TRENCHING OF PIPELINES BEGIN; WORKERS NEEDED

Trenching of pipelines on Opal Avenue began Monday morning, according to the engineering section. Wayne Sutton, sanitation engineer, is now in Salt Lake City to look over a new type of cast iron pipe. He will also confer with William Moody, former superintendent of construction for the Army Engineers, to see if a trencher can be made available by the army.

Henry R. Watson, senior engineer, stated that a teletype had been sent to Washington requesting extension on the contract for the trencher now being used. These steps have been taken in anticipation that crews will be available to handle replacement and repairs.

It is essential that crews be secured immediately in order to continue the center water supply, Watson stated.

INFORMATION ON STATUS OF MEN IN ERC RELEASED BY FORT DOUGLAS

Information regarding the status of men placed in the Enlisted Reserve Corps was released recently by Fort Douglas to Curtis Peterson, relocation supervisor of WRA in the Salt Lake area.

According to the bulletin received from Fort Douglas, men in the reserve corps may move wherever they like but must

notify Fort Douglas and indicate whether such move is temporary or permanent. If temporary, they will remain responsible to the Ninth Service Command at Fort Douglas. However, if they move to a permanent location outside of the Ninth Service Command, they will be transferred to the jurisdiction of the service command within which their new residence is located.

When men are called for active duty, their expenses will be paid from the place they are living to their post of active duty.

EVACUATION PROPERTY SHIPMENT DELAYED

According to a letter received from O. B. Wilt, Transportation Property Officer of the Department of Interior in San Francisco, shipment of contraband property will continue to be delayed.

"...due to shortage of personnel in the police offices, we cannot expect them to give us priority in locating contraband articles for Japanese evacuation or over their other official duties...We have hundreds of requests for shipment of contraband property and all are being acted upon as rapidly as possible. Each request necessitates special handling."


There will be an important meeting of all softball managers tomorrow evening at DH 16 from 7:30, it was announced.

The Topaz High School tracksters started off their season with a 105 to 27 shellacking from the Fillmore men on the lat-ters track last Friday afternoon.

Yosh Yamada and George Hamada garnered the only first places for the locals. Yamada breasted the tape a split second ahead of a Fillmore competitor in the 220 yard dash while Hamada leaped for a first in the broadjump. In the low hurdles, Mike Mayeda topped the timbers for a second while Kenzo Ishimaru came in second in the discus throw. The last two places in the pole vault were taken by Sambo Nakaso and PeeWee Matsuura who copped second and third. Also taking third places were: Ki Tanamachi (high hurdles), George Murakami (100 yard dash), Fred Otsuji (440), Mits Nakagawa (broad jump), Yoshihiko (high jump) and Harlem Sano (javelin).
