(Continued from page 1) stated that the payment of the \$19 rate to these men has been authorized by the project director.

The following program is promosed to correct the

situation:

1. Complete auxiliary ling which connects well #6 in block 28. This temporary line has been laid because of the danger which exists due detericated condition of the rain supply line from the water tanks to camp.

2. The in the cast iron line on Jasper Avenue into blocks 19, 20, 26, 27, and 28. The cast iron lines for these 5 blocks have been in for 3 months and should be tied into the blocks as soon as possible.

3. Replace the main supply line consisting of 545 feet of 10" pipe from the water tanks to the camp

near block 14.

4. Install the blow-off line at the southwest corner of block 26 so that the sand which has accumulated can be moved out of the water system to prevent the sanding up conditions in the boilers and hot water tanks.

5. Replace tho fect of 8" line on Opal

Avenue.

6. Replace two blocks of 6" fire hydrant line on Juniper Street botween 0pal and Jasper avenues.

7. Roplace 2 blocks of fire hydrant lines on Sage between Opal and Jasper avenues.


