The entire San Francisco Bay Area is considered one metropolitan district for purposes of alien trav-Assistant Director el, R.B. Cozzens, San Francis-co, informed Project Director L.T. Hoffman yesterday.

Alien relocatees will rot have to obtain a special permit from the disdaily trict attorney for commuting or irregular trips for business purposes anywhere in the Bay Area providing that departure and return occur on the same day.

The Evergreen Hostel at East Los Angeles was epened March 1 to provide temporary housing for evacuees seeking homes and jobs in that area. The hostel is being and 11 at the operated by Rev. The two-story building. formerly a boarding school for Mexican girls, heg large rooms which were planned for classroom and dormitory purposes. It is expected to accommodate

30 to 40 persons.

The work of the hostel will be done cooperatively with each guest sharing in household chores. There charge will be a nominal of a dollar a day for room and board for the first days of the visit. After jobs are secured, or if guests desire to remain longer than 10 days, a regular charge of \$1.50 a day will be made. Half rates will be charged for children under 10 years of

Ration points will be collected in proportion to the number of days a guest stays at the hostel.

Applications should be made well in advance to the directors of the hos-tel, Rev. Kowta and Miss Rhoads. In view of the limited space, it will be necessary to receive aparoval of definite dates before reservation is valid recontly.
