UNAUTHORIZED CONSTRUCTION BAN TO BE ENFORCED

Violators of the unauthorized construction regulations will be issued citations, it was stated today by L. T. Hoffman, project director. The internal security wardens have been instructed to be on the alert for any unauthorized construction, and to confiscate such materials.

Since those constructions could give the appearance of favoritism, and because the WRA is required to make applications to proper authorities for the purchases of building materials in accordance with wartime regulations, construction must be kept uniform for all barracks, it was stated.

The dangers of constructing cellars under the barracks were also stressed. The soil in this vicinity is so unstable that any excavation must be fully protected against the possibility of cave-ins. All types of constructions must be done under competent supervision so that necessary safeguards from fire and safety can be assured.

Everyone is asked to refrain from making any additions to the barracks and other buildings which will change any of the basic construction features.

FISHING SEASON IN THIS AREA TO CLOSE OCTOBER 31; RULES GIVEN

The fishing season for trout, salmon, mountain herring, catfish, white fish, crappie, perch and black bass will close in this area on October 31. All residents who wish to go fishing must secure a license from the Fish and Game agent in a nearby town.

The license rates are \$4 for adults, \$2 for boys under 18 and \$1 for girls.

ACCIDENT VICTIMS FOUND GUILTY; PENALTIES IMPOSED

US ATTY CHECKS ALIEN TRAVELERS

Aliens traveling outside of the center on short term, seasonal, trial indefinite or indefinite leaves must secure permits from the US Attorney to move from one locality to another, the leave office said today. A permit from the US Attorney is not required to reach the first destination from the center stated on the travel permit, but it is required for movement to the second and all succeeding destinations.

All aliens returning here from trial indefinite, seasonal or indefinite are required to secure US Attorney permits. Persons returning here for short term leaves are not required to secure US Attorney permits since travel between the last designated destination on the travel permit and the center is covered.

Nine of the 11 Topaz men who were riding in a government truck that overturned on a curve northwest of the project Saturday were given hearings before the project director yesterday and found guilty of violating regulations and instructions.

The other two will be given hearings when they recover sufficiently from injuries to appear. One is still in the hospital with head injuries.

The driver of the truck charged with reckless driving, leaving the project area without a pass and unauthorized use of government equipment, was fined \$5 and his driver's license suspended for 90 days.

The other eight, charged with leaving the project area without a pass, drew 30-day suspensions of leave privileges and were ordered to share with the driver in payment of damage to the government vehicle as determined by a survey board.

The defendants were represented by the evacuee resident attorney.

Project Director L. T. Hoffman announced that in view of the seriousness of the offense which put seven in the hospital, and the necessity for very careful use of government equipment, internal security and motor pool supervisors were requested to carefully check both on and off project travel to determine whether proper trip tickets and individual passes have been secured. Divisions making travel requests also will keep a closer check.

"This action is being taken primarily for the safety of residents," Mr. Hoffman said, "as well as to restrict the use of government equipment to essential travel."

FIRE PREVENTION

Miyagawa's Winning Essay Gives Helpful Hints For Avoiding Fire

Winning essay on fire prevention written by Starr Miyagawa, eleventh grade student at the local high school, is printed below to call the attention of the residents to the fire prevention suggestions emphasized:

Fire prevention week is observed all over the United States, but we in Topaz should be more careful in observing it, for we have buildings which are easily combustible. Our quarters are crowded and we have a mess kitchen in each block. We also have dry climate and our fire hydrants are shut off because of leaking mains.

Not only government, but also resident property is lost if careless fires are not prevented. The methods of prevention include:

1. Cleaning out rubbish, inside and outside of buildings, and burning it in an incinerator.



2. Oily rags are likely to ignite spontaneously

so they should be kept in a metal container.

3. Soot should be cleaned out of chimneys regularly and clogging in flues should be watched.

4. Combustible materials should be kept away from the stove.

5. Ashes should be kept in metal containers.

6. Cigarettes should be snuffed out and placed in ash trays.



7. Matches should be kept out of reach from small children.

8. Use a flashlight for temporary lighting.

9. Do not use any inflammable cleaning fluid.

10. If there are any electrical defects in your building, do not try to fix them yourself, but call the electrician.

11. Keep your fire extinguishers filled and ready for use.

I am sure that if everyone follows these rules the great majority of the fires in Topaz can and will be prevented.

NO DISCRIMINATION IN ARMY, SAYS NISEI VETERAN OF ITALIAN FRONT

"We are fighting for everything the white soldiers are fighting for—and more. We are all fighting for recognition as Americans," S/Sgt. George K. Yamauchi, Japanese American veteran of the Italian front now recuperating in the Baxter General Hospi-

tal in Washington, stated in an interview which appeared this week in the Spokane Daily Chronicle.

The article, a four-column spread on the front page of the newspaper, tells about the 442nd Infantry combat team and its heroic activities and decorations.

Of the treatment accorded Japanese Americans by other Americans GI's Sgt. Yamauchi said, "We were treated just like anybody else. When our turn came we were sent into combat. There was no discrimination. Over there they seemed to realize the problem we faced better than the people here do."

FARM NOTES

HARVEST

With only a few weeks of harvesting time left in the season, the agriculture section is rushing to get all vegetables and grains into the storage cellars and silos before winter sets in.

Approximately 70,000 pounds of beets have been harvested so far, and the potatoes, expected to yield 70,000 pounds also, will be picked next week. Seven acres of celery and six acres of onion harvests are scheduled to follow. In the celery harvest, every other row will be left in the fields and covered with dirt to be saved for use two months later. The dry onions should yield about 60,000 pounds.

Green vegetables such as nappa, green onions, chard and daikon are being harvested daily.

PLANTINGS

160 acres of winter barley and 200 acres of alfalfa were sown this week. 320 acres of barley and wheat are also to be planted before the winter season.

POULTRY

There are now 4000 meat chickens and the first kill is expected to start this week. About 600 birds, each weighing from 2½ to 3 pounds, will be killed every week for distribution to one half of the center mess halls at a time. 1200 of them will be saved for the Thanksgiving dinner.

CATTLE

Regular shipments of approximately 30 head of cattle are being made every two weeks to Minidoka from the local farm. So far the shipments total 116 head. Of the 758 head of cattle on the project, 290 will be used for consumption by Topaz and Minidoka until January 1, 1945. After this date shipments to Minidoka will be temporarily discontinued until next summer.

Plans are underway to purchase 350 head of cattle this month for slaughtering after July 1, 1945.

AG SECTION NEEDS TWENTY-EIGHT MEN

Twenty-eight men are immediately needed to operate the tractors and other machinery to harvest the 100 acres of barley. Additional help is needed for the fall grain planting. A secretary is also needed for the office, the ag section reports.

FIRST FAMILY TO TRY NEW CFR PLAN TO LEAVE SOON

The first family of all the centers to try the new Cleveland Family Resettlement Plan is that of Frank Terihiko Tanaka, 39-3-B, who is planning to leave on October 30 for the Cleveland Hostel. Accompanying him will be his wife, Wakiko, and his sons, Paul and Henry, and his daughters, Hazel, age 11, and Aiko, age 9. Another daughter, Helen, now on indefinite leave in Indianapolis will join the family in Cleveland.

The Tanakas evacuated to Tule Lake from Salem, Oregon and then transferred to Topaz.

Paul, the oldest son, a University of Oregon graduate, served in the US Army for two years before being honorably discharged. Henry, the second son, graduated from Earlham College in Richmond, Indiana, this summer with a major in biology.

Under this new plan the family will be allowed to live at the hostel as long as it is necessary before finding suitable employment for all employable members and suitable housing for the entire family. In the meantime four different organizations will be working jointly to receive and establish them. These are the Cleveland Church Federation, the Cleveland Resettlement Committee, the Cleveland Hostel and the WRA. Churches in Cleveland have joined together to help family units, regardless of creed, find housing, school arrangements, friends, social adjustments and economic security.

A letter received from the Cleveland Church Federation states: "We are very anxious to help you in carrying out your plans in any way possible. We feel very strongly that the resettlement program cannot succeed until whole family units are able to relocate and make their adjustments together."

Henceforth, complete families will be given preference in the hostel over single individuals, although invitations will still be extended to single persons when no family is waiting accommodations.

BLOCK 30 CLUB DONATES TO SSAF

"The Calling All Girls Club of Block 30" has donated \$35.32 from the profits of its refreshment sales at the rodeo to the Student Scholarship Aid Fund, it was reported today.

The remainder of the profits, \$26.10, will be used by the club to carry out its activities.
