STATUS OF MEN IN ERC CLARIFIED

The following teletype which clarified the status of men in the Enlisted Reserve Corps was received here from John C. Baker, Washington WRA reports officer:

"Reurtt April 22. Men placed in Enlisted Reserve are under army jurisdiction and have no further responsibility to Selective Service. War Department representative states travel is permissible but commanding general of the service command should be notified immediately of change of address. When called to active duty each man will have transportation paid from point where orders are sent to his post of duty."

This headquarters has been authorized to take the applications of a total of 33 women citizens of the United States of Japanese ancestry for enlistment in the Women's Army Corps.

Women between the ages of 20 and 50 with the following qualifications are desired:

1 chief clerk, 1 file clerk, 1 clerk general, 3 duplicating machine operators, 1 clerk typist, 7 stenographers, 15 typists, 1 draftsman, 1 personnel NCO, and 2 proof readers.

Physical standards are the same as those prescribed for other applicants.

LEUPP CENTER TO BE REOPENED BY WRA

The Leupp center near Winslow, Arizona, will be reopened by the WRA about May 15 to take care of Japanese Americans who have been trouble makers at the Tule Lake segregation center in northern California, it was announced this week by Interior Secretary Harold Ickes.

Approximately 100 men most of them American citizens, who were arrested for taking part in a Tule disturbance November 4, and who have been confined in a stockade at that center, will be sent to Leupp.

In conclusion Miss Fair writes: "Last week Mr. Yamamoto, who does not lose courage easily was making another try at picking up the threads of his life. He was working on a vegetable farm in Bucks County, Pa. He was still hoping to call his family and send his kids to an American school."

WRA Powers Challenged In Mitsuye Endo Case

Five judges of the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeal in San Francisco in an unprecedented move have asked the Supreme Court for a definition of the powers of the WRA in holding loyal citizens of Japanese ancestry to help them in deciding on four questions raised in the Mitsuye Endo case, which seeks a writ of habeas corpus to force the WRA to release Miss Endo from Topaz.

Miss Endo first filed action against Milton Eisenhower, former director of the WRA, and the War-time Civilian Control Administration in 1943 soon after her evacuation to the Wallerua center. The writ of habeas corpus was denied on July 2, 1943, by Federal Judge Roche. From the Wallerua assembly center, she was moved to the Tule Lake center, and then to Topaz in a segregation movement last year. A former employee of the state of California, Miss Endo now resides at 39-9-D.

In her appeal from the Roche decision, Miss Endo charges that the WRA cleared her for an indefinite leave and then continued to hold her pending proof that she could be self-supporting after she left.

The four questions on which the case was carried to the high court by the San Francisco judges are:

1. Does the WRA have the right to confine a citizen after it has determined she is loyal to the United States until she can prove her ability to support herself?

2. Has the WRA the power to hold an American citizen without due process of law because she is of Japanese ancestry?

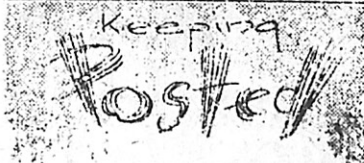
3. Can the WRA hold a citizen without giving her a hearing?

4. Can a citizen be compelled to report to the WRA after she has left the camp?

The Endo case is being sponsored by the American Civil Liberties Union. James Purcell of San Francisco will handle the case.

Other cases involving American citizens of Japanese ancestry have been placed before the Supreme Court. In two of them, the Hirabayashi and Yasui cases, the power of the government to enforce a curfew has been upheld.

In another case, Fred Korematsu, a former Topaz resident now relocated to Salt Lake City, questions the right to order segregation of American-born Japanese in an appeal now before the Supreme Court.

ICKES RAPS LA GUARDIA, BRICKER FOR RACIALISM

WASHINGTON, April 27--Interior Secretary Harold Ickes Thursday accused Mayor Fiorello H. La Guardia of New York City and two Republican governors, John W. Bricker of Ohio and Walter E. Edge of New Jersey of "racial discrimination" on the question of resettlement of Japanese Americans.

In a statement, the interior secretary said they have expressed a belief that law-abiding Japanese in this country are not entitled to the same privileges as non-Japanese, and said these opinions "seem ominously out of tune in a nation that is fighting for the principles of democracy and freedom."

"The mayor of New York City, who has fought long and vigorously for racial equality and justice, carrying the flag, must be shocked and disturbed to find the drummer boy from New Jersey on his left and the fifer from Ohio flanking him on the right. I cannot but believe that he has joined this company through accident and misunderstanding rather than by deliberate choice," he said.

Ickes accused Bricker "not only of prejudice but of disregard of the facts in a Los Angeles speech the Ohio governor made last week. He said Bricker was "trying to further his presidential aspirations" and that he "deliberately kicked the constitution in the teeth."

The secretary quoted Bricker as saying that after the war each west coast community should determine for itself whether people of Japanese ancestry should be permitted to return to their former homes, and of charging the WRA with releasing disloyal persons.

"The governor didn't know what he was talking about," Ickes declared.

He said La Guardia has protested against the relocation of persons of Japanese ancestry in New York City, "apparently on the theory that these people are dangerous and subversive."

15 MORE WORKERS NEEDED BY FARMER

CHICAGO--April 24. With the arrival today at the farm of Gerald A. Schraeder near Des Plaines, Ill., of five resettlers, the first group of seasonal workers under War Food Administration contract arrived in the North Central area. Schraeder owns and operates a 180-acre truck farm and raises principally, cabbage and carrots.

Because he was so favorably impressed in the 1943 season with the work of the four Japanese Americans whom he employed, Schraeder has increased his acreage for the 1944 season, has purchased additional equipment including a new tractor, and will employ 15 resettlers under seasonal contract this year.

Nisei In US Marines Have The Respect Of Their Buddies, Newell

CHICAGO--Lt. Robert J. Newell of the US Marines was interviewed by the Chicago Daily News recently of his 14 months of service in the South Pacific battle area with a unit of Marine Corps, combat military police. Lt. Newell, a Chicagoan, is quoted as saying:

"Yes--there are some Japanese who have not only the respect and admiration of US Marines, but are even their buddies.

"But these Japanese are Americans--American-born nisei and soldiers in the US Army, who have been serving with Marine detachments in the Pacific islands as interpreters and otherwise providing the leatherneck fighters with the benefit of their knowledge of enemy ways.

of the Marines because they are good American soldiers and we realized the risks they are exposed to in the event they are captured by the enemy," said Lt. Newell, who left the Marquette University where he was studying law in 1941 to enlist in the Marine Corps.

"As it was, these boys had a tough time of it," recalls Newell with a laugh. "Each one of them has been captured eight or nine times--by our own men. One day two of them were seized while standing in a Marine chop line, in their dungarees.

"It got to the point where finally, for their own protection, we had to detail a marine to accompany them wherever they went. The men took it in good spirit."

FARM SECTION GIVES REPORT ON CENTER CROPS

Seven acres of peas and nine acres of mustard and rapeseed, the first food crops to be seeded this year, began coming up this week, according to George McColm of the agricultural section.

The seeding of spinach was resumed this week, and onion plants will be set out beginning next week.

Approximately 30 acres of barley and sweet clover were planted on the project farm this week by the field crop unit.

The farm section is planning to grow approximately 1000 acres of barley and sweet clover this year. One-third of this amount has already been planted and the remainder will be planted as rapidly as possible, McColm stated. The crops will be harvested in July or August to be used as hog feed.

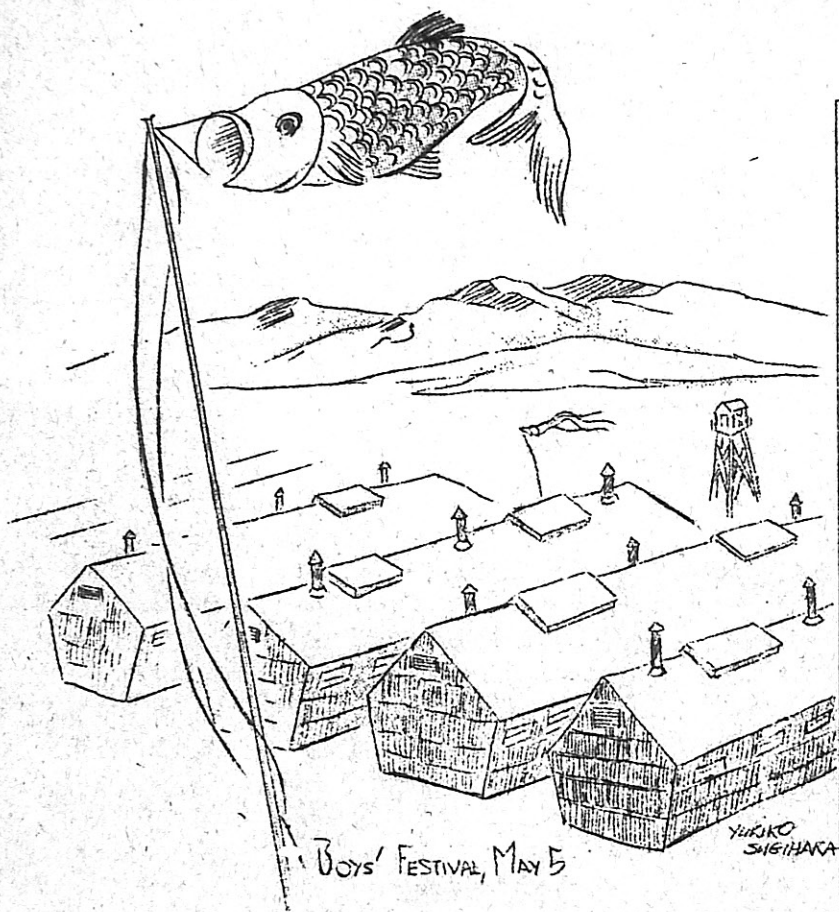
