(The following editorial appeared in the Washington TO RESETTLERS Post, May 7, 1945)

"In Celifornia, since the beginning of this year, there have been 16 shooting incidents-directed at American citizens of Japanese ancestry. The Americans Americans who were made the target of this terrory had returned to their homes with the expressed permission the United States army. Their loyalty had been carefully scrutinized and certified by army authorities. Some of them had been honorably discharged from the army itself. Some had been released from the camps of the War Relocation authority after the Supreme Court of the United States had declared the detention of loyal citizens on grounds of race to be unconstitutional. These Americans are being persecuted because of their racial background -- in the same way and for just the same reasons that prompted the nazi persecution of racial minorities. When we gape at German atrocities, we might cast a backward gland at these atrocities of
