DETROIT HOSTEL ARRANGES SUITE FOR FAMILIES

DETROIT, Mich.—In order to make it possible for families to relocate to Detroit as complete units, Fellowship House, the hostel in the city of Detroit, has set aside a suite including cooking facilities for use by the family. A special rental of \$12.50 a week will be charged for the rooms and no time limit will be placed on the length of occupancy.

Inquiries regarding this suite should be made to Rev. Shigeo Tanabe at the Fellowship House located at 130 East Grand Avenue, Detroit, Michigan. This move closely mirrors what has been done by the hostels in both Cincinnati and Cleveland.

Rev. Tanabe said if sufficient requests are received from family groups, serious considerations would be given to opening up more family suites.

DELTA-TOPAZ BUS LINE TO START

California State Senators Want Continued Japanese Exclusion

SAN FRANCISCO—President Roosevelt, the Western Defense Command and the War Department were urged strongly Tuesday by the State Senate's committee on Japanese resettlement "Not to permit the return of Japanese to the Pacific Coast, and particularly California, for the duration of the war," the San Francisco Chronicle reported.

The committee, which has held hearings throughout California for the past year, concluded its sessions here by adopting its resolution of protest against the return of Japa-

nese evacuees.

The Senators said it was evident the war in the South Pacific "will last a long time," becoming "more intense, bloody and on an increasing scale, and that the war effort in California will become vastly greater, and that ammunition, material and equipment will be shipped through our ports in ever increasing and tremendous volume."

The resolution declared the war's demands necessitated "security and freedom from turmoil or the threat of turmoil in our State" and said: "the menace to our national security by the presence of Japanese in our midst, as annunciated by General John L. DeWitt, still continues."

Fifty-seven men were nominated Tuesday night in various blocks as candidates for the council election which will be held December 19.

Of the total number of nominees, 16 are incumbents and 15 will take office by acclamation as the sole candidates from their respective blocks. With five nominees, block 40 has the most candidates.

Polls in the various blocks will be open from 8 AM to 2:30 PM. Workers may be excused from work for one hour to vote. However, they should inform their section supervisors beforehand the hour which they will be absent for the voting.

Successful candidates will take office next month and will serve until June, 1945.

LEGAL AID ASSOC. TO HELP EVACUEES

The National Association of Legal Aid Organizations will co-operate with the War Relocation Authority in providing legal services to relocated evacuees who do not have the financial means to employ a lawyer.

Services provided by Legal Aid Societies in the various communities cover both advice and representation in court and generally all types of civil matters. Among the more common problems requiring legal aid are installment contracts, wage claims, landlord and tenant, recovery of personal property, small loans, family relations and workmen's compensation.

The National Association of Legal Aid Organizations is a voluntary association of about sixty of these societies. Their names and addresses may be secured at the relocation office.

EVACUEE PROPERTY OFFICE FUNCTIONS

WRA To Assist In Sale Of Evacuee-Owned Cars

(This is the third of a series of five articles dealing with the services and limitations of the evacuee property program.)

Requests to the Property Office by evacuees who wish to sell their autos or trucks must be accompanied by ownership and registration certificates signed by the owner of the vehicle. If the evacuee does not have the certificates he should then make out an "Application for Duplicate Ownership Certificates". In such a case, he must be sure that the application for it is made out in the same name as the original.

SALE OF CAR

An evacuee wishing to sell an auto or truck which has not been in use since evacuation (but which has been in storage) should provide an "affidavit of Non-Operation". The evacuee should write to the custodian of the truck or auto in storage and authorize him to allow the WRA to inspect and remove the car when it is sold. In cases where the vehicle is being used by the custodian, arrangements for

its release should also be made by the evacuee.

The evacuee-seller should understand that cars in storage usually require some servicing such as a battery recharge or a new battery. Therefore it is necessary that the evacuee provide funds for placing the car in usable condition so it can be demonstrated to prospective buyers. If a car is to be sold "as is" without any repair work, a top price cannot be obtained. Evacuees should understand that later models bring higher prices but that there are OPA price ceilings which cannot be violated.

The evacuee should provide the Property Office with information as to storage charges, if any, and if they or any other charges exist, they must be paid before the car is put up for sale.

DRIVER HIRE

The evacuee must remember that the WRA is not able to obtain or provide drivers to move evacuee-owned vehicles from the military area. It is the responsibility of the evac-

uee to hire the driver and arrange for his pay.

Under OPA regulations, ration boards are authorized to provide special rationing of gasoline for the removal of automobiles from one part of the country to another when a legal chance of residence occurs. Only the owner or authorized driver may apply for supplemental gasoline. The driver should also be authorized in writing to obtain the car from its place of storage and to sign the necessary papers to obtain gasoline rations.

GAS RATIONING

The Office of Defense Transportation will not authorize gasoline rations for a trip of more than two hundred miles for trucks or pick-up trucks and the evacuee usually has to arrange to have his truck shipped to him by rail if the distance is over the 200 mile limit.

(How can an evacuee go about collecting debts? How can he arrange to lease or rent properties? The next article will tell how the Property Office can aid him. Watch for it.)

JACL SUGGESTS CONFAB ON MINORITIES TO F.D.R.

The National JACL conference held in Salt Lake City earlier this month suggested to President Roosevelt to open a White House Conference on Minorities.

In its petition to the President, the League pointed out that the domestic problem of minorities is of growing national concern, especially typified in the wartime treatment of persons of Japanese descent. Negro aspirations, anti-Semitism, the Spanish speaking groups in the United States and their effect on the good neighbor policy and the status of Orientals in the US in relation to Asiatic policies were

pointed out as necessary items for such a meeting.

The national conference also went on record reiterating first recommendations to General Bonesteel, commander of the Western Defense Command.

1. Automatic clearance for nisei soldier's families to the west coast.

2. Revocation of the edict denoting certain articles as "contraband".

3. Issuance of a statement by the Western Defense Command that disloyalty was not the basis for the evacuation.

4. Declaration of policy civilian authorities to protect evacuees on their return.

RETURN TO COAST TO BE DISCUSSED

MODESTO--State Senator Hugh P. Donnelly, chairman of the Senate fact finding committee, announced this week that a hearing will be conducted in San Francisco on Japanese resettlement in the state.

The meeting will be attended by H. J. McClatchy, secretary of the joint immigration committee, U. S. Webb, former state attorney general, and Senators George J. Hatfield, Jeff R. Dorsey, Irwin T. Quinn, and Herbert W. Slater of the fact finding committee.

WARTIME COAST RETURN OF JAPANESE CONDEMNED

SACRAMENTO--H. J. McClatchy, executive secretary of the California Joint Immigration Committee, Saturday condemned the wartime return of Japanese to the Pacific Coast as "a grave error of policy", but declared that the rights of those who are al-

lowed to come back to their former homes must be protected.

Military authorities who ordered the relocation of the Japanese after Pearl Harbor have allowed the Japanese to return as

a result of "a continuing pressure from the War Relocation Authority and other interests selfishly seeking some gain for themselves," McClatchy told the executive committee of the California Department of the American Legion.

"Such a return," McClatchy said, "is bound to create a spirit of unrest and must necessarily increase the protective efforts of those agencies charged with security measures. But our committee is unanimous in holding that if the military authorities revoke previous orders as to the Japanese then those who are American citizens are legally entitled to move freely any place in the United States, not excepting California or the West Coast."

"You, as Legionnaires, are bound by your oath of membership to see that every citizen does peacefully enjoy the rights of citizenship, because each and everyone of you has agreed to maintain law and order; to make right the master of might; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy."

442ND VETERANS TEACH NEWCOMERS

WITH THE SEVENTH ARMY IN FRANCE--Veteran members of the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team recently instructed new replacements in the use of rifles and automatic weapons in battle, on a hillside near Marseilles. These Japanese American soldiers, most of whom are from the mainland of the United States, joined the unit at Bagnoli, Italy, and have been questioning the old timers about the finer points of fighting.

Private Isamu Hironaka, 2903-B, Tule Lake, California, a rifleman, was sprawled on the ground, hidden from view by scanty camouflage, while his platoon sergeant barked instructions.

His friend, Private First Class Robert H. Ikei of 212 Huale Street, Honolulu, Hawaii, said, "You look okay to me. I imagine the final polishing up you'll have to pick up at the front." Ikei, a newcomer in the unit, was looking at his comrade with Pfc. Roy Ikeda, 6-11, F of Topaz, Utah.

Nakata emerged the high scorer of the game while the center for Hincklians came second to Nakata with 24 points.


