editorial: TOPAZ AND WAR

War and its horrible meanings struck closer to home this week as the War Department telegrams announced that sons and husbands of Topaz residents have been injured and killed in action in the Fifth Army's drive to Livorno in Italy during the earlier part of this month.

This time will not be the last time that the people of Topaz will hear of their loved ones in the battle becoming casualties; modern mechanized war takes its toll of lives and casualties quick-

ly and indiscriminately.

The reasons why these men volunteered to serve in a Japanese American Combat Team of the US Army have been told to us many times. The nisei on the home front must make sure that the efforts and

sacrifices of these nisci soldiers are not in vain.
We pay tribute to Tom Misumi, who died in acand to the many other nisei soldiers of the 4-12nd Infantry Battalion, who are fighting their country and the nisei's future.

PATROTISM TEST

Recently 11 wounded mon from Bushnell General hospital were feted in Salt Lake City, All were Japanese Americans who had seen service in the Italian campaign. Most of them lost an arm or a leg and were sent to Bushnell for the fitting of artificial limbs.

It may have been something of a surprise to many Utahns to read about these Americans of Japanese ancestry and their fighting record in Unclo Sam's Army. But these 11 are only a few of the hundreds of Japanese Americans who have fought bravely for their country--America--been killed. wounded and taken prisoner, praised for performing "brilliantly" in action and decorated for gal-

The first Japanese American combat unit, the 100th Infantry battalion, was activated in May, 1942. It first went into action about a year ago. Since then up to last Liay, members of this one battalion, fighting in many engagements and singled out for high praise in a 5th army citation, have received 900 purple hearts, 3 distinguished service crosses, 36 silver stars and 21 bronze stars.

Japanese Americans have seen plenty of action in this war on many fronts. A Japanese technical sergeant in the air forces has won 2 distinguished flying crosses and an air medal with 5 oak leaf clusters for his gunnery work on more than 25 Euro- transport any migratory bird pean theater bombing missions. Japanese Americans protected by treatios with are serving as interpreters, radio intelligence men and in other capacities all over the Pacific war theater. They have seen action on Bataan, at Tarawa, Kwajelein, Naw Guinea, Guadalcanal, Britain and in the China-Burma-India theater. New

There are today approximately 13,000 soldiers of Japanese ancestry in the army, more than half of whom are now outside the continental US.

No one can say, after the record of volunteering for service, of gallantry in action of blood sacrifice, that the second generation of Japanese in America have not in large numbers proved their loyalty to their country by their readinoss serve in its armed forces, to fight for it, and to die for it. What more conclusive patriotism is thore?

SIGNIFICANCE OF EXPAIRIATION LAW TO NISEL TOLD

Prior to its recent adjournmont, Congress adopted a bill amending the Nationality laws to simplify the method which citizens of the United States may voluntarily ' nounce their citizenship. July 3 the bill was signed by the President and became a law.

Under the new law an American citizen may renounce his citizenship by making a statement to that effect on a form to be prescribed by the Attorney General, and before an designated officer Attorney General as not being contrary to the interests of national defense, which means that persons subject to the selective service act will not bo able to use the law as a device for evading service in the armed forces.

The new law will not become fully operative until publication by the Department Justice of the necessary regulations, development necessary forms and designation of the officers authorized to accept the forms. The law will be effective while the United States is at war.

CAUTION

DO NOT DESTROY MIGRATORY BIRDS

Center residents are tioned by WRA against violating federal regulations covering the capture or killing of migratory birds,

Under provisions of the Mi-Cratory Bird Treaty Act, it is a criminal offense to capture, kill, sell, buy or Creat Britain and Mexico.

Officials of the Fish Wildlife Service indicate that. some center evacuees have unknowingly captured birds protected under these treaties. The birds must be liberated immediately or evacuees possessing them will be subject to a fine up to \$500 and/or imprisonment up to six months as provided by the Migratory Bird
