COAST EVICTION ISHIDAS, YOSHINOS, IJIMAS PLAINTIFFS MAY HAVE MOST SERVICEMEN RETURN TO CALIF.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 24-- Us District Attorney Charles H. Carr announced Thursday that military authorities have exempted two American born Japanese, Mrs. Shizuko Shiramizu and Masaru Baba, from a government order excluding Japanese from the Western Defense Command and particularly from Los Angeles County.

Carr asked federal court to dismiss suits bought by a American Civil Liberties Union attorney to test the right of the military to exclude Mrs. Shiramizu and Baba. He said army officials had advised him that there were no facts on record indicating that Mrs. Shiramizu or Baba might jeopardize security. Mrs. Shiramizu is a resident of Poston, whose husband was killed while fighting with American forces in Italy.

Baba, who was honorably discharged from the army in March, 1942, lives in Reno.

Carr said military authorities have exempted certain individuals from the general exclusion order.

No mention was made for the disposition of a similar injunction suit brought to court by Dr. George Ochikubo, former chairman of the Topaz community council.

CANNERY JOBS AVAILABLE AGAIN

Cannery contracts for the tomato season in Ogden have arrived here, according to the relocation office.

Rabbins Canning Company of Roy is asking for 35 women workers at 55 cents per hour. Contract is from September 4 to October 15.

Forty women and 10 men are being recruited by the North Ogden Canning Company with the contract lasting from September 7 to October 20. Wages will be 70 cents an hour for men and 12 cents per 60-quart pan for women.

Housing will be provided at the Roy labor camp for 25 cents a week and approximately \$1.10 per day for board. High school girls are not eligible for the contracts.

REPORTS OFFICER GETS PROMOTION

Russell A. Bankson, reports officer, returned here yesterday from Washington, DC, where he assisted the WRA office in processing leave clearances.

He stated that he expected to return to the capital city soon to accept another position. He will depart when his successor arrives here.

Mr. and Mrs. Arata Shin Ishida of 29-6-B and Mr. and Mrs. Yoshimatsu Yoshino of 3-2-E with four sons in the services and Mr. and Mrs. Tokuhei Iijima of 9-7-B with 3 sons and 2 sons-in-law have the largest number of family members in the armed forces from Topaz, according to a survey recently taken by the block managers.

Mr. and Mrs. Ishida's eldest son Hiraku is a first lieutenant now serving overseas. Another son, Pfc. Sonau is stationed at Camp Maxey, Texas. Two younger sons, Masaru and Sodatsu were recently inducted and are stationed at Camp Shelby, Miss., and Camp Blanding, Florida, respectively.

Three Yoshino brothers, John, Paul, and Henry are volunteers for the army from Topaz, and are now stationed at Camp Savage, Minnesota. A fourth brother, Joe, received an honorable discharge from the army last year to join the merchant marines.

Three persons from Manzanar and seven from Topaz will instruct the classes beginning in September. Eight more will be needed for the January term.

Turner stated that positions for Japanese instructors are still open at the following universities: Chicago, Northwestern, Yale, Michigan, and Harvard.

The Japanese American heroes, most of whom are from the Hawaiian Islands, and who were wounded on the Italian front, were served native foods which they hadn't tasted for about two years.

So that a supply of beef can be maintained for Topaz and to insure continuous regular shipments to Minidoka, 74 head of new cattle were purchased this week by the local farm section. With 52 received from Ogden and 22 from Gila River, the cattle herd now totals 900 head.

The swine section, under the able leadership of H. Adachi and G. Hoshige, is improving the grounds and pens, thereby bettering sanitary conditions of that area. Due to the shortage of feeder pigs throughout the country, the swine section reports that the breeding herd for center needs must be enlarged.

Two Tojos Fight For 442nd Infantry

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, Italy--Corporal Rufus Tojo, formerly of Hollywood, Calif., and Corporal Tadashi Tojo of Waiialua, Oahu, Hawaii, are fighting the Germans on the Fifth Army front. They are members of the 442nd Japanese American Combat which was attached to the 34th "Red Bull" Division.

Both soldiers have personal scores to settle with Hidaki Tojo of Tokyo, former Premier of Japan.

Cpl. Tadashi Tojo was an eyewitness to the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941. "I saw them cut down defenseless people, among them a

lot of personal friends. I'd like to meet Tojo of Japan--and on the business end of my howitzer," Cpl. Tojo from the Territory declared. Since "Tadashi" means "straight" in Japanese, General Tojo might well seek a real hiding place when cannoner Tojo goes into action against him.

Corporal Tojo from Hollywood is realistic enough to know that is was the Japanese "sneak" attack on American soil which precipitated the evacuation of all persons of Japanese ancestry from the Pacific Coast. His father and mother are today residents of

the Heart Mt. relocation center. His brother, Pvt. James, is a reserve ASPT.

"Because we looked like the Japs who attacked Pearl Harbor, we were placed under suspicion and evacuated," said Rufus Tojo. "Now we're fighting to show the skeptics that we're as good Americans as those of other ancestry. God willing, we won't fail!"

Cpl. Rufus Tojo, like Cpl. Tadashi Tojo, is in the field artillery. He manipulates the gadgets which set the target range. "I've got the sights set for Berlin already but I'm itching for the chance to aim at Tokyo."

His topic will be chiefly on the nisei problems with the purpose of trying to bring about a better understanding of the nisei, thereby promoting public acceptance of the resettlement program and the post-war adjustments.

In order to give the listeners a better appreciation of the nisei, the JACL is sponsoring Miss Ruby Yoshino, formerly of Alameda, California, one of the outstanding nisei sopranos, to accompany Dr. Yatabe on the tour.
