WRA WORK IN S.F.

J. Hugh Turner of the office will relocation leave this week end on defield offices in the Bay Area.

Turner stated that if residents wish to have inquiries made around the Bay Area they should contact him sometime, this week,

conducting hearings here since December 17 has notified 272 evacuees that their status has NOT been finally determined.

The army team has recommended that 157 of 272 be added to the army's cleared list. The 272 cases will be reviewed by the commanding general of the Western Defense Command, in San Francisco. The men will remain on project as long as necessary to serve individual exclusion orders on persons remaining on army "stop" list after the cases are reviewed.

All residents not notified otherwise became free today to return to the West Coast military area from which they were excluded in larch, 1942. They may leave upon checking in their WRA property but their relocation plans mist be approved by WRA if they wish relocation assistance grants.

Persons who receive inorders dividual exclusion may resettle in other parts of the United States outside the West Coast exclusion area.

Evacuees still found ineligible for relocation after review will be segregated in a center or centers not yet designated that ultimately will be administered by the Justice. Department.

pointed Hoffman aliens now free to return to the West Coast still are required to notify the Immigration and FBI offices of their movements. Eligible aliena may obtain travel permits by applying to the WRA leave office here.

Lt. Col. R.G. DeVecchio, who heeds the army team here, expressed appreciation for the co-operation of the residents in reporting for interviews.

GI'S OVERSEAS PROTEST HOOD RIVER DECISION

WITH THE 7TH ARMY ON THE WESTERN FRONT-Hundreds of AID TO EVACUEES veteran American soldiers were indignant Saturday night over an item in the army newspaper, Stars and Social Security funds, a-Stripes, which said that an American Legion post in Hood River, Ore., had advised Americans of Japanese ancestry to sell any property they own and leave town.

The dispatch, which moved dozens of GI's to prepare to write letters of protest to President Roosevelt and congressmon, said the legion post had advertized in local newspapers that citizens of Japanese ancestry were unwanted.

There was violent vocal of Lt. Gen. Patch's original divisions -- the 36th and 45th--who know the gal- "UP IN ARMS" lant record of the 442nd infantry regiment, composed mostly of Japanese Americans.

Reaction was particularly vituperative against the legion post's action, among the first battalion of the 141st regiment of the 36th division-a battalion which just two months ago was rescued from a German trap near Bruyeres by Japanese American troops who slashed through German lines to the isolated battalion at great coast to themselves.

Operated through co-operative agreements between the Social Security Board and the state departments of welfare, the program is known as Services and Assistance to Enemy Aliens and Others Affected by Restrictive Governmental Action.

The pamphlet will plain to resettlers how to apply at a public assistance or WRA office when in need of such aid as medical care or money for necessary living expenses. It will advise them they need not be legal residents of the community in order to seek counsel or

Two hundred and fifty copies of the newly issued Japanese edition of the pamphlet entitled "Facts About Philadelphia" have just been received at the center and are now being distributed. Residents interested in becoming informed about relocation opportunities in Philadelphia and in other communities in Pennsylvania and Southern New Jersey are invited to obtain copies of this pamphlet from the relocation program office.

A number of photographs of issei and their families who have resettled from various centers appear in the 20-page pamphlet, together with SDV-

eral pictures of nisei resettlers, a cover photograph of Philadelphia, and a map of Philadelpnia.

The pamphlet describes services the available through the WRA relocation office in Philadelphia and through local agencies and organizations to families and individuals who come East to resettle in Philadelphia or vicinity. It also gives information about job opportunities in cities and on farms; living costs; educational, cultural, and recreational facilities; and the early history of Philadelphia, nation's third largest city and one of its most historic places.

Shunji F. Nishi, also an Episcopel clergyman, who works with the Cleveland Fedoration of Churches on relocation programs; and Robert M. Cullum, Great Lakes Area supervisor of the WRA.

Outcome of the meeting was the appointment of a nominating committee which was empowered to formulate sub-committees on housing, public information, community participation and employment.
