EVACUEES' RETURN TO WEST COAST RECOMMENDED

A recommendation that Japanese American evacuees from the West Coast be permitted to return to their former homes as soon as the military situation warrants has been made by Dillon Myer, WRA director, according to the San Francisco Chronicle. His recommendation was made before a House appropriations sub-committee, according to hearing transcripts released in Washington.

To the House committee Myer disclosed that about 500 persons of Japanese ancestry have been permitted to return to their West Coast homes. Most of these he said have been Japanese wives of Caucasian citizens and their children.

In an editorial, the Chronicle declared, "These people should be returned to their homes when both the military situation and the social situation warrant. That will not be before the Japanese war is over."

"While West Coast boys are fighting the Japanese; the West Coast, socially, is no place for anyone of Japanese origin. There would be nothing but trouble," the editorial said.

Francis Shield, business manager of the University of Michigan, will arrive here Friday to recruit workers for the resident halls on the campus, according to the relocation office.

During his two-day stay, Shield will interview recent high school graduates and others for various types of service jobs.

Several exhibits and a program showing the activities of the various classes under the adult education department will be presented this Saturday and Sunday, it was announced today by Dr. L.C. Bane.

All adult education classes are expected to participate in the program.

Shellcraft, lapidary work, artificial flowers, women's dresses and suits, knitted wear, leathercraft, flower arrangements, and oil paintings will be exhibited. The display will be open from 2 to 10 PM on Saturday and from 9 AM to 10 PM on Sunday.

Sunday's program which will begin at 2 PM in the auditorium will include songs and recitations by the adult English class students, an oil painting demonstration, selections by the music school students, and a fashion show by the sewing school.

CHICAGO

JAPANESE HOME BUYING PROTESTED

Four residents of the Garfield Park area in Chicago last week protested to the WRA of the purchase and intended occupancy of a two-story frame flat building by a Japanese American family.

The objection came as the WRA estimated Chicago's Japanese population at 4000, with a total of 5000 for Illinois.

The building was bought by an American born Japanese evacuee, Harry Hosaka. A WRA spokesman in Chicago stated:

"We will notify Hosaka of the neighborhood's objection to his living there. At the same time, if he chooses to reside there, we will try to explain to and educate the neighbors to accepting this Japanese American family.

Coroner's Jury Says MP Acted "In Line Of Duty" In Shooting

The unidentified soldier, who fatally wounded Shoichi James Okamoto, American Japanese at the Tule Lake center, acted "in line of duty" a coroner's jury reported last Friday.

The verdict from 6 men and 2 women came after tes-

timony from 18 witnesses, including 17 internees and one WRA foreman, from which it appeared that Okamoto had refused to show proper passes at the gate, and was shot "after he suddenly made a move as if to grab the soldier's rifle."

An army board of investigation was inquiring into the case in the wake of the coroner's investigation, a news report indicated.

VOLUNTEERS HELP TSUGAWA LAY 535 FT. OF PIPELINE

535 feet of pipeline has been laid in the camp to Well #6 as an auxiliary line to alleviate the critical emergency condition caused by the deterioration of the main supply line from the water tanks to the camp. A blow off line has been installed in the southwest corner of the camp to get rid of sand which is in the water system. This work has been done by volunteer construction crews from the engineering section.

"These men have been directed in this work by Harry Tsugawa, 10-5-D, who has been in charge of all plumbing installations and maintenance in the camp," said Henry Watson, senior engineer. "The project has been fortunate in that we have had a man of quality, energy, spirit and ability in Harry Tsugawa. He and his crew have installed all plumbing in new constructions, schools and other places and have performed a superior type of workmanship in carrying out this work. They have also been working tirelessly in an effort to maintain the plumbing in good operating condition. Tsugawa has now volunteered his services together with those of S. Handa, cabinet shop foreman, to assist in the direction of the pipeline installation.

TEMPORARY CREWS

"Because of the fact that crews for pipeline replacement have not been forthcoming in the camp, the construction crews in the engineering section have volunteered their services on a rotation basis to assist Tsugawa in the important task of replacing the pipelines until such time that a permanent crew can be made available for the completing of pipeline replacements. Due to the tireless efforts of these men in performing the service beyond the call of duty, there should be gratitude and thankfulness realized by everyone in the camp for their services; and crews should be organized immediately in the center to assist them in order to maintain present spirit and civic pride."

PRIORITY WORK

The project director has declared that the pipeline replacement is the most important task and rates the highest priority of any work on the project.

AGRICULTURE

100 ACRES OF CROPS PLANTED TO DATE

Approximately 100 acres of vegetable crops have been planted to date, according to Wendell Palmer, farm section chief. Crops already planted include onions; peas, sweet corn, turnip, radish and swiss chard.

Within the next 2 weeks the food crop unit will set out 100,000 cabbage plants, 98,000 tomato plants, 20,000 broccoli, 20,000 eggplants, 15,000 pepper and 150,000 celery.

Palmer also reported that despite bad weather recently, about 575 acres of grain crops have been seeded. The last 200 acres of grain will be planted by the middle of June. Sweet clover and alfalfa has been planted as well as grain crops.
