EVACUEES RECEIVE WARM WELCOME On Return to San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO -- Japanese Americans returning to the San Francisco Bay region are beginning to feel that in the long run their evacuation may prove to have been a blessing in disguise, a newspaper survey indicated today.

They say they are welkindness comed with and courtesy instead of the rudeness and violence they had feared. Employers are inviting former domestics to dinner as howored guests, and 'a Japanese face on Market Street seldom brings a second glance from hurrying passers-by.

"I believe it. is because Americans have always gone to bat for the underdog," 'explains Frank M. Nakashima, who is returning from Denver to his San Leandro, Cal., flower nursery business. "Ameri-(Continued on page 5)

(Editor's note: The following letter was reprinted from a newspaper clipping an overseas nisei soldier sent to a friend in this center.) Dear Editor:

We've seen beaucoup combat and feel qualified to pass judgment on combat troops. A short time ago my platoon came in contact with a part of a Jap-American U- only to the nit. We have seen them in action and we label them the best of our troops. They are very aggressive in attack and have no regard for casualties while attacking. Will be furnished transporting know their weapons and employ them to the best adtaction from their present vantage -- they use them all. Their fox-holes are well camouflaged and are constructed for fighting purposes

and not for a comfortable night's sleep.

I noticed especially the equipment they carried. Judging them by equipment alone, they would have been called rookies. They carried compasses, field glasses, telephones, bayonets and other items frequently "lost" by our troops. In addition to this equipment, they also carry overcoats and blankets. Yet these Jap-Americans have fought with us around Cassino, and Rome, and we know that they are not rookies but exceptionally damn good soldiers.

Such soldiers are deserving of citizenship--much more than a lot of blueblooded Americans who have their citizenship handed down to them for two or three generations. These Jap-Americans are fighting to prove they are worthy and are doing a good job-ask the Jerries.

STUDENTS ARE FIIGIBLE FOR RELO ASSISTANCE

Students who have accepted indefinite leave in order to attend educational institutions outside the centers will be entitled same assistance as other persons on indefinite leave. will be furnished transporpoint of relocation to the state from which they were evacuated, if they have an approved relocation plan.

If students expect to assist parents or other relatives in relocation elsewhere, such plans should be developed by mail and the student evacuee should meet his family at the new point of relocation rather than returning to the center. If the relocation is on the West Coast, the student may obtain transportation on the same basis as other relocating evacuees and route it via the center.

Group service 11oans are available to farmers wishing to pool their resources for the purchase and use of services and equipment such as purebred sires and machinery which they cannot afford to own individually. These loans carry three per cent interest and run for a period not to exceed the lifetime of the facility purchased.
