

To be honored at, the. military service are 10 servicemen killed in action, 16 wounded and 2 missing. Of the total casualties of 28, all, but one, were fighting with... the 442nd Infantry Battalion. Five men were killed in Italy and five others were killéd in France.

Chairman for tomorrow's service will be Takashi Tsuzuki. Taking an import-ant part in conducting the ceremony will be the Arthur L. Cahoon Post #89 American Legion of Delta.

DECLARES BALDWIN

SAN FRANCISCO -- "Hostility of Californians to the return of loyal Japanese Americans seems to be ebbing, as this prejudice is being recognized by more people as part of the old West Coast anti-Oriental complex and not associated with the war to the extent assumed," states Roger N. Baldwin, national director of the American Civil Liberties Union at a press conference Sunday.

He explained that this was his observation after a week in California on a nation-wide speaking tour.

The mass evacuation from the coast had one good result, according to Baldwin-Japanese Americans were spread throughout the country, thus eas-ing considerably the problem of assimilation.

In his speech to members of the Friends Center, he said, "It is a fact not foreseen by the prophets before the war that the issue of racial quality beforethe law has emerged as the major aspect of civil liberties, growing out of the impact of a war for democratic

"The most devastating Axis propaganda among the darker peoples has been directed against the United Nations' racial practices of white supremacy, and imperialist system which accompanies them, as demolishing their claim of fighting the war for democracy and the four freedoms,

"At home the Negro is conducting an unprecedented campaign for his full share in our democracy with two objectives, victory over the Axis and over white prejudice."

Sioux Ordnance Depot at Sidney, Nebraska has a liberal policy for very. requesting draft deferments, recruiters who are now here from the depot stated. A request for deferment is made by Sioux Ordnance before a .. person actually begins to work. It is made as soon as a person applies to work there,

As soon as an application to work is made, the relocation office informs the depot officials of the applicant's draft status, board number and location. Sioux depot then writes immediately to his board with a request that no action be taken in reapplicant, gard to the pending his clearance by the provost marshall general's office. This stops bither induction or changes in classification.

If the applicant is accepted:for employment, a deferment is requested in the usual channels.

two chance to fight to serve the principles that Tokyo-born Henry Ebihara I have been brought up on and which I will not rifice at any time."

> On November 26, Ebihara had his request granted, for he is the first of his race in the United States to volunteer under a new War Department : ruling which permits Japanese nationals to enlist in the army.

Ebihara, a war worker in Cleveland since he left Topaz, Utah, last year, to be said he expects called up soon for a physical examination preliminary to his induction.

"I want to go, to the China theater and fight the Japanese Fascists," he said.

Asked whether he would find it difficult to fight against his people, Ebihara said:

"I don't regard this war as a fight of one race against another. It is a war of ideals and principles, of democracy against fascism. The latter must be wiped out and I want to do my part of that job.

Ebihara was brought to the United States by his parents when he was years old but he maintains he is "American in thought, American in act--as American as any other citizen."

He grew up in New Mexico and attended New Mexico State College for nearly two years.

(Editor's note: Henry Ebihera's letter to President Roosevelt pleading for a chance to enlist for pleading active duty has been reprinted in the Pacific Citizen, Trek, and more recently in Carey McWilliams' book "Prejudice--Japanese Americans, Symbol of In-tolerance". The letter was written in February, 1943, when nisei volunteers for the army to train for combet duty were being cruited in the relocation centers.


