## CRACK NISEI GI'S LEAD CAPTURE OF MONTE BELVEDERE

ROME, April 8.—Crack Japanese American infantry, spearheading the US Fifth army's drive on the western flank of the newly-active Italian battlefront, have captured a 3000-foot Monte Belvedere and driven within two miles of Massa, Allied headquarters announced Sunday.

The Nazi grip on Massa and nearby Carrara, centers of the world famous Italian marble quarrying industry, was threatened by the Fifth army's surge northward near the Ligurian coast. An apparent objective is the enemy's important naval base of La Spezia, 145 miles northwest of Massa.

The Americans of Japanese ancestry, members of the 442nd infantry regiment, gained four miles in 48 hours, wiped out one company of Germans and virtually destroyed two others and took more than 1000 prisoners.

Through infiltration and with the aid of the Italian patriots, the Japanese Americans discovered a secret mountain trail the Germans had been using to send spies to Fifth army positions. Association Press correspondent, Sid Feder, reported from the

Ninety-nine persons participated in the civil service clerical examination given here April 6. Results of the tests are expected here this week, it was announced.

Leo Burnstad, civil service commission representative of Salt Lake City, stated that it may be possible to give these tests again in May.

## EVACUEE RELOCATORS ALLOWED TWO 30-DAY VISITS TO CENTERS

All relocators will be permitted two visits to the centers during the remainder of the year, effective with modification of present policies, WRA Director Dillon S. Myer announced. The new regulations also eliminate the previous requirement for advance approval for visits to the centers.

Another feature of the adjusted policy is the provision for application to

the project director for the refund of all guest charges if a visitor has accomplished or scheduled the relocation of other family members during his stay at the center.

The altered ruling is intended to permit as free a movement as possible of center visitors consistent with the necessity for conserving the resources of the agency and of trans-

# WRA WILL LEND SURPLUS FURNISHINGS TO HOSTELS

WRA will lend furnishings from surplus center stocks to non-profit hostels offering temporary shelter to 20 or more persons. The temporary use of this excess equipment will be made available only to hostels operated by responsible committees or representative groups other than evacuees or in addition to evacuees.

Loans of bedding, chairs, kitchen utensils and tableware will be made to hostels in the states of California, Oregon and Washington.

Such hostel operators will not be permitted to practice any discrimination, and housing must be available to members of any religious group. Sponsors will be permitted to charge only what it costs to operate the hostel.

These hostels must be open for inspection by WRA employees, and their books and accounts available on request of a government representative. They will be held responsible for all borrowed property.

## APPOINTED STAFF CHANGES REPORTED

Nine members of the appointed staff have resigned their positions during the past two weeks and have left the project. Two new staff members, Read W. Cannon and Henry E. Radatz have been appointed as assistant auditor and secondary school teacher, respectively, according to the personnel office.

(Continued from page 1) front, Monte Belvedere's cloud-covered peak was taken after a battle of several hours. Other elements of the 442nd regiment stormed Cerreta ridge southeast of captured Monte Folgerito. Fifth army headquarters said the doughboys were meeting increasing resistance from enemy artillery and mortar positions.

The latest gains gave the Fifth army control of dominating high ground to the south and east of Misasa.

(Continued from page 1) portation facilities, during the liquidation process, in order to give maximum service to the greatest number of center residents.

An evacuee may divide the allotted 30 days between his two visits in any way he desires. An emergency involving the death or serious illness of immediate family member will permit a visitor to come to the project without having the period of the emergency charged against his visiting time.

### CONSULT FIELD OFFICES

While advance permission is no longer necessary under the new plan, district relocation offices and co-operating agencies will encourage those planning visits to consult the appropriate field offices first. The prospective visitor may

take advantage of local facilities as aids in his family plan.

### OTHER UNLIMITED VISITORS

In addition to health emergencies, others excluded from the limitations on time and number of visits are: 1. members of the armed forces on active status or in the enlisted reserve; 2. persons conducting official business with a center, such as relocatees, seeking to hire center residents for outside employment; and 3. students who have not completed courses and who present letters from authorized officials of colleges, trade or high schools vouching for their enrollment. These students will be permitted to a 90-day stay, to be counted as one visit.

Charges for meals and lodging will be made to all non-resident evacuees

except the following: vacationing students of 90-day visits; members of the enlisted reserve corps, relocated evacuees, who after pre-induction physical examinations have not yet been inducted or placed in the ERC and members of the armed services on active status, who will be charged for board but not for lodging.

### PERSONS WITHOUT PERMISSION

If an evacuee attempts to enter or remain at a center without permission or obtains permission through fraud or misrepresentation, he will be required to leave immediately. Such a person will thereafter be ineligible for further relocation assistance grants and transportation of property, unless the director, on recommendation of the project director, approves an exception.

# ISSEI RETURNEE SOLVES HOUSING JOB PROBLEM POLICIES FOR INDUCTING MEN INTO ARMY EXPLAINED

LOS ANGELES--How a self-reliant returnee solved his job and housing problem without help from others is disclosed by Gerald Ash, Los Angeles relocation officer.

Ichitaro Okuda, 42-year-old issei who arrived at the Pasadena hostel from Gila River on March 15, inserted a 38-cent advertisement in a Pasadena paper, asking for gardening work. He received over 60 replies, and has now contracted to care for 22 yards and gardens in Pasadena and vicinity.

Then, ignoring warnings that it would be a waste of his time to try to find a house, he systematically followed up all promising newspaper advertisements in both Los Angeles and suburban papers.

As a result of his initiative and perseverance, he succeeded, and less than two weeks, in renting a desirable house in Los Angeles where Okuda and his family soon will be reunited.

## RELOCATION REPORT THIS YEAR GIVEN

A total of 4,977 persons have relocated permanently from WRA relocation centers so far this year, the Washington Statistics section reports. Of these, 934 went to California, 134 to Oregon, 185 to Washington, 42 to Arizona, and 3,682 to other states.

## SAN JOSE BIBLE COLLEGE GIVES SPECIAL ATTENTION TO NISEI GI'S

Wounded American soldiers of Japanese ancestry hospitalized at Dibble General Hospital, Menlo Park, California, are the special project of the San Jose Bible college, 305 So. Fifth Street, San Jose.

To make sure that the nisei are not lacking for entertainment, workers from the college have instituted a program for the veterans which includes entertainment in homes of persons of Caucasian and Japanese ancestry in Santa Clara county, seeing to it that flowers are placed in the men's rooms, taking them for automobile rides on sunny days and making

Policies concerning the induction into the US Army of men 26 through 29 were explained to local boards by the selective service director, the War Manpower commission report disclosed. Inductions for these men will be based on importance of their war jobs.

Men will be called in the following order: 1. those employed in activities not on the essential activities list, 2. men employed in relatively unimportant jobs in essential but not critical activities, 3. men employed in relatively unimportant jobs in critical activities, 4. men engaged in relatively more important jobs in essential activities, and 5. men engaged in more important jobs in critical activities. If a replacement is available for a registrant, he is to be classified as available for induction regardless of his place in any of these five groups.

The armed forces need young men, and since the supply of those in the 18 to 26 group is nearly exhausted, a substantial part of future calls will be filled with men in the 26 through 29 groups, selective service said.

## NEW ORLEANS HAS MANY TYPES OF OPPORTUNITIES

The district WRA office at New Orleans has a great range of opportunities to offer center residents who are anxious to reestablish themselves.

Through the efficient cooperation of the United States Employment service anyone seeking a job can quickly learn about the dozens of offerings in their particular field. Last week a visitor to the New Orleans office was interested in finding work as a shoe repairman. Within an hour he had contacted a good permanent position paying \$40 a week. The same individual was busy for five days investigating many other changes he had to accept work. No evacuee visitor has ever reported to this office a failure to find plenty of opportunities for jobs.

The following is a partial list of positions available in New Orleans and vicinity.

Auto mechanics, automobile upholstery, bookkeepers, butchers, cabinet makers, carpenters, electricians, linen assorters, machinists, general assemblers in defense plants, sewing machine operators, shipping clerks, shoe repairmen, sugar packing machine operators, suit makers (cutters), riveters, typists, watch repairmen.

An increasing number of farm offers are report-

ed. They can be divided into two classes.

1. Plantations of large holdings, with owners who are interested in employing evacuate families to work on a share basis. These owners will furnish housing and, in many instances, the necessary equipment to work the land.

2. Other owners are requesting operators of farms. Those owners are absentees and are anxious to contact reliable farmers who can improve the operation of their farms. In some instances those owners will furnish equipment as well as housing. In other cases, there is only housing and no equipment available. All of these offers are substantial opportunities of individual resettlers and, in some cases, can accommodate two or three family groups.

Residents interested in farming in the southern area should understand that spring planting will soon be in full progress.

## HOUSING FOR EVACUEES

In addition to the usual hotel and rooming house accommodations, New Orleans has two places available for housing relocators temporarily:

1. The home of an evacuee family can accommodate about eight visitors.

2. The Baptist Bible institute has set aside three rooms in the men's dormitory for transient evacuee men.

## MARDI GRAS CITY HAS VIVID HISTORY

Traditionally the city that care forgot, New Orleans is, perhaps, best known for its liberal attitude--its "Live and Let Live" policy--reflected by its annual Mardi Gras carnival.

The majestic procession of the annual Mardi Gras parade through the old French quarter, with its narrow streets, overhanging balconies, great barred doors and tropical-

## NEW ORLEANS LARGEST DEEP SOUTH CITY IS CAPITAL OF LOUISIANA

New Orleans is an urban oasis lying in a delta-enclosed area between the Mississippi river and Lake Pontchartrain, 107 miles from the mouth of the river.

The sprawling capital of Louisiana is the fourth

largest city in area in the United States, covering 365 square miles, of which 166 square miles are water. With a population of approximately half a million, New Orleans is the largest city south of the Mason-Dixon line and one of this country's largest ports.

Average elevation is one foot above mean Gulf level. The weather is semi-tropical, with an average yearly temperature of 69.5 degrees. The winters and summers are generally moderate, temperatures of over 100 and below 20 being rare. Mean annual precipitation is 59.45 inches.

## TEXAN LEADS 442ND TO HEROISM

This following report of an interview with Lt. James Finnel of Dallas, Texas, appeared in the Houston Post on February 20, giving his story of the "Lost Battalion" (442nd Infantry) in France last October, when he led Japanese American troops to the rescue.

"I've been with them," he recounted. "I've slept, eaten and fought with them and I can tell you they're 100% patriotic right from the letter 'P'--I've seen them ready to drop off from exhaustion, but their 'this-is-worth-fighting-for' spirit came to the fore and they kept on going."

### DOMESTIC OFFER

A well-to-do family in Houston, Texas, desires a man and his wife on their home estate. The man will care for the garden and chauffeur for the family. The woman will cook and help keep the downstairs of the house.

Food, lodging and uniforms will be furnished. The salary is \$40 per week

### VEGETABLE FARMING

2. Location: South Texas-Houston area

Description: 200 acres of good vegetable land

Housing: Owner now has two 4-room houses which he will modernize.

### TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

Owner will either lease land for cash or on a share basis. It may be taken by one or two families. He has some farm equipment available and will assist in getting more. Community acceptance is good and there are other Japanese Americans in the area. This owner now has an evacuee on one of his farms.

3. A Japanese American in Cypress, Texas, and his brother-in-law desire to employ four laborers with vegetable farming and bunching experience immediately. Salary is \$150.00 with meals and sleeping quarters in addition.

## Dixie Attractions

Dear friends in all relocation centers:

It's two years since I first came to the deep South. Still, the Dixie enchantment holds.

As I see it, there is some fascination here even for an ex-Californian (I hail from Los Angeles). Call it what you wish--the strange old-world Vieux Carré (French Quarter), the mysterious fantasy of voodoo or black magic, the rebel vigor of a freebooter Jean La Fitte, of a General Robert E. Lee; traditional river-boats on a murky Mississippi, moss-covered swamps of uncharted bayous, the lashing blue waters of a jagged Gulf of Mexico.

There is an attraction for any nisei. Better still there is a promise of a future.

Especially is this true of agriculture. Look at the fertile alluvial soils, breathe the sun-drenched air, or watch the persistent sweeps of water everywhere--these ingredients add up to successful farming formula. The agricultural ways of the South are old and hallowed. Even before the Louisiana Purchase there had been plantations of cotton and cane. But truck-gardening, in which the nisei excel, is still an untried and unknown quotient.

The words of reconversion, post-war planning, G.I. Bill of Rights--all fit in. Beyond the horizon there may be acres of diamonds.

Here, too, is a melting pot of many races. This means understanding and tolerance. Many decades ago, the Acadians, ostracized from Canada, came to Louisiana and developed the haven known as the Evangeline country. Many groups of people have found a refuge here and a new start in life. So can the issai and nisei to get a new lease on life--to prosper and preserve in time to come; for basically all of us are productive, humble, God-fearing and loyal to this country, which are the fundamental ingredients of a good pioneering American.

# BUTSUYEN, OMAYE FIND SUCCESS IN SOUTH GEORGIA

## SOUTHERN COASTAL STATES OFFER TRUCK FARMING

"Why evacuees don't move to Southern Georgia instead of wanting to return to California is beyond my understanding," was the earnest comment of S. Butsuyen of White Oak, Georgia.

Butsuyen and his business associate, H.I. Omaye, went to work as their own farm hands several years ago on rented land known today as the Maryfield Plantation located a short distance from the town of White Oak, Georgia.

Today they own 1200 acres of land and have invested over \$100,000 in their successful adventure.

Last week they were harvesting a 100-acre crop of head lettuce. It appeared that the crop would average from 175 to 200 cases per acre. The market price per crate at that time was \$4.90 per case. "And we don't have to pay that \$1.65 per crate freight charge from California to the eastern market.

"Sure, we'll rent some of the cleared land to evacuees, and we'll clear and place behind dykes more of the land for evacuees," Butsuyen continued.

### FLOWER FARM WITH FIVE GREENHOUSES FOR LEASE OR RENT

Five greenhouses consisting of 50 to 60 thousand square feet of space under glass plus 25 acres of land suitable for outdoor growing of flowers may be leased or rented on monthly basis by several evacuee families. This flower farm is located between Houston and Galveston near Dickinson. The greenhouses are equipped with heating system and watering system from wells and lake.

The greenhouses are in need of repair and the owner is willing to furnish material and labor to make repairs. The greenhouses will have to be stocked. This will require a considerable amount of capital. Also

Suitable for housing for about six to eight families is available. It is modernly equipped and furnished with electric refrigerators, hot and cold running water, bath, electricity, gas for cooking and heating, and completely furnished throughout.

Florida, Georgia and South Carolina also offer attractive opportunities to evacuees interested in truck farming.

(Continued from page 1) courtyards of magnolias, azaleas, wisteria and gardenias, is a never-to-be-forgotten scene.

The balconies are arrayed in balloons and lanterns, and confetti and serpentine drift down from high casement windows onto the paraders. Negroes car-

The growing season ranges from 250 to 300 days, enabling farmers to produce two or more crops a year. Employees on farms may obtain year-around work at a flat rate of \$25 per week, and from \$8 to \$12 per day for "piece" work. The farm owner provides housing.

The Maryfield plantation, 120 miles south of Savannah, Georgia, is owned and operated by Japanese. Five Japanese families live on this 700-acre tract and cultivate approximately 200 acres of truck crops.

A co-operative corporation, owning land in one of the most productive sections of Florida, wishes to obtain evacuee families to operate farms in an area especially adapted to dairy and mixed vegetables. This co-operative processes as well as ships its own products. It has modern equipment for washing and mechanical pre-cooling. Tenant houses are provided.

The central Georgia peach section is open to evacuees. It also is adapted to the growing of watermelons, beans and other truck crops. An operator of 6,000 acres wishes to obtain evacuee families as year-around farm workers.
