WORK AGENCIES TO ASSIST WRA IN RELOCATION

Many WRA employment offices are expected to be established very soon in various parts of the Midwest and the East to assist in the carrying out of the WRA's new national policy, which calls for the permanent resettlement of evacuees into normal American communities, declared Project Director Charles F. Ernst last Wednesday in a statement to the Times.

These offices will cooperate with various national churches and social welfare organizations which are taking active interest in the program, the statement continued.

Charged with the responsibility of carrying out the policy, Thomas W. Holland, chief of the national WRA Employment Division, has recently set up in Chicago the first of these offices. He is now visiting the relocation centers to coordinate the resettlement work with outside employment.

"Now that the new relocation policy has been announced, arrangements have been made for issuing indefinite leaves which carry no completion date," Ernst stated. "It is expected that from now on these leave permits will become a routine matter."

"Of course, it is expected that at least 75 to 85 per cent of the residents of Topaz will remain here. With this in mind, each day sees the purchase of new animals for the farm, of additional material for the building of schools and other necessary buildings, the planting of several thousand trees, and in general the development of all sorts of improvements which will make living at Topaz more comfortable and agreeable."

It was added that as part of this plan for domestic improvement, the Community Council is considering the advisability of making some slight exchanges of housing arrangements soon for the benefit of residents who because of illness or need of special diet or because of special need of medical services should properly reside as near to the hospital as possible. These changes will affect only 3 or 4 blocks.

HOME NURSING PROGRAM OUTLINED

Mrs. Barbara Takahashi, director of Public Health Nursing, outlines the general program of the home nurses as follows: "The necessity of protecting the health of the individual and the general public is stressed because of the congested living quarters, common sanitary facilities, and the radical changes in the climate and environmental conditions.

"These home nurses serve the community and will be of untold service to the hospital staff.

"The duties of the home nurses will be to check the patient before the doctor is called, assist those confined to their homes and instruct members of the family in general nursing care, assist in pre-natal and post-natal care.

"One home nurse is assigned to each block and will be on the hospital payroll. As the necessity arises, additional nurses will be called to join the volunteers.

"With the cooperative aid of the block managers, to date 54 women have enrolled in the class, and it is with a deep sense of gratification and sincerity that the director welcomes this group as symbolizing a generous gesture in rendering a great service to the welfare of the City."

Enlistees will be sworn into the Army by Capt. Tobin.

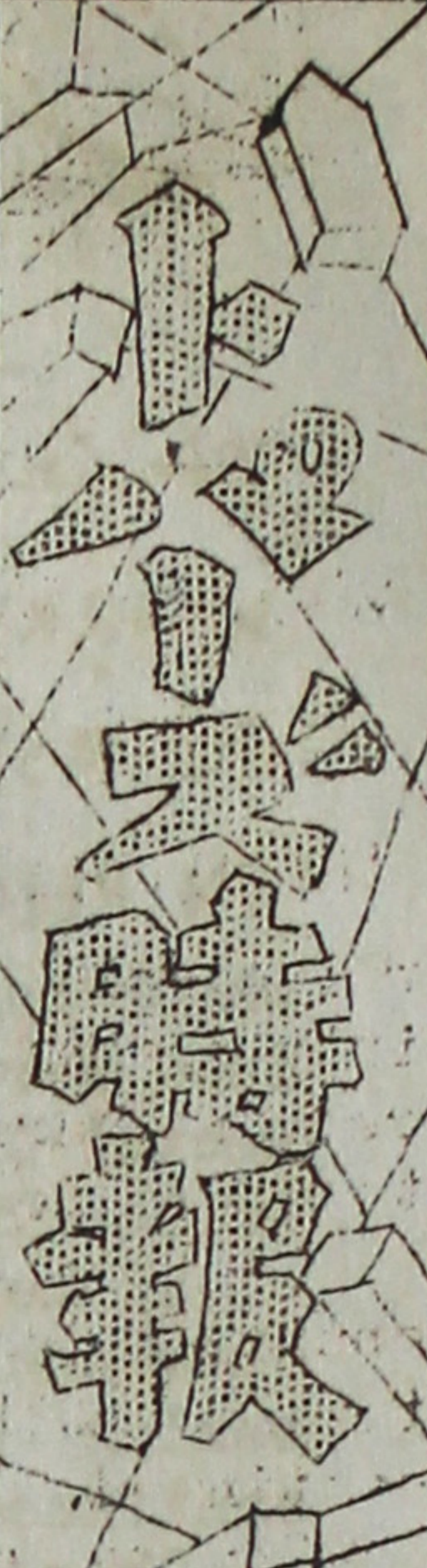
