PASADENANS

Help Offered To Keturning Evacuees

Cne-hundred-fifty letters promising to help evacuees when they return to California were recently sent to the War Department to residents of Pasadena, according to word received here today, The sending of these letters was initiated by the Friends of the American Way of Pasadena, Mary T. MacNair of the organization reported.

The letters promised 50 jobs. and 125 homes, permanent and temporary, to the roturning Japanose Americans. The American Way group indicated hopes of starting similar movements in other West Coast communities.

They should be informed, however, that refusal to give information might cause their cases to receive more attention than they would otherwise, since their refusal to give information may be interpreted to mean that they are concealing important evidence.


