## \$5000 PROPERTY DESTROYED BY FIRE YESTERDAY

In the most serious fire in the history of Topaz, approximately \$5,000 worth of property was damaged by the flames which burned 75% of warehouse #103 yesterday morning. The fire was caused by spontaneous combustion in the paint shop.

Firemen fought for 30 minutes to gain control of the flames but were helpless in saving the contents of the building because of the lack of equipment to fight hot paint fire, according to W. Miller, head of the fire de-

partment.

The building was used to house the paint, electric and tin shops. The maintenance office at the south end of the warehouse was not seriously damaged.
