CLEAN-UP DAY MERGING OF RELOCATION, FOR CENTER TO WELFARE OFFICES REVEALED BE HELD MAY 12

Saturday, May 12, will be clean-up day in Topaz. An old clothes drive for war relief will be held at the same time.

The center-wide 'clean-up' will be made in the interest of health, safety and fire protection. The blocks will be inspected to determine the cleanest one in Topaz. Prizes will be awarded to the student who writes the best essay and to the student who makes the best poster in connection with the clean-up and old clothes drive.

The clean-up plans were made yesterday at a meeting of representatives of the administration, block managers, council, fire department, schools, boy scouts and mess management. Details of the clean-up will be announced later.

The welfare section is being merged with the relocation division to provide better services to residents, Acting Project Director Roscoe E. Bell announced today. He emphasized that services of the welfare section will be improved by the reorganization.

Claud C. Pratt, welfare counselor, will continue to be responsible for the entire welfare program in his new capacity as chief assistant to Relocation Program Officer Leah K. Dickinson.

The center will be divided into 14 districts of about three blocks each with a staff worker responsible

for meeting the relocation and welfare needs of residents in each district. Each district supervisor will have three or four assistants, including an interpreter.

Under this districting plan, Bell said, the same district workers will be working with the same group of people all the time and will be better able to know and meet their needs. District workers will be in block manager's offices at a certain time daily to answer questions and counsel residents.

The consolidation is expected to be completed and in operation on May 14. (Continued on page 2)

THREE DINING HALLS TO CLOSE MAY 6; ARRANGEMENTS COMPLETED

Serious deficiencies of workers in many phases of the project operations has finally necessitated the closing of project dining halls in accordance with the requirements from the Washington office, as announced by the project director on April 24. Final arrangements have been made for the closing of dining halls 7, 8, and 41 on May 6 in accordance with the plans as outlined at that time.

Special issuances of equipment and food are being

made to the receiving blocks (1, 13, 14, 34) so that they will be ready to serve the residents of the blocks from the closed dining halls, beginning Monday morning May 7. Additional workers are being furnished to these blocks.

Mess hall workers in these blocks have been sent notices of appreciation for their past services and advising of other jobs to which they can transfer.

Residents in block 8 will be served at DH 1; block 41 at DH 34; block 7 (barracks 1 to 6) at DH 13; and block 7 (barracks 7 to 12) at DH 14.

NISEI SOLDIERS OF 442ND INFANTRY MAKE SENSATIONAL GAINS IN ITALY

WASHINGTON, DC--Members of the 442nd Infantry regiment, composed of American doughboys of Japanese descent, are in the vanguard of the Fifth Army's great offensive which has smashed the German Army in Northern Italy, the War Department reported today. Soldiers of this crack outfit came for the most part from government relocation camps in this country and from Hawaii.

Making sensational gains of 76 miles in five days, the 442nd took part in the capture of Genoa,

Italy's largest seaport, on April 27, and then forged ahead to enter Turin, last great city in the Po River Valley, on April 30. The 442nd entered Genoa along with the 473rd Infantry regiment, which then swung around in a southwesterly direction. Both regiments are attached to the 92nd Infantry division.

White Man's Justice

(Following is an editorial published in the S.F. Chronicle, April 29, 1945.)

It has been a simple, clear-cut case. The seven men and five women who sat in the jury box of Auburn, Cal.'s courtroom, could easily assemble the facts and testimony in their minds:

Sumio Doi had returned last January to his home near Newcastle, Cal., from internment, along with other Japanese in Lamar, Colo. With him came his parents. Sumio Doi's two brothers did not come home—they were both in the U.S. Army, and one of them was fighting in Europe.

On the night of January 18 a car drove up the road to the Doi farm. Some men got out of the car, sprinkled gasoline on the roof of Sumio Doi's packing shed, and set a match to it. Sumio Doi and his mother and father managed to beat out the flames.

When the men came back the next night Sumio Doi was ready for them. He charged at their automobiles with his truck and drove them off. Then he called the sheriff.

The sheriff found that sticks of dynamite had been placed under Sumio Doi's packing shed. It was only because the caps had been faulty that the dynamite did not go off.

Several days later James E. Watson, 38, Elmer Johnson, 20, and his brother, Alvin Johnson, 18, (both AWOL Army privates), confessed to the firing (and the attempted dynamiting). Claude Watson, 25, brother of James, confessed to his connection with the dynamite incident.

The jury heard their stories, heard the account of a two-day drinking party (in which several under-age girls had participated) and how the plot was hatched one day after James Watson had said: "There's some Japs out here I don't like. They've got a packing shed. Let's burn it down."

The prosecution lined up all the facts and witnesses, no denials, or rebuttals. The jury heard Defense Attorney Floyd Bowers sum up the case, however. He talked of the "Death March" from Bataan and other Japanese atrocities, he talked of the army privates' indoctrination. He concluded: "This is a white man's country."

It was a clear-cut case. The facts were all there. The jury took two hours (with time out for lunch). When they came back they announced to a solemn court that the defendants were not guilty. About 100 people, gathered outside the Auburn Courthouse, heard the news and cheered.

All offices will be in blk. 2. The relocation office and relocation library will be moved from barrack 6 in block 2 to barrack 10, facing the welfare counseling office in barrack 9. The welfare unit in barrack 10, which includes housing, clothing, etc., will be moved to barrack 6, opposite the leave office in barrack 5. The evacuee property office will also be moved to block 2.

ZIMMERMAN TO ANSWER QUESTIONS ON MIDWEST

Mrs. Eleanor Zimmerman, reports officer from the north central area with headquarters in Chicago, will remain at Topaz 7 days longer to answer questions center residents may have about the Midwest.

Mrs. Zimmerman has recently investigated business opportunities in St. Louis, Kansas City, Des Moines and Omaha, in addition to Chicago, and talked with issei families in those cities. Of 60 issei families who met in the four cities other than Chicago, only 2 men hoped to return to the west coast for business reasons.

More than 100 business enterprises, including hotels and apartment houses, are now being operated by Japanese Americans in Chicago, Mrs. Zimmerman pointed out. Because of the large Japanese American population in Chicago--more than 8,000--Topaz residents with the exception of those who want to go into business or professions, might do better to accept jobs in the smaller towns and suburbs within easy commuting distance of Chicago. If Topaz residents have children working in the city of Chicago, Mrs. Zimmerman urges them to accept jobs outside of Chicago where they can visit the city frequently and have their children stay with them over the weekends.

Children must be cautioned to report injuries immediately to their parents and also against playing with toys that might result in serious injuries, stated Dr. Douglas Collier, chief medical officer. Recently, a 9-year-old boy lost an eye when a playmate threw a dart which hit his eye. He told no one of the accident until a day later when infection had started. He was treated by Dr. Merrill and then taken to Salt Lake City on Friday where his eye was removed.
