## 13,300 ACRES OF TOPAZ FARM LAND ON SALE

Approximately 13,300 acres of irrigated land within the Central Utah Relocation Project will be leased to farmers of this region this spring, Roscoe E. Bell, acting project director, announced today.

Invitations to bid on this land probably will be mailed to postmasters early next week for posting in Delta, Hinkley, Desert, Fillmore, Oak City, Richfield and Lyndyl so that prospective bidders may study descriptions of tracts offered. Bids will be accepted for 10 days after the invitations are posted.

Twenty-four tracts, ranging from 30 to 1,800 acres in area, are available. They include old alfalfa, new seeding of alfalfa, wheat and barley planted last fall, acreage nearly ready to plant, stubble fields, sweet clover, pasture seeded last spring, irrigated pasture, non-irrigated pasture and range land. The irrigation land carries with it water shares mainly in the Abraham Irrigation company.

Inspection of the property is invited. Wendell Palmer, farm section chief, will show the tracts to interested parties.

## EVACUATION CASE DENIED HEARING

WASHINGTON--The Supreme Court on February 12 declined to reconsider its decision of December 18 which held that the Army's evacuation of persons of Japanese ancestry in 1942 was legal at the time the order was carried out.

The high tribunal turned down an appeal for rehearing by Fred Korematsu who was convicted for failure to report for evacuation.

H. Liebes and Company, a firm which handles large quantities of furs and clothing, has openings for a male receiving clerk, a women billing machine operator and two women as "stuffing clerks".

The receiving clerk will not be required to have previous experience but must be neat and accurate in checking. Wages will be \$48.75 for a 48 hour week. Billing machine operator will be paid

\$146.50 per month for 40 hour week or \$190 if she prefers to work 48 hours per week.

"Stuffing clerks" need not have previous experience. They will be required to do simple clerical work consisting of alphabetizing sales slips. Pay will be \$151.45 a month for a 48 hour week.

At 2:30 PM he will meet with the community council and representatives of other center groups. He will leave for Los Angeles Saturday morning.

## 11 TOPAZANS ACCEPTED FOR SPRING TERM AT CAL

## JAPANESE AMERICAN SERVICEMEN HONORED BY DETROIT, MICH. CHURCH

DETROIT--An unusual memorial and recognition service dedicated to Japanese Americans in the armed forces of the United States was held on the last Saturday in January in the First Baptist Church of this city. The address of the evening was given by Dr. T.T. Brumbaugh, executive secretary of the Detroit Council of Churches, on the subject: "Loyalty to Highest".

One hundred and seven candles, arranged around the altar, were lighted by relatives or close friends in honor of the absent ones serving either in the Pacific or European theaters of war. One part of the service was set aside for the thirteen who had been killed in action.

This was a feature of the program of the United Ministry to Resettlers, sponsored by the Detroit Council of Churches and of the Fellowship Hour, held each Sunday at the First Baptist Church.

## 'BLOOD OF NISEI AS GOOD AS ANY'

BOSTON--Charles W. Frascotti of Milford, Mass., state commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, protested against accepting blood from Americans of Japanese ancestry after a group of relocated nisei donated blood to the Red Cross. "I wouldn't want any Japanese blood and I don't think our servicemen would," he said.

Alan R. Morse, chairman of the Boston Red Cross Blood donor center, declared: "The blood of those patriotic nisei, for our purposes, is fully as good as any descendant from the Mayflower."

## MESA ORCHARD CO. RECRUITS WORKERS

The Mesa Orchard Company in Mesa, Idaho offers year-around employment for families and single workers.

Housing for the workers is available in nine 4-room unfurnished cottages and 39 cabins. Rent is free for families.

Meals for single persons will be served on a co-operative basis in a mess hall.

Wages for men is 60 cents an hour and 50 cents for women. Work will consist of pruning, spraying, cultivating, irrigating, thinning, and harvesting fruit.

## PVT. ODA SERVES WITH GERMAN PW UNIT IN ITALY

ALLIED FORCE HEADQUARTERS, Italy.—Private Harry H. Oda, brother of Edward T. Oda, Topaz, Utah, is serving as a clerk in the German section with the 152nd Military Police Prisoner of War Processing Platoon, a unit in Allied Force Headquarters.

This organization, established in this theater in March, 1943, is a prisoner of war information bureau, operating under the Provost Marshal General. Fifty percent of the organization has been in combat, and 20 percent of these have received the Purple Heart.

Overseas eight months, Pvt. Oda wears the Mediterranean Theater Ribbon with one Battle Participation Star and has been awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge, the Purple Heart and the Good Conduct Medal. He was formerly with the 42nd Infantry.

Plagued with bad luck which took one of its players out of the game permanently in the early part of the contest and disabled another for a quarter, block 20 fell under the might of the powerful block 12 casabans in a 48-41 thriller Sunday afternoon.
