ARMY ORDNANCE LABOR SHORTAGE STRIKES DEPOT IN NEB. ALL PROJECT SECTIONS TO RECRUIT HERE

Plans for recruiting about 25 families to work at the Sioux Army Ordnance Depot located near Sidney, Nebraska, were discussed Thursday morning by Maj. Walter Brown, ordnance field representative, and Captain George Figner, personnel and training officer of the Sioux Depot, with Project Director L.T. Hoffman and residents representing the relocation office staff, community council, block managers and the council relocation committee.

The depot stores, receives and ships munitions and other army supplies. Although the depot is supervised by army officers, Capt. Figner said that it is actually manned and operated by civilians. Present plans call for the recruiting of 25 families from this center and more later from two or three centers until about 500 working people have been secured.

Capt. Figner stated that the depot is interested in securing complete families to work as munition handlers, checkers, carpenters, mechanics and

JACL HOPES TO OPEN SF OFFICE

National JACL headquarters at Salt Lake City announced that it has filed its application for permit to reopen its offices in San Francisco, California, where it was functioning prior to the evacuation of all persons of Japanese parentage from the Pacific Coast.

In its application, the JACL wrote to Maj. Gen. Bonesteel that in view of the lifting of the various civilian restrictions by the Western Defense Command, it felt it should be permitted to reopen its offices in order to render service for those desiring to return to the coast.

T/5 BEN MAYEDA INJURED IN ITALY

T/5 Ben Mayeda, son of Mrs. Yuko Mayeda of 14-12-D, was slightly wounded in action in Italy on August 25, according to a War Department wire to the family Wednesday.

With more than 200 jobs open in the center, the labor shortage situation in Topaz will become more acute with the termination of many summer vacation workers from the high school today.

The shortage is greatest at the hospital where about 32 nurses' aides from the high school will be terminated after today. At least 30 nurses' aides are needed immediately to replace these terminatees. In addition 6 ambulance drivers are urgently needed. Because of the criticalness of the situation the men's ward at the hospital was closed yesterday to relieve some workers to other wards. Two women and 3 men patients were transferred with 2 attendants to a rest home set up in block 3.

The teacher shortage at the high school is also serious. The pipeline crew is in need of 75 full time and 25 part time workers and the farm section has a requisition for 25 more workers.

The manpower problem is now being felt in all sections with the commissary warehouse in need of 12 men and mess management has openings for many types of workers. There are also about 50 typist and clerk jobs.

BARNHART LEAVES FOR WASHINGTON, DC

Ralph Barnhart, project attorney, left Friday morning to accept a new position in the WRA office of solicitors in Washington, D.C. He has been with the center staff since December, 1942.

Frank S. Barrett, project attorney at the Minidoka relocation center, will divide his time between Topaz and Minidoka until a successor is found for Barnhart's position.

RULES FOR OVERSEAS MAILING GIVEN

Xmas Gifts Must Be Posted Sept. 15 To Oct. 15.

Beginning next Friday Christmas mail to overseas servicemen will be accepted by the local post office. Residents should not bring their overseas packages for mailing until that date, the post office advised.

In order that Christmas parcels may reach the addressees on time and in good condition, arrangements have been made by the Post Office Department in co-operation with the War and Navy Departments (the latter including the Marines and Coast Guard) for the acceptance of such parcels for members of the armed forces serving outside the continental United States.

* * * * *

TIME OF MAILING: Christmas cards and parcels for personnel of the armed forces overseas must be mailed during the period beginning September 15, 1944, and October 15, 1944. The War Department advises that Christmas greeting cards for soldiers overseas must be sent in seal-

ed envelopes and prepaid at the first-class rates.

No requests from the addressees are required in connection with Christmas parcels mailed to army personnel during this period only. Patrons should endorse each gift parcel "Christmas Parcel". Special effort will be made to effect delivery of all Christmas parcels mailed during the year-end season.

SIZE AND WEIGHT: Christmas parcels shall not exceed the present limits of 5 pounds in weights or 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. The public is urged not to include food or clothing in gift parcels. Not more than one Christmas parcel shall be accepted for mailing in any one week when sent by or on behalf of the same person or concern to or for the same addressee.

PREPARATION: Owing to the great distance this mail must be transported and the handling and any storage it must undergo, it is absolutely necessary

that all articles be packed in boxes of metal, wood, solid fiberboard or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard reinforced with strong gummed-paper tape or tied with strong twine.

PERISHABLE MATTER: Perishable matter will not be accepted and the sending of fragile articles is discouraged.

PROHIBITED ARTICLES: Intoxicants, inflammable materials, (including matches of all kinds and lighter fluids) and poisons or compositions which may kill or injure another, or damage the mails are unacceptable.

HOW TO ADDRESS: Addressee must be legible in typewriting or ink. Copies of sales slips of retail stores should not be used as address labels. The complete address should be shown on a sheet of paper on the inside of parcel in order to permit identification of the address in the event the outer wrapping becomes torn, mutilated or destroyed in transit.

a variety of other positions for both men and women. Workers will be under civil service and applications for clearance for this work by the Provost Marshall will be expedited by the ordnance recruiters. Employment is guaranteed to last for the duration and six months.

Two representatives selected by the council relocation committee will visit and inspect the Sioux army ordnance depot next week. About a week after the visit, representatives of the depot are expected here for the actual recruitment.

Living accommodations are available in a federal housing project called Ordville located just outside of the depot proper. Housing is made up in family units with kitchen, living room, private showers, and

1 to 3 bedrooms. The units are completely furnished and stoves, refrigerators, electricity and water are provided without cost. Under arrangements made with the quartermaster general, kitchen utensils and bedding may be rented for one dollar per person a month. A canteen, an army post exchange, and grocery store are available to all families.

Movies, softball, soccer, badminton fields, recreation hall and library are among the recreational facilities available. The depot has a regulation 54-bed army hospital for workers, at very low rates, Capt. Figner stated.

The army officer stated the community of Sidney is welcoming evacuees who go to work at the depot, and arrangements have been made so that children can attend schools there.

The ag section disclosed that 4000 meat chicken will be slaughtered for canteen consumption in October.
