12 REJECTED FOR ARMY; 6 PUT IN LIMITED SERVICE

Out of the 46 boys who took their preinduction physicals at Fort Douglas last week, 12 were rejected, 6 were put into limited service and the remaining number were accepted, it was reported today by J. Hugh Turner, acting selective service head.

Turner stated that the next group to be inducted will probably leave at the beginning of July. No definite date has been set as yet.

Sam Isono has been called for active duty into the army and will leave tomorrow, it was reported.

MISS MORIOKA TO ATTEND WYO. CONFAB

The Northwest Business and Industrial Summer Conference from June 21 to 26 in Jackson, Wyoming will be represented by Yoshiko Morioka of the local YWCA.

Replacement of the pipelines on the west end of Opal Avenue which supply water to blocks 29, 30, 36, and 37 were completed yesterday by the engineering crew, according to the engineering section.

The pipelines on Jasper Avenue near blocks 19, 20, 26, 27, and 28 will be connected into these blocks soon.

The need for additional workers to supplement the small pipeline crews was emphasized again.

Small crews are also engaged in repairing leaks throughout the center. These small crews should be augmented by workers on regular assignments from the blocks to control leaks and replace pipelines supplying water to their blocks, stated Henry R. Watson, senior engineer.

The co-operation of the residents on Opal Avenue is solicited to supply 5 men from each block on regular assignments so that the permanent line can be completed this month.

Pvt. Tabata Expresses Pride In 100th Infantry

Pvt. Terry Tabata, ex-sports reporter of the Topaz Times and now a soldier serving overseas in Italy, wrote his first V-mail letter to the staff this week. His letter written from the Anzio Beachhead, expresses his pride in being associated with the hard fighting 100th Infantry, which is with the 5th Army.

He writes: "Since I'm bumming around up here in

the perimeter to date (as yet not committed to front-line action) I thought it'd be a good idea to sit down and write a line or two.

"I won't bother to add any additional words of praise for the 100th because its fame with the folks back home and with the boys of our division is "tops". After hearing of the battalion's hardships, spirit and honors from front-line sources I feel that it's a privilege to be in such an outfit. As one of the (Caucasian) engineers put it, "I'd rather work with your outfit than with any other". And that about sums up the universal opinion of the

whole division which is composed of GIs from Iowa and Minnesota.

"While investigating some abandoned Nazi dug-outs I found the "Kraut" army paper, "Die Sudfront" (The Southern Front), the field paper for the German soldiers in Italy. It's a 4-page job with about 6 columns. It has about the same material as our "Stars and Stripes" plus an "Aryan" pin-up girl, the famous German mechanical precision on most cuts and some large bold type was very disappointing. Another paper I discovered was "Das Reich" (The Reich) the official mouthpiece of the Nazi party."

RESOLUTION**REMOVAL OF ALL
JAPANESE URGED**

SPOKANE--A resolution demanding all Japanese in the United States be transferred to South Pacific islands in the possession of this country and immediately placed under army or navy supervision was proposed at the 24th annual encampment of the Washington department of the Veterans of Foreign Wars which opened last week.

The resolution demanding the transfer of Japanese to United States islands was presented by the Tacoma post. The resolution also urged that if any constitutional rights are involved regarding American-born Japanese, that Congress immediately pass legislation permitting the drafting of such nationals for reconstruction of the islands to establish for themselves a colony after hostilities cease.

The proposed resolution states that if any people of Japanese descent are permitted to remain in the US "there will be unnecessary disturbances and riots in every state in the union" on the return of troops from the Pacific.

**Draft Evaders
Await Verdict**

CHEYENNE, Wyo.-- With the conclusion in the federal court Monday of their mass trial, 63 Japanese Americans of the Heart Mountain center charged with failure to report for preinduction selective service examinations were awaiting a verdict.

US District Judge T. Blake Kennedy said he would take the case under advisement.

In final arguments, defense attorneys asserted the defendants were unwilling to report for the examination until constitutional rights which they considered had been violated by their relocation were cleared up.

**BILL PROPOSED
TO DISFRANCHISE
CANADA JAPANESE**

OTTAWA--Under a bill sponsored by State Secretary McLarty, providing for amendments to the Dominion Elections Act to meet special conditions of wartime general elections, all persons of Japanese racial origin will be disfranchised in all parts of Canada, according to the New Canadian.

Previously persons of Japanese racial origin were barred from voting in federal elections only in a province where they were excluded from the franchise by reason of racial descent. This applied only to British Columbia.

The major part of the bill deals with the regulations governing voting by members in the armed forces at home and overseas.

USO SECY NAMED

Mrs. Tsuyuki Kubota was recently assigned as the local USO secretary and will assist parents of inductees in reading or writing letters. She will be available at rec 4 during the afternoon.

Nisei Community Contributions Cited In Discussion

CHICAGO--The contributions which minority groups have to make to communities in which they live was stressed by Vernon R. Kennedy, North Central Area relocation supervisor in a talk given at Springfield, Ill., recently. His discussion of "The Federal Government and American Citizens of Japanese Descent" was a feature of the Illinois Inter-Racial Commission's conference on "American Democracy and Racial Minorities," one of the largest and most inclusive state gatherings ever held on the subject of minority groups.

At the request of Gov. Dwight W. Green, each city of more than 5000 population in Illinois was asked to name delegates to this state conference with a

view of setting up inter-racial committees in every sizable community throughout the state. The success of the conference's program will mean much to the relocation program in Illinois, it was pointed out.

After briefly discussing the background of American citizens of Japanese ancestry and describing the evacuation, Kennedy told of the contribution which the 5000 nisei and issei resettled in Illinois are making both to the economic and social well-being of the state. He said:

"People frequently act and speak as though the acceptance of these resettlers was a sacrifice they are being asked to make without expectation of gain or regard. It is the feeling that these people

are charity wards who have a right to claim Christian tolerance, but in themselves have nothing to offer in return for their acceptance. Such a position does scant justice to these people and reflects little credit on those who hold it.

"Illinois, over the past year, has been host to approximately 5000 resettlers. Even if they were non-productive and unemployable this number would not be large for it represents less than one person to a thousand throughout the state. Far from being incapable of entering into the economic life of this state however, they have become important cogs in the commercial, agricultural, and industrial life of this state.

JA JOINT BOARD ABOLISHED WITH WORK COMPLETED

The Japanese American Joint Board which was organized in January, 1943, has completed its work and has been officially abolished, according to a letter written by Assistant Secretary of War John J. McCloy to Secretary of Interior Ickes.

During its existence, the joint board received 32,299 cases (mainly involving American citizen evacuees) for review. Of this number, 25,654 were recommended for indefinite leave, 501 were given clearance for war plant employment, and 12,254 were denied clearance. About 890 cases remain on which action has not yet been taken, it was reported.

The conference is an annual get-together of college and high school faculty members and students.

BUFFALO RELO OFFICER NAMED

Harry Weiss, Cleveland area information specialist, has been appointed acting relocation officer in charge of the Buffalo, New York district. He succeeds John L. McCormick.

Weiss reports that Buffalo has an acute manpower shortage. There are many jobs in essential industries which do not require a war plant clearance. He also stated that the community sentiment is good.

OLDEST TOPAZ FATHER

Luther Hoffman, project director, paid his respects to the oldest father in Topaz, 87 year-old Matsunosuke Tsukamoto, 31-1-A, on Father's Day. He is the father of Rev. Joseph Tsukamoto, Protestant Church Minister.
