## MEMORIAL TO HONOR SOLDIERS

In honor of Topaz servicemen who have been killed in action, a camp-wide public memorial service will be held here next Sunday, December 3, from 2:30.

The service will be under the sponsorship of the council with the Inter-Faith Association in charge.

## FDR UNCERTAIN WHETHER WEST COAST WILL OPEN

WASHINGTON -- President Roosevelt declared Tuesday that American citizens of Japanese ancestry cannot be locked up indefinitely in relocation centers, but he did not know whether military restrictions will be relaxed to permit their return to the West Coast.

His statements were prompted by a news conference question whether he thought the danger of sabotage on the Pacific Coast had decreased to a point where the evacuees could be returned. He replied that the danger had diminished in most cases.

He said that feeling among many lawyers about the Japanese American citizens was that under the constitution these people cannot be kept locked in concentration camps, was activated to a great extent by the record of the Japanese American soldiers in Italy.

## JAPANESE NATIONALS MAY VOLUNTEER FOR US ARMY

Japanese nationals may enter the US Army by volunteering their services, an announcement Thursday by the War Department revealed. Under newly established procedures, Japanese nationals may volunteer and be inducted if their acceptability is determined by a War Department investigation.

The War Department announcement states:

"Subsequently to the decision by the War Department to accept certain Japanese nationals who volunteer for military service, national headquarters of selective service has sent a memorandum to

## FREE DENTURES MAY BE SECURED

Arrangements have been completed by the hospital and the dental department to supply dentures without cost to the individual. Dentures may be given at government expense if the health of the individual requires such work. The case should be recommended by one of the dentists and approved by the chief medical officer. A limited number of patients can be taken care of each week, and any person who feels that he needs such care should apply to the dental clinic.

all local boards prescribing procedure requested by the War Department for the forwarding for induction of such registrants as well as of those of Japanese extraction or percentage who are United States citizens, national headquarters of selective service announced today.

"Primary requirements for induction of Japanese aliens are that they must volunteer and must be found to be acceptable after investigation by the War Department, and must pass the physical examination at an armed forces induction station. The determination of acceptability will be made on the basis of loyalty and other kindred factors.

"Decision to accept, under prescribed conditions, certain Japanese aliens now residing in this country who are found qualified for military service was made by the War Department in order to make it possible for those who desire to do so to serve in the American armed forces. In no case will a Japanese alien be inducted into the army unless he volunteers for service and his desire to volunteer must be evidenced by a request in writing signed by him. This request, together with a personal history of the alien will be sent to the War Department for a determination of his acceptability.

"When a Japanese alien has been found acceptable for service by the War Department and the local board is so notified it may proceed with the classification and forwarding for induction of such alien in a manner substantially the same as that prescribed for other aliens, whose acceptability also must be determined by the War Department."

# STATE CANNOT PREVENT EVACUEES' RETURN, WARREN

SACRAMENTO--Governor Warren stated last Saturday that if the federal government determines that military necessity no longer requires the exclusion of Japanese from California the State government will give full recognition of their constitutional and statutory rights."

The California governor issued a lengthy statement on the matter declaring that the state government is powerless to prevent the return of the Japanese and reviewed discussion which he said he has had with the Western Defense Command.

The governor declared that in conversations with Western Defense commanders since Pearl Harbor he had pointed out factors which should be considered in connection with any plan for the return of the Japanese during the war "in addition the possibility of air raids, invasion or sabotage."

"I had in mind," Warren said, "that any termination or substantial modification of the existing military order would bring about a reconcentration in California of the great majority of the US Japanese."

"I had in mind that California, by reason of its proximity to the Pacific war area, is crowded with feverish war activity, with debarkation centers, hospitals and with military concentrations and with acute housing shortages and over-taxed law enforcement machinery.

"In their agricultural work, the returning Japanese would be thrown into close contact with and would be a constant irritation to Filipinos and Koreans whose relatives and

# JAMES YAMAMOTO RETURNS TO FARM IN CALIFORNIA

SAN FRANCISCO--James K. Yamamoto, Japanese American citizen, returned to his six-acre berry patchy and home near Cupertino, Santa Clara county, Monday, ending an absence of more than two years, begun with the military evacuation of Japanese from the state, the San Francisco Chronicle reported.

Residents of the community who were aware of the presence of Yamamoto, expressed little or no interest in his return. A number defended his right to reestablish himself on his property because he is a United States citizen.

A Chronicle survey of community sentiment revealed that the return of the citizen of Japanese ancestry is a matter of small importance to the majority of citizens.

While the residents of the community were inclined to take the attitude they would not go out of their way to welcome Yamamoto, none would do anything to make his return unpleasant.

As Yamamoto went quietly about his business of establishing himself on his farm, he said, "I am glad to be back. So many of my schoolmates have come to tell me they are glad to see me."

## "Stop Hating," Says Joe E. Brown

NEW YORK--Joe E. Brown, famous elastic-mouthed comedian on returning from entertaining soldiers in Italy and the Pacific said in an interview here:

"There's one thing I would like you to write about and that's those Japanese Americans that some people are trying to run right out of the world.

"I saw some of them in Italy, 1500 of them and plenty of them in front-line hospitals, badly wounded.

"One kid from Virginia who was fighting with them told me, 'They're just too big for their own skins, they can't do enough.'

"Those Japanese Americans were wonderful, loyal Americans.

"A lot of us are going to have to learn to stop hating them. In fact, we're going to stop hating. As long as we hate, there will be wars...."

## DEPOT RECRUITERS TO ARRIVE HERE MONDAY

Lt. Wiltrot and Roy Takiki recruiters for the Sioux Ordnance depot, and E. R. Lane, Denver WRA officer, will arrive here Monday to discuss opportunities at the depot, the relocation office stated today.

Contrary to earlier announcements, men over 26 years of age, single or married, are eligible for employment at the depot. Deferment requests will be made for them by the depot officials, it was stated.

Single and married women are also eligible for employment at the depot, but they must make arrangements to live with some family since there are no single dormitory accommodations available.

The minimum pay rate, formerly 72 cents per hour for munitions handlers, has been raised to 75 cents.

(Continued from page 2) nationals have been so greatly wronged by the Japanese government.

"We, in California, take pride in our freedom from racial conflict and civil disorder and we are apprehensive of the outcome of reintroducing Japanese in large numbers into our complex and strained war-time life.

"I have stated to the commanding generals that California is not asking for preferential treatment and that it is not trying to force the Japanese into other states of the Union. I have suggested only to evaluate the dangers to the war effort from civilian disturbances.

"I have assured them, however, that if and when they do determine under all these circumstances, that military necessity no longer exists for the exclusion of the Japanese, California proposes to support their determination as patriotically as it did the original order of removal."

Two thousand project farm chickens were killed for the Thanksgiving Day dinner, Roscoe E. Bell, assistant project director, stated today.


Agricultural section workers took the full responsibility for preparing the chickens for delivery to the mess halls.

信に依れば、ロード E. イーストン氏を議長とする加州市民委員会は最近サンタマリア及びランホークバレーのチニ百名次上の農業家より戦後に於て日系人には決して土地を賣りもせない貸しもないと云ふ約束を得たる由なるが同時に又同議長イーストン氏は調査の結果として例のデウヰツテ中將の軍令により凡ての日系人が西部沿岸から撤退させられた以前はサンタバーバラ郡内で二千五百名の日系人が農業に従事し、一千二千エーカーの農園地を支配して居たのである。であつたと発表したるに對し東港に事務所を有する WRA 副
