8 ACKNOWLEDGE EXCLUSION CASE DECISION SUGGESTIONS POSTPONED BY L.A. JUDGE OF SLC MEETING

Responses to the 21-point recommendations made recently by the All-Evacuee Conference in Salt Lake City has been received from eight individuals and agencies, the local council reported today.

No answer will be received from WRA director Dillon Myer until he returns from his current tour of the west coast states and relocation centers, Malcolm Pitts, acting director in Washington, said.

The following persons acknowledged receipt of the recommendations and expressed interest in them: John J. McCloy, assistant Secretary of War; Malcolm Pitts, acting WRA director; Mrs. Maynard F. Thayer, chairman, Pasadena chapter of the Committee of American Principles and Fair Play; Rev. Hugh Lavery, Catholic Foreign Mission Society of America in Los Angeles; A.L. Wirin, ACLU attorney; Herbert Wechsler, assistant attorney general; Harry S. Truman, vice-president; and F. DeAmat, Consul of Spain in San Francisco.

RELOCATED PUPILS IN IDAHO CAN GO TO PUBLIC SCHOOLS WITHOUT FEES

Children of Japanese families who have established residence in Idaho are entitled to all public school privileges without paying tuition. Attorney General Frank Langley has ruled in a reversal of an opinion issued by the Idaho attorney general's office last year.

Ernest J. Palmer, WRA relocation officer at Boise, reports that Langley gave this opinion:

EIGHT TO LEAVE FOR ACTIVE DUTY

Eight more men are listed to report for active duty to Fort Douglas on April 2, the selective service office announced today.

Called are Yasumasa Furuya, 30-4-AB; Yoshio J. Hanamoto, 37-3-AB; Peter G. Kitagawa, 36-4-CD; Yoshiro Kitagawa, 36-4-CD; Tomio Kitano, 34-3-D; Jim H. Nakano, 5-4-C; Harry A. Nakao, 34-4-C; and Motoki Yatabe, 11-10-A.

The selective service office also reported that the next groups to be called for induction and pre-physicals will go on April 4.

RELOCATION

A total of 3,575 persons left the centers since the beginning of this year, 647 went to California, 193 to other Pacific coast states and 2,735 to other parts of the United States.

"There is no legal objection to Japanese establishing residence in this state, and by reason of such residence they should be entitled to send their children to public schools without payment of tuition."

In 1944 the attorney general ruled that persons of Japanese ancestry were being placed in Idaho communities by the WRA, and therefore were still under WRA jurisdiction and not entitled to attend Idaho public schools without paying tuition. Only a few schools, however, applied the decision.

ty of individual military exclusion orders against those of Japanese descent.

In the course of the cases, Judge Hall stated that they were of great importance, explaining, "although the persons whose rights are involved in these cases are of the Japanese race, they involved the rights of every American." To this statement of Judge Hall, ACLU counsel, A.L. Wirin countered: "This is precisely

SUPREME COURT TO HEAR ALIEN LAND LAW CASES

CHI. WMC CONTROLS MIGRANT WORKERS

A decision by the Supreme Court of California, as well as by the Supreme Court of the United States, upon the constitutionality of the California Alien Land Law, seemed probable last week when Superior Court Judge Charles G. Haines expressed that view in the escheat cases filed in behalf of the state of California against the Hirose and Oyama families, the Open Forum stated.

Representing the Japanese families, A. L. Wirin, attorney for the ACLU, and Hugh E. MacBeth, well-known Negro attorney, urged Judge Haines to dismiss the suits on the ground that the Alien Land Law denied persons of Japanese ancestry the equal protection of the laws as guaranteed by the Fourteenth Amendment to the US Constitution because it discriminated against persons solely because of their race.

Twenty-year-old decisions of the California Supreme Court and of the Supreme Court of the United States, according to the attorneys, were no longer binding in view of the more liberal views of the Supreme Court upon race in recent years and the growing opposition to racial discrimination expressed by the highest courts in the land.

why the ACLU is concerned about these cases. Long ago we have learned that unless the weakest member of community--the poor the defenseless, the victims of race prejudice--are fully protected, the rights of all are equally in danger."

Judge Hall, indicated, however, that he could not determine the wisdom of the military orders; that we are in a total war; and that we must rely upon the judgment of the military authorities in dealing with potential dangers from espionage and sabotage.

Chief stress in the legal argument of the ACLU

Under recent regulations, the War Manpower Commission controls employment on all in-migrants to Chicago, it was announced by W.W. Lessing, relocation officer in Chicago.

Relocators are advised that they cannot select their own jobs except in case of farms and possibly domestic work. The War Manpower Commission refers practically all persons to war plants.

There are still numerous essential war jobs for both issei and nisei.

attorneys before Judge Hall was that the Individual Exclusion Procedure enforced by the military authorities was unconstitutional because unfair, in that subjects of the exclusion orders were not given an opportunity to cross examine witnesses furnishing information against them; and were not furnished with the sources of the information relied upon by the military authorities in issuing the exclusion orders against them. These, according to the ACLU attorneys, deprived persons of "due process of law" as guaranteed by the Fifth Amendment of the Bill of Rights to the United States Constitution.

RULES, REGULATIONS FOR PLAYOFFS REVEALED

Following are the rules and regulations to be followed at the playoffs this week:

Any team using player not listed on the official roster shall automatically forfeit game in which player participates.

Each team is allowed 5 timeouts consisting of 1 minute each during game.

Five fouls will be allowed each player.

The commission will furnish referees for the contests.

STOP TIME RULES

Game will be played by 10 minute quarters with 10 minutes at half-time. Inter-

mission between quarters will be 2 minutes each.

Should player on team making goal intentionally tap, kick or grab ball, a technical foul will be called.

In the case of overtime tilts, the first overtime will be 5 minutes and the second will be 3 minutes. The team making the first two points in the third extra will be declared the winner. Substitution in the overtime will be permitted only if a player is called out of the game on 5 fouls.

RUNNING TIME RULES

Games shall be played

by 13 minute quarters with same intermission between quarters and half-time as stop time.

Five timeouts will be allowed in the game with no substitutes or timeouts during last 3 minutes of game. Substitution in the last 3 minutes will be allowed only should a player commit 5 fouls. A 5-minute notice will be given referees before end of game.

The first two overtimes will be 5 minutes apiece and the team making the first two points in the third overtime will be declared the winner of the contest.
