special risks of Japanese American soldiers in the South Pacific area if they should be captured by the Japanese. He said they would be exposed to dangers beyond the normal hazards of war. The Japanese American soldier does not ask to be spared any hazards. War,

in all its aspects, is brutal.

The "extra hazards" are a small price to pay for an opportunity to discredit the prejudiced statements of Commander Helvin H. McCoy's slur against Americans of Japaneso ancestry. Blood donors must be between the ages of 18 to 45 "but if a person is good health he may be taken even if he has reached 50."

Those who are asked to denate their blood should rest 3 to 4 hours right after the donation, according to Dr. Goto. It ordinarily takes 48 hours to regain normalcy.

"Although it was stated that the food in this camp is adequate, each blood donor will be given 4 ounces of whiskey and a steak dinner," the report said.

CAMP SHELBY; MISS .-- 1st Lt. George Aki, first mainland Japanese American to be commissioned a chaplain in the US Army, reported for duty to the Japanese American combat team last week.

Chaplain Akt, a Congregationalist minister, received his commission while serving in the Jerome center, Arkansas, last January. He reported to the Army Chaplains' School in Cambridge, Massachusetts, in February for training. Upon completion of his course, he was assigned to the combat team.

He graduated in absentia from the Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, California, after his evacuation to Tanforan. Rev. Aki was ordained as a minister in June, 1942. From Tanforan he was moved to Topaz, then later to

A graduate of the Fresno State College in 1939, Chaplain Aki married the former Miss Masako Iijima of Oakland, California. His wife is now in St. Louis, Missouri.

> This is not a new program, nor is it planned exclusively for evacuees. It is a part of a larger plan for helping persons in need who have been affected by certain restrictive action on the part of the federal government. Both aliens and citizens may roceivé such assistance.

Through this program of co-operation between the FRA and the social security board, help in emergencies has generally been provided to relocated residents from the centers on the same basis as to other residents of a community.

Nisei In Italian Campaign Stages One-Man Tank Destroyer Act

WASHINGTON -- Two tanks painted on the helmet of an infantryman of the 100th (Japanese American) Batta-lion, serving with the Fifth Army on the Italian front, records a one-man mission against the German Army, according to the War Department.

The Japanese American, taking with him one of the bazooka rocket launchers, departed towards the enemy lines on a solo infiltration task in the Cassino area, and was able to crawl within effective range of two

German tanks,

After he dispatched the first tank with al shot he became slightly excited and forgot to pull the pins from two projectiles he fired at the second terget. But he quickly steadied himself and shot off the third rocket properly, getting his second tank.

Comrades in the Japanese American Battalion painted the tanks on the helmet of the "one-man destroyer WRA field office. outfit" in celebration of the dead.

DRAFT REFUSERS MUST TAKE CONSEQUENCES - ACTU

"The men who have refused to accept military draft ere within their rights, but they of course must take the consequences. They doubtless have a strong moral case, but no legal case at all," stated a letter from Roger N. Balcwin of the American Civil Liberties Union to Kiyoshi Okamoto, one of the organizers of the Ht. Mountain Fair Play Committee.

Other points covered by Baldwin were:

1. Men who counsel others to resist military draft

are within their rights and must expect severe treatment, whatever justifications they feel.

2. There is no point at the moment in bringing another test case involving the leave regulations. Miss Endo's case raised the right of detention and the validity of the leave regulations, and is already before the Circuit Court of Appeals. It may possibly be that a criminal prosecution for violating the leave regulations might raise the issue in another form; but our lawyers doubt it.

3. We intend to get a suitable case to test the ties in Utah this week methods of determining dis- speaking on problems of lovalty and therefore the detention of a large number of American citizens without trial.

Baldwin further wrote that "You fellows certainly have a strong moral case, but it is not by refusing to comply with the requirement of the draft act.
