HOLIDAY TRAVEL CURTAILED FOR EVERYONE

Except in cases of emergencies, short term leaves will not be granted by the WRA during the holiday season from December 15 to January 8.

This policy which applies to appointed personnel as well as evacuees was announced by Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, to co-operate with the Office of Defense Transportation in curtailing holiday travel.

Residents making application for indefinite leave to relocate should avoid these dates for departure as much as possible.

The pay station will be open all day Saturday, December 2, to facilitate release of these checks to the workers.

FIRST DISCHARGED WORLD WAR II VETERAN, SGT. BILL ISHIDA VISITS

1st/Sgt. Bill Ishida, Topaz's first veteran of World War II, arrived here Monday to visit his family who resides at 33-2-D. Bill was seriously wounded in action while fighting with the famous 442nd Infantry Battalion in Italy earlier this year, arrived from Denver where he was under medical care for two months.

Because of the seriousness of his injury, he was given a medical discharge. He served in the army for nearly three years.

EVACUEES FIND SIOUX DEPOT CONDITIONS GOOD

10 CALLED FOR INDUCTION DEC 13

Ten men have been named to report for induction to Fort Douglas on December 13 and nine will leave December 6 for their pre-induction physicals, according to a report.

Bill, who was formerly attached to the medical corps, stationed at Fort Warren, Wyoming, until he volunteered last year for infantry duty with the famous 442nd Infantry, training at Camp Shelby, Mississippi. He was sent overseas in May, 1944.

He was sent back to the states during the latter part of September, for recuperation.

Besides the Purple Heart, the veteran is the holder of the European Theater of War ribbon, and after a brief hesitation admitted he also had the "good conduct" ribbon.

Formerly of Sacramento, he has three brothers, one in the Enlisted Reserve Corp, and four sisters.

With reports returning here of good reception and good housing and working conditions accorded Japanese American families who recently left here to work at the Sioux Ordnance Depot in Nebraska, more residents are applying to work at the depot.

Lt. R. E. Wiltrout of the Sioux Ordnance Depot, Fred Lane, Greeley, Colo., WRA officer, and Mrs. Eva Keavney, Denver WRA officer, are now in the center recruiting additional men and women to work at the depot. Lt. Wiltrout is supervisor of the magazine area at the depot and will work with the Japanese Americans who are recruited from the centers.

He states that the depot could easily hire about 300 more families. Both men and women are needed as munitions handlers, checkers, clerks, domestics and many other types of employment.

Excellent medical, educational, recreational and other facilities are available at the depot, Mrs. Keavney, who visited there last week said.

Dear Editor:

Our families have been living at the Sioux Ordnance Depot for one to two weeks now and we would like to share some of our experience that may be of interest to the center residents.

Our fellow employees, our neighbors in Ordville and the people in Sidney have been very kind and considerate of us, and have appeared anxious to help us become established. So far there are thirteen men from Japanese American families employed on the depot. All these men are now working in one single crew, but we expect that a second crew will be formed very shortly, as new families come in. The men have not been disappointed in their work and it is not difficult.

We have apartments in Ordville, the housing project for Sioux employees which is located just across the road from the depot. Our one-bedroom apartments cost us \$34.50 per month furnished. We like them just fine.

The cost of living is about what we thought it would be. Of course, there is some extra expense the first week or so getting settled and stocked up on supplies. We would like to suggest that new families coming out get their baggage, including kitchen utensils, out as early as possible so that these things will be on hand when you arrive. The depot furnishes linens, kitchen utensils and so on at a flat rate of \$1.00 per month per family if desired, but some utensils are not available. If you have your own kitchen utensils getting them out ahead of time may save you some inconvenience after you get here. Also bring your small articles of furniture such as cupboards and stands.

We like the Sioux Ordnance Depot as a relocation site and are glad we came.

A recent visitor to the center (an evacuee now connected with a church agency) writes his impressions of Topaz.

"Most of the people, as in other centers, are pretty much undecided as to the best step to take, that is, whether to wait until the west coast is open or to leave and start elsewhere and then wait for an opportunity to return to their former homes. Another group I have come into contact are those, who upon talking to them, are anxious to leave and start anew, forgetting about their former homes. This group needs to be stimulated by personal contacts to shake them out of their lethargy. Another group are those who are anxious to leave the center for the sake of their children, but reluctant to do so because of their sense of insecurity on the outside. If a definite opportunity is given these particular cases, they no doubt would leave without hesitation.

"There seems to be a great concern about the aged, the sick, and the dependent, if and when the centers should close. If some form of definite assurance were given them by counseling, I am sure that will aid others in their thinking."

ROOSEVELT FAVORS RELEASE OF JAPANESE AMERICANS FROM CAMPS

(Editor's note: The following article from the Los Angeles Times is reprinted to clarify the Washington news dispatch quoted in the last issue which apparently misinterpreted the President's remarks)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21-- President Roosevelt today refused to give an opinion on the question whether the military situation warrants relaxation of restrictions against persons of Japanese ancestry from the Pacific Coast.

But after a California congressman called for a definite statement of Army policy, Roosevelt indicated that he generally favors releasing all Japanese Americans from war relocation camps.

The President said he did not know whether the danger of espionage or sabotage had diminished sufficiently to justify easing the ban imposed in 1942 or modifying of the rule that military consent must be obtained by evacuees desiring to go back to their former homes on the west coast.

With that comment that good deal of progress has been made in scattering Japanese Americans about the country, the chief executive stated that American citizens have certain rights and privileges which cannot be denied. He also drew attention to the wonderful combat record made in Italy by the battalion of Japanese American soldiers.

SHIZUE TAKEI BRIDE
OF HARUKI KUROIWA

Attired in the traditional white satin gown, Miss Shizue Takei of 6-5-B became the bride of Haruki Kuroiwa Saturday night at the Buddhist Church. An elaborate reception in dining hall 14 followed the wedding ceremony.

The bride, a former Oaklander, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Akinobu Takei. Her husband is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hisakichi Kuroiwa, 14-11-B.

Heavy fighting on the Western front in Europe has accounted for 88 recent nisei casualties, including 20 killed in action and 68 wounded reported within the last 10 days to parents and next of kin living in relocation centers, the WRA of the Department of the Interior said today.

Casualties in France, added to those in Italy and the South Pacific, bring the total to 69 nisei killed, 187 wounded and six missing, WRA reported.

Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, said that the actual total of battle losses among mainland nisei is much larger than the agencies' compilation because more than one-third of the evacuees have relocated to outside communities and that several thousand have never been in a center. WRA has no means of recording casualties among these families.

Of the 13,000 nisei who were inducted into the Army, 2,146 were volunteers or selectees from relocation centers.
