"Especially to the families, relatives and friends of these patients and to the whole community we make the most urgent appeal for help, even if on a temporary basis only, to meat this critical situation.

With travel at an all time high, resulting in crowded conditions on rail-roads and buses, Steiding states that all possible effort should be exerted toward inducing evacuees to limit the amount of cash they carry to that necessary for expenses on their trip and any minor circumstances which might develop.
