PFC KATO KILLED NURSES' AIDE SHORTAGE IN ACTION ON AT HOSPITAL IS ACUTE FRENCH FRONT

Pfc. Joe Hisato Kato, third son of Mr. and Mrs. Taiju Kato, was killed in action in France on October 16, a War Department wire to the family last Saturday revealed.

Friends and relatives of the late soldier held a memorial service in his honor on Sunday night in the local Buddhist Church.

The family, now relocated in Tremonton, Utah, lived in Irvington, California prior to the evacuation.

Pfc. Kato's older brother, Yasuhisa Kato, is now serving with the US Army in England. Both were called into the army before the evacuation.

The late soldier is also survived by one other brother and four sisters.

442ND RESCUES "LOST BATTALION"

SIXTH ARMY GROUP IN FRANCE—A "Lost Battalion" of the Seventh Army which was cut off by the Germans for a week in the St. Die area, was relieved by Japanese American troops who fought brilliantly in Italy, it was disclosed today.

The battalion was of the 141st Regiment of the 36th Division.

The Japanese who fought their way on the afternoon of Oct. 30 were of the 442nd Regiment.

"It really was ironical that we were so glad to see the Japanese," said Private Walter Yattaw, 94 Superior St., Providence, R.I., "but boy, they are real Americans."

One 48-man patrol of the battalion came back with only six men after its seven days of isolation.

An urgent appeal is being made to all residents to co-operate in relieving the serious shortage of workers at the local hospital. There is an immediate need of nurses' aides, ambulance drivers, attendants of convalescent wards and diet kitchen workers.

With the coming winter season, more patients are expected to be hospitalized. At present, the hospital is unable to give as much care to the patients as it wishes, owing to shortage of nurses' aides. Although 60 full time nurses' aides are needed, only 17 full time and 17 part-time nurses' aides are now employed.

Any male or female, 18 years of age or over, is acceptable. A nurses' aide does not necessarily have to be a young person. Both issei and nisei can help and a knowledge of English is not always necessary.

ROOSEVELT WINS NAT'L ELECTION

President Roosevelt will serve another term of office as a result of yesterday's election. He carried such states as New York, Pennsylvania, and Illinois, which hold a large number of electoral votes, previously predicted as doubtful.

In Topaz a small number of evacuees voted in their West Coast precincts with absentee ballots. Although most of the appointed staff are holding their voting status in their home states, a fair percentage registered and voted in Delta and Abraham.

PAMPHLET ISSUED BY WRA TITLED "NISEI IN UNIFORM"

PUBLIC REACTION IN SACRAMENTO FAVORABLE OSADA

The battle record of the American soldier of Japanese ancestry on all Allied fronts is told in "Nisei in Uniform", an illustrated pamphlet issued by the WRA in collaboration with the War Department.

Copies of this pamphlet will be distributed in the mess halls, libraries and other places as soon as they are received.

The achievement of nisei with Merrill's Marauders in Burma only recently has been coming to light, the WRA said, too late for more than a brief reference in the publication. News of Japanese American participation in the campaign in France also was announced after the publication went to press.

"Every race and nation from which our population is drawn," the publication states, "is represented among the young Americans who are fighting side by side to overthrow the Axis powers. Men of German ancestry have been helping to smash the German Nazis; men of Italian descent have participated in the struggle to drive the Axis forces from Italy; men whose parents came from Japan are showing that devotion to America and gallantry in action are not determined by the color of the skin."

2 AMERICAN VETERANS' EXPERIENCES IN NEW YORK SUBWAY TRAIN TOLD

New York--A story of two American veterans of overseas duty is told this week in a letter to the New York newspaper, PM, by Gertrude Berger.

"The two soldiers sitting in the subway train had seen a lot of action," the letter said.

"A look at their campaign ribbon showed that. One boy was what some might call a 'typical' American--tall, rawboned, freckled-faced; the other was small and slight, obviously of Japanese heritage. A man stood in front of them glaring at the Japanese American boy. Then he gave vent to a stream of profanity that accused and denounced that boy because he dared to have Japanese blood, and had the audacity to wear an American uniform.

"Neither of the soldiers said a word. At the next station they got off the train. As they started to move toward the door, it was apparent to every person in that car that the Japanese boy was blind, and needed the other man to guide him."

COAST RETURN AS YET NOT ALLOWED

WASHINGTON--A War Department spokesman denied that there has been a decision to permit persons of Japanese ancestry evacuated from California to return from November.

The statement was prompted by a statement made by Charles Wollenberg, California Director of Social Welfare, who declared in Sacramento on Oct. 30 that he had "an idea" that the evacuees "will begin to filter back" to California.

"I do not feel that the people of Sacramento are particularly embittered in their attitude toward the Japanese people who formerly made this city their home," states K. Osada who left Topaz to rejoin his wife in that city.

Now living at 611 O Street, Sacramento, California, Osada, an alien Japanese, was released by the WRA with the army's permission to allow him to rejoin his Caucasian wife.

In a letter to Claud Pratt, welfare counsellor, Osada said. "For the two days that have elapsed since my homecoming we have received a continuous stream of old friends and well-wishers expressing satisfaction and every felicitation upon the turn of events which has brought me home.

"From all my own observations I should say that the reaction of the public in general is all that I could possibly wish."

RPHL DENOUNCED IN OPEN LETTER

Stating that the Remember Pearl Harbor League in Washington and other groups attempting to keep evacuees out of the West Coast fear economic competition from the evacuees Ralph Erickson sharply denounced such persons in a letter to the New Republic magazine.

Erickson declared in his letter:

"These nisei have not been accused of disloyalty to the United States, rather it is the fear of economic competition that drives the rabble-rousers to attempt to deny them their just rights.

"It is significant that the promoters of this organization, or gang, are chiefly small business men or truck gardeners. Most of the Japanese formerly here were also small business men or truck gardeners. The moral is obvious."

華府WRAの法務官E.F.アガソン氏の弁表に依れば去る十月十二及十三の両日に亘り大審院に於て行はれたる是松及遠藤事件に關する審査に依り日系人の戦時撤退及び再転住計畫に絡む最も重要な法律問題と全國環境の魚点に齎らしたる由なりが是松氏の代辦人の主なる論點は第一に米國議會は是松氏が違犯したと認められてゐる公法第五〇五号を日系人の集團的撤退執行の機ととして使用するに於ては預想しなかつたのである。それ故にこの公法は適用さるべき性質のものではないと云ふ事。而して軍事上の必要なる人の撤退は必要なり

と新定したる以上法廷としては其軍部の断定の裡面や内部迄立ち入つて吟味するとは出来ない。軍部は日系人の撤退を必要と認めたるに付き最初に彼等の自由退を勧告して試みたけれどもそれは成功せなかつたので止むを得ず軍部は強制撤退を實施したものである。而して一度強制撤退が實行された以上は次ぎに軍部は彼等を拘留した。然るに其撤退計畫を合理的に遂行するに必要なる手段として行はれたのである云々と
