PC NOBORI WINS MYER GIVES REASONS FOR BRONZE STAR FOR SETTING CLOSING DATES VALOROUS DEED

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--Pfc. Teruo Nobori of Berkeley, California, was recently awarded the Bronze Star for valorous conduct in action with the 442nd Japanese combat team.

Nobori received his award from the 92nd division's commanding general, Major General M. Athwood, at a special Fifth Army parade and awards ceremony at Novi, Italy. He also wears the Distinguished Unit Badge as a member of the task force that aided in the rescue of the 141st Infantry's "Lost Battalion" in France, the Combat Infantryman Badge, the Good Conduct Medal and the European Theater ribbon with four battle stars.

Nobori, a former market operator in Berkeley, volunteered for the army from Topaz. His wife, Mrs. Kyo Nobori, now lives in Berkeley.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL ELECTION REVEALS TWELVE NEW MEMBERS

The result of the council election revealed twelve new members and nineteen re-elected members, according to a report made by the general election board. Block 6, 26, and 28 did not hold a nomination meeting; therefore no election was held.

The new community council will elect their chairmen in the next meeting.

WRA Director Dillon S. Myer, in a letter to Project Director L.T. Hoffman, sets forth the reasons why he has asked all centers to set closing dates prior to January 1. Topaz officials and evacuee leaders are preparing such a recommendation now.

"First of all", Myer writes, "I believe everyone will agree that conditions will be much more favorable to relocation during July, August and September than during October, November and December."

HOUSING BEST NOW

"Housing is a problem in virtually every relocation district. The housing problem can be met better during the summer months than during the fall and winter months.

"The transportation problem will be more acute in the last three months of this year than during the rest of the summer. Transportation will become increasingly difficult as each month passes. In addition to the needs created by the military situation, there will be additional demands on the transportation system by Christmas mail and holiday traffic during the last two months of the year.

JOB OPPORTUNITIES

"Further, while I do not expect that the evacuees will experience any serious difficulties in obtaining jobs during the last three months of the year, it is true that normally jobs are more plentiful.

The number of Topaz segregates now is down to 28 from a high of 89.

A Yank Backs Nisei

A soldier who fought with the nisei in Italy, Private First Class Philip E. Lerman, 87th Mountain Infantry, APO 345, 8/o Postmaster, New York, urged, in a letter received by the San Francisco Chronicle, Stockton longshoremen to work with Americans of Japanese ancestry. His letter read in part:

"I want to take the privilege as an American trade-unionist, and a soldier to excoriate the type of worker that refuses to work with a nisei.

"Just a short month and a half ago my company pushed off on the offensive that saw the complete defeat of Nazism at its end. We had fought in the mountains and finally broke through to the Po valley.

"All this was made possible because a regiment of Japanese Americans had a few days previous started a diversionary attack on the Ligurian coast.

"Those of us who have had the privilege to fight alongside the nisei look upon him as a brother, a comrade who has fought and suffered with us as Americans. We do not ask you to let them work with you. WE DEMAND IT.

"We have not left our homes, our wives and children, our future to allow men like you to start another holocaust in 10 years. Yours is the mentality that breeds Fascism. Too many Americans of Japanese, Irish, Slavic, Jewish, Negro and other descents have died to give you the privilege to live in our midsts.

"To the union trial committee I say 'Hats Off!' make our homes worth coming back to. Down with bigotry and ignorance."

(Following editorial is from the SF Chronicle.)

The current news brings an eloquent reminder that Japanese American boys have not confined their Americanism to mere heroics; there has been heroism as well.

American soldiers of Japanese ancestry have suffered 2111 casualties in the European war; 361 killed in action, 49 dead of wounds, 1651 wounded, 34 missing and 6 captured. **GHS DECRY NISEI RIFT SAYS JOE E**
The last figure is interesting: not only the indoctrinated, fanatical island at the Pacific fighting Japanese is hard to capture fronts don't hate the Japs, but his "decadent" panese like the people do Americanized cousin as here, said Joe E. Brown. well.

PROJECT FARM ACTIVITIES TO CEASE IN OCTOBER

The poultry and cattle sections as well as all the other agricultural activities on the project farm will cease operations about October 1, Wendall Palmer, chief of agriculture, stated.

A survey of the hog and beef cattle situation indicates that there is enough meat for residents until September. At present there are about 268 hogs and 178 head of beef cattle on the farm.

Some of the unproductive poultry flocks are now being killed and others will be supplied to the center in August and September.

The only crops that are now being harvested are alfalfa for the poultry flock and some hay for beef cattle.

PO SEEKS SUCCESSOR TO POSTMASTER IYEKI

SHORT TERM TO UTAH, IDA, NEV NEEDS APPROVAL

Starting July 1, all persons going to points in Utah, Idaho, and parts of Nevada on a short term leave must first have the approval of their district workers before applying for leave.

All persons are asked to make their application at least three days in advance on short term and at least four days on terminals in order to have ample time to make necessary arrangements, the leave office stated.

Residents relocating to points not easily accessible to WRA offices may receive their cash grants before leaving the center. This is also true in cases where the relocator is in immediate need of the cash grant.

about 44,000 evacuees still residing in the centers exclusive of approximately 20,000 persons at Tule Lake or on Segregate lists," Myer said. "As of June 9, there were actually 48,762 center residents excluding Tule Lake, with three weeks to go to reach our July 1 goal of 44,000.

"We had also anticipated that by June, evacuees would be relocating from the centers at the rate of 1,000 each week, and that this rate would increase toward the end of June and July. During the week ending June 2, 1945, persons left the centers, and this was increased to 1315 during the week ending June 9."

ful during the summer than during the winter months. Also, war cut-backs are beginning to be made which will progressively make the employment situation less favorable for evacuees, although it seems clear that the employment situation will be favorable for quite some time to come.

"Still further, the business of moving and making an adjustment in a new locality is more difficult in the winter months than it will be during the next three or four months.

PERSONNEL PROBLEM AHEAD

"There are other factors which favor early relocation. At the present, we have an adequate staff to handle several times the present weekly and monthly volume of relocation. But as we come closer to the end of the year, we shall lose additional staff members, some of them key personnel. Consequently, the amount of assistance we shall be able to offer evacuees in the field and at the centers will diminish as time goes by.

"Recently we have been offered many fine group relocation opportunities both on the Pacific coast and in other areas. These group opportunities are available only if we can get a sufficiently large group relocation in a short period of time to make the employers feel justified in making such opportunities available. I feel certain that the early acceptance by relatively large groups of evacuees of such group relocation opportunities is the most effective means of

dissolving local anti-Japanese American activities.

WRA BUDGET CUT

"The final consideration, and the most important one, is the fact that Congress is now considering the last appropriation it will make to the WRA.... Those of you who have followed the progress of our appropriation bill.... know that there was a good deal of opposition to our continuing our operations after July 1 of this year.... I am hopeful that the Senate will pass our bill in the form in which it was passed by the House. Assuming that we get this appropriation, we shall have a very tight schedule to meet because the budget bureau reduced by \$5,000,000 the sum we asked for and which we believed necessary to operate all centers until December 31.

"The larger the number of people who delay their departure from relocation centers, the tighter our budget situation will be. If there should be a sizable group within the relocation centers during the last two months, some of them may be almost stranded by lack of adequate transportation or by their failure to make adequate relocation plans earlier. I am sure that you can appreciate the additional difficulties which will face such evacuees at that time. A large scale movement during the winter season will place the late leavers among the evacuees in a very disadvantageous position in comparison to those who made earlier plans."


