15000 PROPERTY DESTROYED BY FIRE YESTERDAY

In the most serious fire in the history of Topaz, approximately \$5,000 worth of property was damaged by the flames which burned 75% of warehouse #103 yesterday morning. The fire was caused by spontaneous combustion in the paint shop.

Firemen fought for 30 minutes to gain control of the flames but were helpless in saving the contents of the building because of the lack of equipment to fight hot paint fire, according to W. Miller, head of the fire department.

The building was used to house the paint, electric and tin shops. The maintenance office at the south end of the warehouse was not seriously damaged.

Captain of the fire fighting crew was Frank Mayeda. Assisting were Yukio Mizuguchi, Tashiro Ishima, Kazuo Ito, Joseph Sasaki, Ben Takahashi, Michikazu Nakai, Yoneo Maruyama, Satoshi Tamura and volunteers.

Twenty-five per cent or 2260 residents have left the center on indefinite leave as of May 28. Of this number, 800 are members of the 235 complete family units which have relocated.

according to Miss Leah Dickinson, relocation program officer. The new routine will simplify the detail of leaving for many of the residents and will also provide a more accurate statistical control of departures than in the past.

The leave office will prepare a 5 x 9 addressed envelope for each person leaving the center on short term, seasonal, trial indefinite or indefinite leave. This envelope will contain the signed leave permit, ration books, transportation requests or railroad tickets if they are obtained at the leave office, change of address and notification cards and such printed instructions as may be necessary.

These envelopes will be placed on file at the gate house where the residents may receive them by turning in their form WRA 339 which is issued by the leave office.

In instances where several members of a family leave together, all permits, ration books, transportation requests, etc., can be placed in one envelope addressed to all family members. This will be done only if such a request is made when the leave applications are made.

Cash for subsistence while enroute and transportation requests will be obtained from the finance section on the day specified by the leave office.

Departing residents must make personal check-out calls to the property control office (Whse 101) block manager's office, and their section chief. A new check-out form combining and superseding forms E-17 and R-5 is being prepared for this purpose.
