lies with whom family discussions were held, 130. or. 26% indicated a desire to relocate; 199 or 40% had no desire to relocate; 127 or 25% were undecided and 39 or 9% were contin-

The most frequent reason given by those who do not contemplate relocation is that there is poor health within the family. Other reasons given in order of their frequency are fcar of oconomic insecurity, poor knowledge of English, and fear of discrimination. Fear of housing difficulty Was given only 61 times out of the 495 interviews. Insufficient WRA assistance was given as a reason 74 times. Ninety-two said they wanted to leave their families in the center during their army service.

Although 144 families indicated fear of discrimination, 238 families stated that they had no such fear. More than half of the family heads interviewed spoke good English. Almost one half had spocial skills or training.

HOSTELS INSTITUTE NEW RAIES FOR RELOCATORS

New rates for all hostels operating in the east and mid-west with the exception of the Detroit Fellowship House were announced today by Robertson M. Fort, secretary of the American Friends Service Committee in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The new rates which were effective from July 1 are as follows: \$1 for all unemployed adults; 50 cents for children under ten years of age; \$1.50 individuals for employed for the first ten days; \$2 for employed individuals after ten days, and \$1.50 for all overnight guests for room and board.

Meals a la carte at the hostel are 25 cents for breakfast, 35 cents for lunch, and 50 cents for dinner.

These rates apply to the hostels in Cincinnati, Cleveland, Des Moines, Minneapolis, Now York Philadelphia.

Rates for the Detorit Fellowship House are \$6 a week. not including meals.
