The need for federal assistance until evacuees can get fully reestablished will be phasized.

3. To request the WRA to use its facilities to have the federal govern-ment make long term loans to evacuees who were formerly in agriculture or business to enable them to get reestablished as near-

CHICAGO LAUDED AS GIVING BEST TREATMENT TO JAPANESE AMERICANS

CHICAGO--This city's treatment of relocating Japanese Americans has been the best of any large city in the country, the congregation of the First Baptist Church, 935 E. 50th St., was told last Sunday. The church itself was also lauded for having a relocated American of Japanese ancestry as associate pastor.

Dr. John W. Thomas of New York City, executive of the American Baptist Homes Mission Society, was the speaker at the special service marking the first anniversary of the Rev. Jitsuo Morikawa as associate pastor.
