LABOR SHORTAGE STRIKES ARMY ORDNANCE DEPOT IN NEB. ALL PROJECT SECTIONS TO RECRUIT HERE

Plans for recruiting about 25 families to work at the Sioux Army Ordnance Depot located near Sidney, Nebraska, were discussed Thursday morning by Maj. Walter Brown, ordnance field representative, and Captain George Figner, personnel and training officer of the Sioux Dopot, with Project Director L.T. Hoffman and residents representing the relocation office staff, community council, block managers and the council relocation committee.

The depot stores, roceives and ships munitions and other army supplies. Although the depot is supervised by army officers, Capt. Figner said that it is actually manned and operated by civilians. Present plans call for the rocruiting of 25 families from this contor and more later from two or three centers until about 500 working people have been secured.

In order that Christmas parcels may reach the addressees on time and in good condition, arrangements have been made by the Post Office Department in co-operation with the War and Navy Departments (the latter including the Marines and Coast Guard) for the acceptance of such parcels for members of the armed forces serving outside the continental United States.

TIME OF MAILING: Christmas cards and parcels for personnel of the armed forces overseas must bo mailed during the period for the same addressee. beginning September 15,

A total of 386 men have been occupants of this isolation area since its establishment. They have lived there for periods ranging from one to ten months.

Twenty-eight were transferred from the isolation area during the past six months to the San-Internment ta Fe Alien Camp in New Mexico.
