MYER DISCUSSES TULE LAKE DRAFT DISMISSAL CASE

dismissal The recent of the case against 22 Tule Lake selective service regulation violators by Federal District Court Judge Goodman has no binding effect on other Federal District courts which have been uniformly holding that evacuees in relocation centers who refuse to obey selective service. calls are draft dodgers and are punishable as such, according to a teletype sent to the Gila conter by, Dillon S. Myer. national WRA director.

The toletype further stated, "We have not yet received a copy of the decision but from newspaper accounts it appears that the judge was influenced by the fact that Tule Lake is a segregation conterfor disloyal evacuees."

He added that the Justice Department may appeal Judge Goodman's decision directly to the Supremo Court.

Families with elderly parents, grandparents, or young school children were thought of as being too

handicapped for camplete relocation.

But in the past half year more and more residents have chanced their fortunes in relocation with hopes of finding a locality and conditions suitable for the entire family. Some of them have gotten "easy breaks" so that they were able to send for their families soon after their own departure from the center, With others it has taken more time but usually they have not been too impatient to look for a satisfactory situation.

The few issei and family groups that went out last year have found success with their new transplanted living on the cutside to be able to write back to their friends and relatives encouraging them to their luck, too. Many times family relocation has been expedited by the young people who have gone out to make arrangements for calling out the rest of their

Topaz resi-Whatever the reasons for relocation, dents with an acumen to the future are planning to. leave camp life. Life here, of course, is quite secure and offers the minimum of necessities of our daily lives, but it does not provide all the normal activities of outside life which will help us from becoming depressed and too engrossed in our difficulties.

Any Topaz parent must admit that camp life for a long time is not a fair deal for his children. The "kids" in their formative stage need and deserve a

better way of living.

us Eventually when we are able to do so, most of expect to leave -- in the near future, when California and the west coast reopens to the evacuees, or at the end of the war. Just when the latter two things will happen is too unpredictable. The materialization of these hopes may be so far in the future that it might be tougher than ever to give up the life provided by the WRA to start over again.

Many families must roturn to the normal stream of life soon--while the facilities and co-operation of the WRA, Department of Interior, church groups and other social and welfare agencies are still available to them. It is easier to get re-established before end of the war when competition with returning voter-

ans is not too great.
