It was reported that about one-third of the WRA program with reference to relocation had been comploted with the resettlement of 30.000 evacuees. The relocation program of Japanese Americans will be continued under prosent assistance provisions and with no prospect of closing any of the center til such time as relocation to the West Coast becomes possible. When that time comes, sufficient time will be allowed for ordorly and well-planned rolocation as another rolocation area.

# Sen. Downey Favors Dispersed Relocation

WASHINGTON -- Senator Sheridan Downey (D-Calif.), proposing a national postwar "share the Japs" program last Saturday suggested the expulsion of disloyal Japs and a voluntary distribution of the re-mainder among the states.

Some 125,000 Japs--most of them American citizens --were concentrated on the west coast before the war, the senator said. Most of she ex- them now are in government relocation centers.

"It is my hope," said, "that some mutually agrecable basis can be found now, that would be fair and acceptable to Japs who are citizens, for dispersing them throughout the country.
