SPAIN WITHDRAWS AS PROTECTOR OF JAPANESE NAT'L'S.

The State Department has notified the WRA that the Spanish government is no longer acting as representative of Japanese interests in the US, according to a wire received here from the Washington WRA.

Newspaper dispatches last week from Madrid, Spain, stated that the move was made to protest the deaths of 172 Spanish nationals in Japanese internment camps in the Philippines.

Captain Antonio Martin, vice consul of Spain in San Francisco, who was at Tule Lake last week, left the center immediately after receiving orders by telephone of Spain's withdrawal as protecting power.

According to the Newell Star, only two other neutral countries are in a position to represent Japan-Switzerland, which represents the US in Japan, and Sweden which said that she lacked the sufficient personnel to undertake such work.

NEXT WEEK WILL BE "NEW ORLEANS WEEK" HERE; ACTIVITIES SLATED.

Next week has been designated "New Orleans Week" by the administration to acquaint residents with relocation opportunities in the South.

Fine motion pictures depicting cities, people and industries will be offered in the auditorium next Thursday and Friday nights. A speaker will answer questions. Photographs of evacuee relocators in the South will be exhibited, and literature distributed.

The Paramount cinema, "Dixie" starring Bing Crosby and Dorothy Lamour will be shown next week if satisfactory booking arrangements can be made.

The Topaz Times will publish a special supplement on New Orleans and the South. The complete program will be announced later.

TRANSPORTATION PROBLEMS OF RELOCATORS DISCUSSED

Plans were recently discussed for handling the transportation for the expected increase in the number of relocators in the near future, the relocation office stated.

As the relocation pace steps up, an entire train car will be chartered with two or three days notice to take care of 25 passengers or more. Such cars will go from Delta to Ogden.

If there is a demand or an occasion when more than 25 persons relocate to the bay area a special car may be chartered all the way to the west coast. Arrangements will also be made to have the Delta-Topaz bus make more runs per day so that all travelers can be accommodated. If necessary some of the relocators will be put on the south bound trains to California.

The Tooele Ordnance depot has office work openings for girls on regular civil service appointments on CAF 2 and 3 classifications. These positions pay \$1440 and \$1620 per year. James Jennings of the Salt Lake City WRA and Kenzi Shiota of the Tooele depot will be here from tomorrow through this week to discuss opportunities at the Tooele with any interested persons.

Mr. Briehart of the Salt Lake City civil service office will accompany them. Persons with questions pertaining to civil service may consult Briehart.

NO SEASONAL LEAVE PROGRAM PLANNED

"No seasonal leave program of any nature is being considered," WRA Director Myer said in a wire received today. Representatives of the National Cannery and Utah Cannery associations who met with Myer understand that there is no possibility of reconstituting seasonal leaves.

WRA PROMISES AID IN PLACING CHILDREN IN OUTSIDE PUBLIC SCHOOLS, VILES SAYS

WRA will give every possible assistance to see that pupils will be able to enter outside schools without credit losses after center schools close June 1, N.E. Viles, education advisor from the Washington office, said here today.

All West Coast schools and state educational departments, colleges and teachers' associations throughout the remainder of the country already have been advised that To-

paz schools are fully approved and credits from here are good any place," Viles said in an interview.

"Students leaving center schools will be furnished record forms showing their grades and standing. All pupil records will be serviced from the centers until Nov. 1 and thereafter from Washington."

Viles arrived here from Manzanar yesterday and will leave for Granada Thursday.

There will be a special service for adults at the Buddhist church on Saturday night, it was also reported.

NEW YORK RESETTLEMENT GROUPS DISCUSS PROBLEMS OF RELOCATORS

NEW YORK--The first of a series of meetings on resettlement problems sponsored by the Family Resettlement Committee of the Japanese American organizations in New York City took place here on March 14 at the Japanese Christian Institute. At this meeting officials of the Civilian War Assistance Unit of the New York City Department of Welfare, the local Community Service Society, and WRA discussed "Problems of Family Resettlement" before an audience of some 60 persons, the majority of whom were issei resettlers in the New York area.

"We have been working and planning for nearly a year with the local WRA office, with which we are constantly in touch, and now the services of the City's Department of Welfare are geared to meet the needs of any evacuee requiring our help," said Miss V. Charlotte Authier, acting director of public assistance for the department. "The resettlers are our friends, and we want very much to help them. Our department, the largest in the country, now serves 97,000 families without regard to race, creed, color, or length of local residence. Our special Civilian War Assistance unit is devoted entirely to the needs of issei and nisei resettlers."

14 PAINTINGS BY YABUKI DISPLAYED IN PHILADELPHIA

PHILADELPHIA--Fourteen paintings by Masao Yabuki, former head of the art department at the local high school, are being exhibited until April 7 at the Women's University Club in Philadelphia. Yabuki, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Yabuki of 12-1-B, Topaz, relocated to Philadelphia last April and is now working for a large firm of industrial designers.

His present exhibition is composed of paintings done in Berkeley, Tanforan Assembly center and 8 paintings done during 1944-45 in Philadelphia and Altentown, Pa.

Yabuki, a former resident of Oakland, received his MA degree in art from the University of California.

DURATION WORK ASSURED AT ARMY ORDNANCE DEPOTS

Employment is guaranteed for workers at the Army Ordnance depots, at Sioux and Tooele for the duration and six months, Leighton Dingley, of the relocation office stated. He explained that job performance is assured until the conclusion of hostilities and six months thereafter.

Unlike employment in a defense factory which may stop at any time due to cutbacks, continuous ordnance work is guaranteed with a civil service appointment.

As in any war or war-related employment, privilege of separation is lessened. Technically a person is "frozen" to his job. This means that he cannot leave without approval. If an employee does leave without approval he cannot get another job for 60 days.
