HOFFMAN RETURNS FROM TOUR OF EASTERN STATES

Project Director L. T. Hoffman returned Wednesday from a two-and-a-half week trip east and reported that he found former residents of Topaz and other centers happy to be out and doing their part in normal communities.

"Former Topazians whom I talked with in St. Louis, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, DC, Boston and New York sent their best regards and in every case ended with a request to tell the people at Topaz to come out and join them soon," Hoffman said.

"In Washington, Director Myer expressed appreciation for his recent pleasant visit here and for the good work that had been done by the residents and staff but reminded us that the real job was still ahead and that we would need to exert our best efforts to help every individual and family to join those already outside here."

COZZENS VISITS HERE; REPORTS ON WEST COAST

The great majority of the 3,000 evacuees who have returned to the west coast are getting along well, Robert B. Cozzens, assistant director of the War Relocation Authority, said in an interview today.

ALL VOCATIONAL CLASSES TO END

The vocational training classes will cease at the end of this month due to the government's nation-wide plan to discontinue its support of all pre-employment training units, disclosed Perry Carmichael, vocational training supervisor.

This plan will affect the ten students who are now attending the Delta aircraft mechanic school. They will receive certificates verifying the number of hours trained.

HOFFMAN TO REPORT BEFORE MEETINGS

Project Director L. T. Hoffman will make a detailed report of his trip east at various staff and evacuee meetings and to the community council.

"I feel that the situation on the coast is much better than was expected by many," Cozzens said in an interview. "Practically all those who have returned are getting along well. There have been no incidents of any consequence in the bay area, and the 16 incidents which have occurred in other west coast areas are not many when one considers that approximately 3,000 persons of Japanese ancestry now are living on the west coast."

Cozzens said that the housing situation cannot be solved by staying in the centers. The only way it can be solved, he said, is for those who have homes to return to them, and for others to take temporary housing in hostels, hotels and with friends, and then go out and find permanent housing like anyone else.

The San Francisco War Relocation Authority official left at noon today after spending one day here learning the major relocation problems of the residents.

BLOCK 7 WINS CLEAN-UP CONTEST; OTHER WINNERS ANNOUNCED

The award for the cleanest block in camp was won by block 7 in the clean-up contest held last week. Other blocks that placed were blocks 85, 33, and 1.

Pennants will be awarded to the block managers of the winning blocks by Project Director L. T. Hoffman this Saturday at 10 o'clock in the morning.

Using a point system, the contest was judged on the cleanliness and orderliness of coal piles, woodpiles, grounds within the block, front and rear of barracks, and the kitchen and dining halls.

Judges for the contest were, Shichisaburo Hideshima, representing the community council, Tamaki Matsuno of the block managers, and Claude Pratt, Joseph Featherstone and O.H. Roraback from the appointed personnel.

CALIFORNIA JR. CHAMBER OF COMMERCE URGES DELAY OF RETURNING EVACUEES

FRESNO--A charge that calling for a delay in the return of the Japanese until all of the nation's fighting forces have been returned to this country. A committee headed by Harold Haley of Visalia reported its investigation disclosed that Japanese are taking over choice properties in absence of the fighting men.

The Junior Chamber delegates adopted a resolution

"We should give our fighting men an equal opportunity to acquire these lands and business locations," the resolution asserts.

West Coast Terror

(The following editorial appeared in the Washington Post, May 7, 1945)

"In California, since the beginning of this year, there have been 16 shooting incidents--directed at American citizens of Japanese ancestry. The Americans who were made the target of this terrorism had returned to their homes with the expressed permission of the United States army. Their loyalty had been carefully scrutinized and certified by army authorities. Some of them had been honorably discharged from the army itself. Some had been released from the camps of the War Relocation authority after the Supreme Court of the United States had declared the detention of loyal citizens on grounds of race to be unconstitutional. These Americans are being persecuted because of their racial background--in the same way and for just the same reasons that prompted the Nazi persecution of racial minorities. When we gaze at German atrocities, we might cast a backward glance at these atrocities of our own.

A California jury has acquitted three men who were charged with having planted a dynamite bomb on the farm of Sumio Doi, recently released from a relocation camp. We do not know the details of the evidence against these men. But we do know that the presiding judge permitted the introduction of questions respecting the validity of Doi's purchase of his ranch under the California Alien Land act and that the defense attorney was allowed to tell the jury, "this is a white man's country. Let's keep it so." We had supposed that "trials" of this character had ended with the collapse of Hitler's fortress.

"These atrocities have been happening not far from San Francisco, where the representatives of 48 nations--comprising people of every race and color--are striving to create a new organization to keep the peace. They besmirch our principles and our pretensions. They are perpetrated, to be sure, by no more than a few bigoted hoodlums. Nevertheless, they do injury to us all--not only to our good name but also to the institutions upon which our own secure and orderly way of life is founded. If California authorities cannot uphold the law and protect the citizens of their own state, they should call for help from the federal government. Terrorism is no less ugly at home than abroad.

ESSENTIAL WORKERS IN BUFFALO MAY LIVE IN GOVT. PROJECT

BUFFALO, N.Y.--Evacuees employed in essential industries are eligible and can obtain housing in government projects in suburban Buffalo, George Gruff, Western New York district relocation officer revealed.

"Government housing authorities met with the representatives from the Buffalo Resettlement committee and myself recently to discuss the problem of securing proper housing for evacuees.

"The results have been fruitful. The housing authorities said that quarters for small family groups are available now.

We don't know how many we can take care of on this plan," he continued, "but have your relocation program officer write early and we will see that your request gets quick attention."

It was pointed out that two evacuee families are already living in one of the projects, and their experiences have been very favorable.

PHILA. GROUP TO GIVE AID TO RESETTLERS

PHILADELPHIA--The local Nisei Steering committee, which was organized in June, 1944, as a temporary group, voted at a recent meeting to continue as a permanent organization designed to aid issei and nisei resettlers in working out their relocation problems and in taking their place in the community life of Philadelphia.

Activities of the Nisei Steering committee have included meeting newcomers at trains and helping them to get acquainted with Philadelphia; arranging teas for issei and parties for nisei at the hostel; holding dances and forums; and arranging speakers for meetings sponsored by schools and organizations.

CHARGE MADE BY WRITER DENIED

A statement made by columnist John O'Donnell of the Washington Times-Herald, charging that 200 Japanese Americans had worked in an Akron factory and their output had exceeded that of white workers, and that the government would not permit publication of reports or pictures of it, has been flatly denied by the Akron, Ohio rubber companies and manpower officials.

The Great Lakes Area WRA office made a check and found less than 15 Japanese Americans working in Akron at the present time.

ISSEI TAKES OWN LIFE IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK--Keisen Tin Nagai, 22-year-old issei who was formerly of National, Washington, and later evacuated to the Tule Lake and Minidoka centers, was found dead of gas poisoning on May 11 in the furnished apartment he shared with two nisei since coming to New York from Chicago early this year.

The death was certified as suicide by the police and verified as such by the local WRA official.

CALIF. CIVIL SERVICE TESTS TO BE HELD

California state civil service aptitude examinations for junior and intermediate stenographers and clerical workers will be held Saturday, June 2, and the first Saturday of each month thereafter. Similar tests for junior and intermediate typists are to be given on the third Saturday of each month.

Application for either test should be made in person at the San Francisco Office of the State Personnel Board, 108 State building on any day except Saturday. Reservations for typewriters can be made at the same time.

DIRECTIONS GIVEN FOR MAY 21 RELOCATORS

Persons going to San Francisco or points west on the special car leaving on May 21 are requested by the leave office, to visit the finance office not later than Saturday morning, May 19.

The bus will commence picking up the relocators at the dining hall in each block at 3 AM.

Persons are asked to have checkable baggage ready to be picked up Sunday, May 20, before noon.

THREE STUDENTS RECEIVE GRANTS FROM SSAF; 8 OTHERS PENDING

Three of the eleven students who have applied for a scholarship from the 1945 Topaz high school scholarship fund have already received their grants, it was announced by Sasato Yamate, chairman of the Student Aid fund. The other students will receive their grants as soon as funds can be raised.

Those who have received grants are Aileen Yamate, who is attending Colorado State College of Education, and Seiko Akahoshi and Yutaka Yoshida, both attending University of California.

DETROIT CUTBACKS TURN EVACUEES TO FARMING

DETROIT, Mich.--Curtailement of working hours is taking place here and many evacuees are now focusing their interest on Michigan farming, according to Wendell G. Gee, Detroit relocation officer.

The industrial situation has not directly affected Michigan resettlers yet, but the 60-hour-plus war overtime week is gradually being trimmed down to the standard 48-hour war week, and some plants have been granted permission to cut back to 40 hours per week.

OREGON LAND LAW HELD DOUBTFUL

Two sections of Oregon's new Alien Land law are "of very doubtful constitutionality," the WRA solicitor's office in Washington said this week.

"The new Oregon law does not change the prohibitions of the alien land law of 1921, but merely provides a new penalty and sets up certain presumptions of evidence," Edwin E. Ferguson, solicitor, stated in a supplement to opinion no. 82 sent recently to all projects.

HOSTEL OPENED FOR RESSETTLERS IN BOSTON

A hostel for evacuees, the first of its kind in New England, was opened recently in Boston, Massachusetts, on 6 Walnut street, Beacon Hill.

The Walnut street quarters, formerly occupied as a lodging-house, will provide accommodations for 25 persons. The Revs. Robert L. Zoerheide, Unitarian minister to students in Greater Boston, and Mrs. Zoerheide will live at the hostel and supervise its activities.

The hostel was started by service groups "interested in seeing justice done to this large group of our people who have been stigmatized because of the accident of ancestry."

The plan was initiated by the Unitarian Service committee, a non-sectarian, humanitarian service operating all over the world in the relief field, mainly among refugees. This group enlisted the interest of the Congregational Christian Service committee, with headquarters in New York, and the two groups became the principal financial supporters of the project.

LIBRARY BOOKS TO BE SOLD MAY 21-26

as a farm laborer, or to live and work on or manage land owned by his children or other citizens, there is no reason why he should not do so, Ferguson said. He should be able, however, to furnish evidence that he has no interest in the land if he is called upon to do so by Oregon law enforcement officials.

The solicitor advised that such evidence may be in the form of powers of attorney or employment contracts making it clear that any compensation is for services rendered and that it is not dependent on the crops produced. Where the alien manages the operations on behalf of the owner, the agreements should be supplemented by accurate and complete records. To show that he is actually an agent and not a share cropper, tenant or owner, he should have bank accounts, sales receipts and expense statements that clearly reflect this to be the case.

CENTER DIVIDED INTO 4 PARTS; EACH AREA TO HAVE ADVISOR

With the merging of the welfare and relocation divisions completed, a new setup has been devised to help the relocation plans of the residents. Under this new plan, the center is divided into four areas with an advisor for each area. A diagram of the areas is shown at the right.

Advisors for the areas are: Margaret Mark, area 1; Ralph Earle, area 2; Leighton Dingley, area 3; and Nellie Jenkins, area 4.

All offices will be located in block 2. Residents who wish to contact their area officer may come to the new relocation office in block 2-10. The welfare counseling office is in barrack 9.

The welfare unit, which includes housing, clothing, etc., is in barrack 6, opposite the leave office in barrack 5. The evacuee property office has also been moved to barrack 6.

SCHOLARSHIP WON BY NISEI GIRL

SOUTH HADLEY, Mass.--Miss Hattie Kawahara was the first winner of the Mt. Holyoke Ellen D. Ellis fellowship for graduate study in the field of international relations.

Ikari arrived in New York City from Manzanar last November and first worked in a paper box factory while studying refrigeration at night in a YMCA school. After three months of training, he obtained his present position through the US Employment service, to which he was referred by the WRA relocation office in Newark.

Asked about his experience in finding housing, Ikari said that he thought he had been the subject of discrimination when he first looked for a room in Jersey City. "I wasn't sure," he said, "but when the landlady told me that there was no vacancy, I thanked her for her trouble and shook her hand. I'll bet she rents a room to the next Japanese American who goes to her."
